Washington, Jan. 2.-The Entente reply rejecting the peace proposal of the Central Powers was cabled by the state department today for presentation to Germany and the other belligerent nations rhose diplomatic interests the United States represents at allied capi-

It was authoritatively stated that President Wilson had not decided what, if any further move in the interest of peace he might make, but was keeping an open mind on the subject while waiting for the Entente's answer to his note proposing a discussion of terms by the belligerents. Discussing the advisability of legislative action appr the course of the president in sending his note occupied the genate for more than an hour and will be resumed tomorrow.

Senate Debate.

The discussion began when Senator Hitchcock's resolution to approve the sale came before the senate for consideration. Democratic leaders, including Senator Stone, chairman of the foreign relations committee, urged that the resolution should be passed without delay or prolonged debate, in order that the president's position might be given approval by a coordinate branch of the government which has authority in international affairs.

Further Debate Possible.
There were strong intimations to night that the Republicans will insist upon thorough debate if Senator Hitchcock persists tomorrow in his demand for a vote without reference to a committee. Such a discussion, it was pointed out tonight, might lead to another general debate on the European war situation, such as characterized the controversy at the lass ession of congress over the right of American citizens to travel on armed ships of belligerents.

Senator Stone declared that the simple question involved in the issue was whether the senate should endorse a movement calculated to open the way for bringing about peace in Europe. For the senate to hesitate, now that the resolution confronted it, he said, would destroy the moral effect of the proposed endorsement upon the nations at war.

BRITISH REPEL GERMAN PATROLS NEAR YPRES, INFLICTING SEVERE LOSSES— SITUATION IN OTHER PARTS OF WAR AREA UNCHANGED-HEAVY ARTILLERY ACTIVITY IN NORTHERN FRANCE AND IN BELGIUM.

Again the Russian and Roumanian forces along the Moldavia and Doubrudja fronts have been compelled to give ground before the advance of the Teutonic Allies. At several points on the Moldavian front, however, Petrograd reports the dispersal of bands of invaders under counter- at-

The drive of the Austrians and Germans eastward from the Transylvanian Alps into Moldavia has given them additional points of vantage, while Field Marshal Von Mackensen's army, operating northward into Moldavia, is approaching the bridgeheads of Fokshany and Fundeni. Between the Buzeu river and the Danube, however, the Russians and Roumanians continue to hold their positions. In Dobrudja the Russians have been thrown back on the town of Matchin, opposite Braila. In the fighting on all these fronts, according to Berlin, more prisoners and much war material have fallen into the hands of the Teutonic Allies.

Aside from the Roumanian theatre comparative quiet continues on all the fronts, although there have been somewhat spirited engagements on the French lines and in Galicia. Along the entire front of the Austro-Italian theatre there have been vigorous artillery duels

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





Extracts from "The Saint John City Assessment Act of 1909."

32. The Assessors shall ascertain, as nearly as possible, the particulars of the real estate, the personal property, and the income of any person who has not brought in a statement in accordance with their notice and as required by this law, and shall make an estimate thereof at the true value and amount, to the best of their information and belief; and such estimate shall be conclusive upon all persons who have not filed their statements in due time, unless they can show a reasonable excuse for the omission.

37. Every person, who wilfully or without lawful ex cuse, refuses, neglects or omits to fill up, to the best of his or her knowledge and belief, any schedule or form as required by any district commissioner, or refuses, neglects or omits to sign and return the same as herinbefore required, or makes, signs, delivers or returns, or causes to be made, signed, delivered or returned any false or incorrect answer or statement as to any matter called for by such schedule or form, or refuses or neglects or omits to answer verbally any question which, within the scope of his duties, may be asked by any district commissioner upon any subject as to which any district commissioner is authorized to inquire shall, for every such neglect, refusal, omission, act or default, be liable to a penalty not exceeding FORTY DOLLARS.

38. In case any person knowingly makes any false or incorrect entry, allegation, or answer, or gives any false or incorrect information in the sworn statement required to be made under this Act, or answers untruly to any question properly asked of him under this Act, every such person shall, on complaint of any assessor or any ratepayer, be liable to a penalty of not more than TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS, recoverable on summary conviction.

43. No person shall have an abatement unless he has

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskat-bewan or Aibera, Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Azeney or Sub-Agency/or the District. Fairty by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. 
