office in the Pugsley building proved 1 busy place. This workmen's compensation act is nonwwhat new to the people of. New Arunswick, although every other prov-mes in Canada, excepting our own and Quebec, have been having the advan-ages of if for some time. The filing of tatements of wages now being made by all employers of labor in the prov-nce is the first step. As the act goes nto operation on Jan. 1, 1919, officials have their work cut out to get books nto shape before claims for compen-sition, etc., commence to come in. The Workmen's Compensation Act is blothed in such technical and legal anguinge that many citizens are yet not quite clear on its contents. It pro-rides money compensation amounting to 55 per cent. of a man's or woman's wages during a period of idleness en-forced by injury sustained while at work. The lowest compensation paid will be §6 per week and the highest is based upon a maximum salary of 1500.

Is obsect upon a maximum samp of \$1,500. For instance: No matter how low a wage a person may be earning they will at least get \$6 weekly if hurt while on the job. On the other hand the board will not attempt to pay 55 per cent. of any salary higher than \$1,500. This makes it necessary for employers, when making their stas-ment to the board, to pare the sal-aries of their "big" men and women down to a basis corresponding with this figure. The act is not intended is a safeguard for high-salaried peo-ple, it is a moderate wage earner's in-surance.

as a safeguard for high-salaried people, it is a moderate wage earner's insurance. Employers of labor of all kinds are legally compelled to make a yearly statement of the wages they disburse, giving the monthly pay-roll and deducting all excesses over \$1,500 salaries as above outlined. The working people, so-called, and others whom an employer may desire to come within the benefits of the act, are reported to the board. Some employers are omitting to include salaries of their office help and other non-risky jobs, so as to reduce the assessment upon their total. Assessments upon employers range from one-half of one per cent, to as high as five per cent, according to the sature of the industry and the risk its employees entail. But we have a difficult job to step over from war conditions to these happy peace conditions, and if we are to do it successfully we need to save every dollar and lend it to the Government in order that Canada may be able again to spend or to lend the money necessary to create the new forms of, labor which will take the place of what is now being done in munition factories.

Every dollar we lend is invested in the safest security that any Government ever issued, and if trouble comes to any of these buyers, the Victory Bond he owns, whether entirely paid for or not, will be the most easily saleable of anything he possesses.

Remember, then, that we should save every possible dollar, and if we do not wish to do this for our own sake we should do it for the sake of our country.
