

Dominion Parliament.

(Continued from first page.)

On motion to go into supply Mr. Laurier discussed at length the point of difference which led Hon. Mr. Angers to separate from his colleagues in the government and moved as an amendment that this house regret the failure of the government to deal with the Manitoba school question in a manner deemed by the best interests of the country, and is of opinion that the ministerial declarations in regard to the question are calculated to promote a dangerous agitation amongst the Canadian people.

It being six o'clock, the speaker left the chair.

After recess Mr. Foster replied effectively to Mr. Laurier, and on the vote being taken the amendment was lost by a majority of 44, the vote being yeas 70 nays 114.

Ottawa, July 16.—On motion to go into supply, Mr. McCarthy rose and said he proposed to ask the house to discuss the school question on its merits, and proceeded to do so and at the close of his remarks moved the following amendment: "That this house has heard with regret the statement recently made defining the policy of the government respecting the Manitoba school question and is unwilling by silence to allow it to be assumed that at the session to be held in January next any more than at the present session it is prepared to pass a law to restore the system of separate schools of Manitoba on the lines of the remedial order of 21st March last."

Sir Charles Tupper replied, and the discussion continued until 1 a. m. when the house adjourned.

Ottawa, July 19.—The house went into committee on the tariff items of which Hon. Mr. Foster gave notice last night.

Mr. Edwards opposed the duty on saws, tools, tools and gravel. Because the United States government had injured the consumer it was a person very much to be regretted that the same mistake.

Speaker White approved of the action of the government and hoped it might lead to reciprocity in this particular item.

Sir Richard Cartwright opposed the change in the lumber duty.

Hon. Mr. Foster said as to lumber, parliament last session went as far as the United States had gone, but a decision had been reached as to the item under consideration by the United States board of appraisers recently and had now the force of law. The resolution before the house simply placed the Canadian manufacturer on the same level as in the United States. The government wished to go as far as possible towards establishing a reciprocity of tariff with the United States. He thought the action of the government would lead to a fair consideration of the case and an amicable settlement. The item passed.

The following tariff change was made to-night: Condensed milk, condensed coffee with milk, milk foods and all similar preparations reduced from 35 to 20 per cent.

The house spent all evening in concurrence and adjourned at 9.30 p. m.

Ottawa, July 20.—There was a very slim attendance in the house to-day. Both morning and afternoon sittings were devoted to the discussion of the Hudson Bay railway bill, which was brought up in the morning in the form of a resolution. It was vigorously debated and ruthlessly altered, notwithstanding the absence of the automatic speaker of Sir Richard Cartwright, who headed the retreating squadrons westward the night before.

The third reading of the bill having been moved in the afternoon, Mr. Mills (Bothwell), raised the objection that the bill should have been introduced by petition, as required in all cases of private bills.

Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper pointed out that the bill merely provided for a rearrangement of subsidies and was thus a measure which a private member could not introduce.

Mr. Laurier argued that the bill authorized the company to utilize another route than that provided in the original act. In this way the rights of the bond holders would be affected.

Precedents were quoted in support of the proposal to pass the bill as it stood, but after a long debate the speaker ruled that the objection to the change of location as constituting the bill a private measure, was well taken.

As this was dealt with in the third clause, the offending section was dropped and the bill, as amended, passed through its final stage in the commons.

Then after some talk on the Portage la Prairie post office site, the house adjourned until Monday morning to await the senate's pleasure with this and one or two other measures.

THE SENATE.

The fifth session of the seventh parliament would have come to an end before six o'clock Saturday evening but for the determination of the opposition in the senate to obstruct the passage of Hudson Bay railway bill, which in amended form reached the upper house from the commons early in the afternoon.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell having moved the first reading, the trouble was begun by Senator McInnes (Hamilton) moving the three months' hoist.

In vain the premier protested that the objectionable features as to change of location had been eliminated in the commons.

"Is it not a fact," said Senator Scott, "that the government were going to lend this Company \$2,500,000, and because public opinion was so pronounced, did not do it?" At that time the speaker intended to have a general election, and some people are wicked enough to say, though I would not, that the government had an interest in it; that they were going to share the spoils with the promoters.

Hon. Bowell—I call the hon. gentleman to order. He should not impute motives to the government. If he were not here the paid agent of some other person he would not dare to use such language.

Mr. Scott—I am not paid.

Hon. Bowell—The hon. gentleman ought not to have the audacity and impudence to accuse the government of taking part in a swindle. It is only men who would enter into a bargain of that kind themselves who would accuse hon. gentlemen of such conduct.

Hon. Smith—The government is not made of the material that the hon. gentleman insinuates. If he has a little about it he had better take care.

Mr. Scott—I said it was rumored outside.

Hon. Bowell—Rumor says that the hon. gentleman is paid for what he is doing here.

Mr. Scott—It is not true.

Hon. Bowell—It is just as true as the other statement, and it is a piece of audacity for him to make such accusation against men who are more knowledgeable than he is himself.

The discussion went on thus for some time. It was evident the senate's hoist was up, and though the guard of honor was under arms on the square and his excellency, attired in full uniform, was waiting the word to come up and prologue parliament, the senators were determined to fight out the bill to the bitter end.

At six o'clock it was announced that there would be no prorogation till the fate of the bill was decided, and the guards and the crowd went home. The senate held an evening sitting, when mutual apologies were exchanged between the leaders.

The three months' hoist was defeated by 11 to 7.

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
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
