## BOARD OF TRADE STILL ACTIVE

Pressing Bridge Matters at Ottawa And Quebec—Railway Matters.

The regular monthly meeting of the Campbellton Board of Trade was held in the Firemen's Hall on Friday, March 16th, President Champoux presiding. The minutes of the last meeting were read, also that of two other meetings, one a meeting of the Council and the other of the Bridge Commission, were read and confirmed.

Mr. W. D. Duncan read memorials that were forwarded to Premier Foster and Hon. P. J. Veniot. A letter was also read from the last named gentleman and which came to Mr. W. H. Miller, in answer to the delegation which went to Fredericton in February last. This letter was received with great applause. See copy of letter on page two of this issue.

Moved by G. G. McKenzie and seconded by Mr. Jos. Duncan, that the Bridge Committee take up all further necessary correspondence with Hon. P. J. Veniot and the three governments. The Bridge Committee also requested the Town Council to pass and forward a resolution to the Premier of New Brunswick which was done.

Moved by Dr. Murray, that as Mr. D. A. Stewart was going to Montreal, he be furnished with a letter of credentials, signed by the President and Secretary enabling him to interview the necessary railway officials in regard to the following matters: Better train service to Campbellton and outlying districts; the Subway, and the reclamation of ground formerly occupied by the I. N. R. Station.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Publicity Committee and the standing committees of the Board be requested for the present year.

Messrs. Wallace and Belle-Ile spoke at length about Town management and quoted many instances of towns, large and small that were working under the Town Manager system under very favorable auspices. It was further moved that a committee composed of W. D. Duncan, J. Day and H. G. Miller be appointed to discuss the matter of town management and report at the next meeting of the Board of Trade.

## Many Citizens Present at Meeting of Council

Resolution Passed at Former Meeting Fully Discussed by Councillors and Members of Citizens' Delegation.

The meeting of the Town Council held Tuesday evening was one of the most interesting yet held in the new hall. The Council chamber was inadequate to accommodate the large number of ladies and gentlemen assembled.

His Worship Mayor McKay occupied the chair and Couns. Belle-Ile, Patterson, Moores, Chamberlain, Bisitt, Duncan and St. Onge were present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read.

Coun. Moores moved that the minutes stand as read.

In speaking to the question Coun. Belle-Ile said that he noticed that in the resolution in reference to the duties of the police a very important part was omitted. The minutes were falsified and the man responsible was the Town Clerk. This was not the first time this official had been guilty in this respect. He also claimed that such resolutions should not be given to the public until they were read at the following meeting and approved.

He also accused the Graphic representative of being in league with the Town Clerk in so far that the Graphic published the same resolution. If the resolution had been recorded as given all this loud noise about town would have been avoided. He wished to say that this committee was a "rummy Council" but he felt he could speak for every member when he said that they were all anxious to enforce the law. He would like to know what object a certain councillor had when he came to the town offices and procured a copy of that doctored resolution. It was used about town to cause strife. He wanted the words "Police force be instructed to confine their duties to civic matters" inserted in the motion as recorded on the minutes.

Coun. Wallace interrupted to say that he thought Coun. Belle-Ile was out of order. He had a correction to make in the minutes yet not agree to insert the words omitted and get with business.

The Mayor said Coun. Belle-Ile was perfectly in order.

Coun. Belle-Ile said that while perhaps Coun. Wallace might be in a hurry to get the matter over with he had a few words to say and here read lengthy extracts from the Town Bylaws to prove that so far as the enforcement of the prohibition act, or any other provincial or dominion statute was concerned, the police were obliged to enforce same within the town limits notwithstanding anything to the contrary which the council might pass. What he as mover of the resolution wished to do was to have the policemen attend strictly to their civic duties and not go out of the town limits in enforcing said laws.

Coun. Duncan agreed with Coun. Belle-Ile. He was not in favor of our policemen going out of town to enforce the law. They had enough to do to attend to their civic duties. People take exception to little mistakes. He felt that the council, which was new at the business, was anxious to have the law enforced, and should be backed up by the citizens. The council would see that the policemen and every other official would do their duty.

Coun. Patterson said that as he recollected the motion, Coun. Belle-Ile when the motion was read by the Town Clerk made some objections and the Clerk made the corrections as requested by Coun. Belle-Ile.

## PLAN CHANGES FOR CAMPBELLTON

N. B. Telephone Company Have Voted \$300,000 for Improvements.

At a meeting of the Board of Trade held at Chatham recently, Mr. W. B. Snowball is reported as stating: "That at recent meeting of N. B. Telephone Co., \$300,000 had been voted for extension and improvement of service. It was proposed to install as soon as possible the more modern ringing system in Chatham, Newcastle, Bathurst, Campbellton and Sussex and build a new exchange at Newcastle."

Mr. Boothroyd asked for an answer to his questions.

His Worship said that in the past the council had made mistakes by rushing matters through. Must get down to the bottom of the matter, when the Council would again meet the delegation. He wished to assure all that the council was extremely glad to see so many present. Were glad to get the views of the delegation and to observe that the citizens are waking up to their responsibilities. In the past they got their reports of what went on at the council meetings on the street or from the press. He would much rather see every seat filled at the meetings. As to the prohibition law he wished all to understand that there was not a man at the council board but who was in favor of the enforcement of that act. If you as citizens have any plan for the better enforcement of the law he was sure the council would be glad to hear it. He felt that in the past the wrong P. Letourneau, Mrs. John Ward and end. It was not right to go after Joseph Bellenger all of which were the poor man who bought a bottle and let the big dealer, who imported Canada, by the half car load or the barrel, so free. He was the man we should get after and strike at the root of the evil. The policemen must enforce the prohibition law. Our object was more efficiency in our police department. The matter of provincial assistance by way of paying a portion of the salaries or remitting half the fines was not a new question. It was one of several which had been handed to us by our predecessors. Why not set after the local government and try and get some assistance in this way.

Coun. Duncan said he was in favor of the full enforcement of the prohibition act. He did not believe in the law if it was now enforced, the little fellows prosecuted, the big fellows

Does "civic duties" means the full enforcement of the prohibition law? What is meant in the resolution "shall not enforce the prohibition act"?

Rev. Mr. Miller said that the citizens would judge the council by its record, but did not fear, but that its record would be a good one. He said that a serious charge had been made against the Town Clerk, a charge which he wished to state that he, and he felt sure the citizens as a whole, would not believe. In all fairness he would ask that the clerk be heard.

Coun. Belle-Ile said that there undoubtedly was discussion back and forth, and he thought that possibly the clerk might have been confused. He did not wish to imply that the Clerk would wilfully change or alter a resolution.

Coun. Patterson said that so far as he could recollect, the Town Clerk read the resolution over to the council when it was voted on.

Coun. Bissett said that when this resolution went through anything would have gone through. A very serious charge had been made against the policeman and a heated discussion had taken place from which many of the councillors had not recovered. The resolution went through very quickly and he felt sure it was not doctored by the clerk.

His Worship was sure no councillor would accuse the Town Clerk of wilfully changing a resolution. He thought the Town Clerk should be heard.

The Town Clerk was glad to learn that the councillors as a whole, and the citizens had confidence in him. When the motion complained of was made it was verbal. He was asked to read it and he had done so when Coun. Belle-Ile had made changes which his records would show. The resolution was put just as he had read it.

## DELEGATION AWAY TO CAPITALS

Will Press Bridge Matter Before Quebec and Dominion Houses.

A delegation composed of Messrs. W. D. Duncan and D. A. Stewart of the Campbellton Board of Trade, T. R. Busted and Hugh Sellers of the Municipality of Mann, left Tuesday. They have the official pledge of the New Brunswick Minister of Public Works, that this province will pay its share of the Campbellton-Cross Point bridge and are to press the matter with the Quebec government and the hope of getting a like assurance from that government, when the matter will be up to the Dominion. So far all these have admitted the necessity for the bridge and the outcome is to-day more promising than at any previous time.

He wished to say that he knew there were barrels of liquor in citizens' cellars who claim to be in favor of prohibition. His Worship asked the Town Solicitor to give his opinion of the resolution.

The Town Solicitor said that the duties of the police officers are not subject to the dictation of the council. When the council appoints a policeman, his duties are fully set forth and he must enforce all laws, dominion, provincial and civic.

Coun. Belle-Ile moved that council revert to the general orders of the day.—Carried.

The clerk read communications re taxes from Howard Sanson, Mrs. Elsie Duimont, Thos. W. Henry, John Joseph Bellenger all of which were referred to the Assessment & Appeals Committee.

The local W. C. T. U. wrote in reference to the resolution re policemen's duties passed at the last meeting. This was read and placed on file.

Departmental accounts were ordered paid.

When the electric light accounts, amounting to about \$3,000 were taken up, there was considerable discussion but they were passed.

The Public Charities Committee reported that they had under consideration the account of the Hotel Dieu and as these patients were not sent by the Poor Commissioner or the accounts authorized by him, that they be not paid.

Report received and adopted.

**DEFINITE PLEDGE FROM GOVERNMENT**

New Brunswick First to Pledge Itself to Erection of Campbellton-Cross Point Bridge

The New Brunswick government has pledged itself to provide its share towards the erection of the inter-provincial bridge between Campbellton and Cross Point.

The following letter was received by Mr. W. H. Miller Friday morning—  
Fredericton, N. B.  
March 3rd, 1921.

Sirs—  
In reply to your request made before the Government of this Province at our February meeting in the matter of the construction of an inter-provincial bridge between Campbellton and Cross Point, I beg to reply that at a meeting of the Council held yesterday, favorable consideration was given to this proposition and I was authorized by Council to place in the estimates at the next meeting of the Legislature a sum of money sufficient to pay the Province of New Brunswick's share in any initial steps that may be taken by the Federal Government and the Government of the Province of Quebec, with our own Government, with the view of the construction of this important bridge. I am pleased to be able to make known to you this decision, which means that the Province of New Brunswick is prepared to do its share and is the first of the three Governments to take definite action in the matter.

**FOUR CANADIANS**  
**AMONG THE KILLED**

Scores Were Injured—Trainsmen  
Differ in Accounts of the  
Disaster.  
PORTER, Ind., Feb. 28.—Several  
Canadians were among the victims of  
the wreck of the New York Central  
and Michigan Central passenger trains  
which occurred here last night, killing  
from thirty-five to forty people.  
Canadians identified up to 8 o'clock  
were:  
J. Collins and wife, London, Ont.  
Gordon Campbell, Revelstoke, B. C.  
Peter Kane, Regina, Sask.  
Relief crews early today had taken  
thirty-three bodies and scores of in-  
jured from the wreckage and at least  
six bodies were visible entangled in  
the debris.  
The trains crashed at the Diamond  
crossing here. The forward coaches  
of the New York Central train, which  
was westbound, lay upon the two splin-  
tered coaches of the Michigan Central  
train, through which it had plowed  
while travelling nearly fifty miles an  
hour. The darkness and tangled mass  
of wreckage made rescue work slow.  
A statement of Tererman J. C. Cook,  
chief of the Michigan Central train while  
the track was left clear for the New York  
Central.  
Railroad officials at the scene of the  
wreck said Engineer W. F. Long, of  
Jackson, Mich., who escaped unhurt,  
declared he had received a clear signal  
and had checked it with his fire-  
man. He left early today for his home.  
When the Michigan Central train  
struck the derail, six hundred feet  
from the crossing, it was the first in-  
dication he had of the impending  
crash, Long is said to have stated.

**HYPNOTIZER A LOBSTER**  
Quite accidentally F. Martin Duncan  
librarian at the Zoological Society dis-  
covered that he could hypnotize lob-  
sters. Recently before some officials of  
the society he gave a most amusing  
demonstration on his office desk in Re-  
gent's Park.  
A wild uneducated female lobster  
was selected at random from a fish-  
monger's stall for the purpose of the  
experiment. There could therefore be  
no question of a trained confederate or  
collusion. She was a big fish of  
three pounds four ounces, and the hyp-  
notist elected not to cut the string  
binding her claws, as she showed con-  
siderable liveliness.  
She "bucked" just like a mustang as  
Mr. Duncan tried to spread her tail  
out flat on the desk. He performed  
some rhythmic passes up and down her  
polished black back, and she grew  
more docile, permitting her tail to be  
unfolded. Then for two minutes the  
operator lightly massaged her back  
with the tips of his fingers until the  
lobster lost her expression of annoy-  
ed anxiety and relaxed into a benevo-  
lent trance.  
Then came the crowning moment.  
Mr. Duncan lifted the hypnotized shell  
fish and stood her on her head. With  
her two claws and nose at three points  
of support she stood motionless, for  
five minutes. After that the hypnotic  
sleep grew lighter and passed away a  
few moments later, leaving a normally  
angry lobster.  
Dr. Chalmers Mitchell, F. R. S. sec-  
retary to the Zoological Society, watch-  
ed the experiment with keen inter-  
est but could suggest no explana-  
tion. Mr. Duncan points out that some  
important nerve centres lie just under  
the shell of the back, and these may  
have something to do with the phenom-  
enon.  
He made his queer discovery when  
gathering specimens for the Marine  
Biological Laboratory at Plymouth.  
On trying to prevent an active lobster  
from crawling out of the boat his wet  
hand slipped several times on its back  
and the creature grew quieter. He re-  
peated the rubbing movement and pro-  
duced a hypnotic trance.

**ALL IN FAVOR.**  
The report of the last meeting of the Town Council, as published in this issue, will be pleasant reading for our citizens. The statements of every Councillor, made before a crowded council chamber, that they were in favor of the strict enforcement of the prohibition law, is indeed gratifying especially after the doubt caused by a certain resolution, passed at a previous meeting, which now appears even as amended, as His Worship himself admitted, was passed in a hurry and not properly worded to convey the meaning of the council. The statements of the different councillors should be convincing evidence to the police and the citizens generally that the prohibition law must be enforced, and more rigidly enforced than in the past. As the councillors severally declared that the act should be enforced it is therefore concluded that the resolution referred to above will be expunged from the minutes of council.

**EDITOR'S MAIL.**  
Campbellton, March 6th, 1921.  
Mr. Editor—  
In the report of the proceedings of the Council of Feb. 28th you did not give the public the proper interpretation of my resolution in respect to the duties of the police force.  
For instance you inferred that the object of this resolution was to allow vice and crime a free hand. Your inference is not very complimentary to the intelligence and moral standing of seven eights of the Council. It was not my intention or the intention of any of the other councillors, to prevent the enforcement of the Provincial Regulation, in respect to the Liquor Traffic.  
The Provincial Government have a highly paid staff of officers, whose duty it is to enforce that Act. They get the taxes and all the revenue derived from the sale of seized liquor. It is my opinion, shared in by hundreds of others, that if the Government use our police force, they should remunerate the Town for their services.  
We do not have any objection to the enforcement of the law, but we do object to paying our Police force to do the work others are paid for doing. The proper enforcement of the Law is the duty of the Government, and we consider that the Town of Campbellton, deriving no benefit from the fines, should not be asked to take its police force from other necessary employment.  
Commendable as the enforcement of the Regulation of the Liquor Traffic is, we consider that our Police Court of last week, gave an illustration of the neglect of the proper attention to crime which must have flourished with the knowledge of our police, either direct or indirect. It is not conceivable that debauchery of that magnitude could possibly escape the attention of two alert policemen.  
The present Mayor and Councillors are standing for the proper enforcement of all laws, but they want it understood that they are not going to share the expense without sharing the income. The police force have their duties to perform for which they are paid, and we desire them to carry on, as directed by the Town Council, and not by any clique or faction. If there is any extra work to be done by them, we consider it is only right, that the Council be notified and their consent obtained.  
We believe that our stand on this question will bring about a much more effective enforcement of the law regulating the Liquor traffic, and also give the Town of Campbellton a much more active and efficient police force.



From March 1919 to March 1920 the Debt Increased \$674,337,591.39.

Ottawa, March 2.—In the House yesterday Sir Henry Drayton tabled the report of the Deputy Minister of Finance on Public accounts for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1920. The report showed a net debt at March 31, 1920, of \$2,248,868,623.19, an increase from \$1,964,853,618.61.

Receipts on account of consolidated revenue fund for the year amounted to \$549,746,334.70, and expenditures on the same account, to \$308,843,929.99 showing a surplus of ordinary receipts over ordinary expenditures. Special expenditures were made chargeable to consolidated revenue fund amounting to \$336,943,115.15.

The net debt increased by \$674,337,591.39 over the debt as at March 31, 1919. The increase was accounted for as follows:

Special expenditures, \$336,943,115.15.

Capital expenditures, \$69,301,877.83.

Non-active assets, \$288,995,005.17.

### MANY CITIZENS AT MEETING

(Continued from page 1).

In reference to the account of the St. John County Hospital the public Charities Committee asked for additional time to get information. Request granted.

Coun. Bissett asked why the order was given for the manager of the electric light department to stop reading meters when he had read about three quarters of them.

Coun. Duncan said the order was given because some councillors thought that the resolution passed at the last meeting was effective.

Coun. Bissett—That resolution stated no definite time. There seemed to be an under current of dissatisfaction in reference to the running of the electric light department. If there was any suspicion of irregularities let us have an investigation. The manager of the electric light department had been with the town twenty-two years and had been a faithful employee. He did his duty and very ten more.

Coun. Belle-Ile said that the chairman of the Finance Committee was within his rights in ordering the Town Treasurer to order the manager of the electric light department to cease reading meters. As far as an investigation was concerned, that was coming. That was one of the objects

of the audit. Every department would be investigated.

Coun. Bissett was of the opinion that the council could not appoint a competent man to read meters, collect water rates and taxes without special legislation.

Coun. St. Onge—Why should three or four men be allowed to collect these accounts?

Coun. Patterson thought the Treasurer had authority to deputize another to act for him so long as he was responsible.

Coun. Bissett thought it a mistake for this council which was pledged to economy to think of hiring another high salaried man.

Coun. Moores moved that the matter of the appointment of a competent man to look after the reading of meters, etc. be left over until a later date and that the manager be authorized to read the meters.

The motion was lost on the following vote—For—Moore, Bissett, Patterson. Against—Duncan, Wallace, Chamberlain, St. Onge, Belle-Ile.

Coun. Duncan moved a resolution authorizing the Bank of Nova Scotia to advance the Town money on overdraft—Carried.

Coun. Duncan moved that the office hours of the Town Clerk and Treasurer be from 9 to 5 every day except Sunday and from 7 to 8 on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and that they take alternative dinner hours so that the office would be open all day—Carried.

Coun. Moores asked if the Council could not deal with the resolution re policeman's duties. The delay in dealing with this matter might interfere with the proper enforcement of the law.

Coun. Moores moved that the resolution referring to policeman's duties passed at the last meeting be rescinded.

His Worship thought that this was an important matter. Could we deal with it intelligently. If the council feels like doing this to-night it would be all right.

Coun. Duncan contended that as the duties of the policeman were set forth in the bylaws there was no need of Coun. Moores' motion. If this motion carried he would move for a systematic search of every house, from cellar to attic beginning at the lower end of the town and going to the upper.

Coun. Patterson did not think the temperance people wished any such thing. What they wanted was a reasonable enforcement of the law.

Coun. St. Onge asked if the inspector appointed by the government was carrying out the law. He knew that there were many selling liquor, selling it by the gallon who were never fined. Why were they not prosecuted. He spoke of a man going into his store and phoning to some dealer as follows:—"Have that can of sardines ready, I will be up in a few minutes for them." A little later that man came along with a gallon can of red rum under his arm. Lately the police caught a man with a few bottles of gin and he was fined \$200.00. His idea was that the man who sold those bottles of gin was the one to be fined. Get after the man who sold the liquor and we would have a better and drier town.

His Worship said that according to the Bylaws the police must enforce the law. They were bound to do this. The wording of that resolution was unfortunate, was not what was meant. What was intended was to convey the idea that the policemen were spending two-thirds of their time in enforcing one law and neglecting the others. He would suggest that the Council and citizens delegation get together and devise some measure for the proper enforcement
