DEFINITE PLEDGE FROM GOVERNMENT

New Brunswick First to Pledge Itself to Erection of Campbellton-Cross Point Bridge

The New Brunswick government has pledged itself to provide its share towards the erection of the inter-provincial bridge between Campbellton and Cross Point.

The following letter was received by Mr. W. H. Miller Friday morning:—
Fredericton, N. B.
March 3rd, 1921.

Sirs:—
In reply to your request made before the Government of this Province at our February meeting in the matter of the construction of an inter-provincial bridge between Campbellton and Cross Point, I beg to reply that at a meeting of the Council held yesterday, favorable consideration was given to this proposition and I was authorized by Council to place in the estimates at the next meeting of the Legislature a sum of money sufficient to pay the Province of New Brunswick's share in any initial steps that may be taken by the Federal Government and the Government of the Province of Quebec, with our own Government, with the view of the construction of this important bridge. I am pleased to be able to make known to you this decision, which means that the Province of New Brunswick is prepared to do its share and is the first of the three Governments to take definite action in the matter.

It is now up to the Quebec government to make a similar pledge, when the matter will be squarely up to the Dominion government.

ONE BENEFIT FROM TAXES
Undoubtedly taxes are heavy and their annual appearance causes very little delight in Chatham or elsewhere but their presence has been the means of putting out of the community things whose absence is worth ten times what we pay in taxes.

For instance, before the town was incorporated and taxation started, we pay for waterworks, electric light sewerage, police protection and all this district suffered from a veritable disease of infections and deadly diseases, typhoid, diphtheria, etc., whose toll would mean today for some families in doctors' bills far more than their taxes, to say nothing of the loss and grief caused by the death of loved ones.

Today these diseases are practically non-existent in a community of 5000 souls. Good health is always worth ten times what it may cost.

Two hydroplanes will be used for forest protection purposes during the dry season in May and June next by the Forestry Department of New Brunswick. These will patrol the forest area communicating with directional finding wireless systems located at headquarters and at Campbellton.

ALL IN FAVOR.

The report of the last meeting of the Town Council, as published in this issue, will be pleasant reading for our citizens. The statements of every Councillor, made before a crowded council chamber, that they were in favor of the strict enforcement of the prohibition law, is indeed gratifying especially after the doubt caused by a certain resolution, passed at a previous meeting, which now appears even as amended, as His Worship himself admitted, was passed in a hurry and not properly worked out to convey the meaning of the council. The statements of the different councillors should be convincing evidence to the police and the citizens generally that the prohibition law must be enforced, and more rigidly enforced than in the past. As the councillors severally declared that the act should be enforced it is therefore concluded that the resolution referred to above will be expunged from the minutes of council.

EDITOR'S MAIL.

Campbellton, March 5th, 1921.

Mr. Editor—
In the report of the proceedings of the Council of Feb. 28th you did not give the public the proper interpretation of my resolution in respect to the duties of the police force.

For instance you inferred that the object of this resolution was to allow vice and crime a free hand. Your inference is not very complimentary to the intelligence and moral standing of seven eighths of the Council. It was not my intention or the intention of any of the other councillors, to prevent the enforcement of the Provincial Regulation, in respect to the Liquor Traffic.

The Provincial Government have a highly paid staff of officers, whose duty it is to enforce that Act. They get the fines and all the revenue derived from the sale of seized liquor. It is my opinion, shared in by hundreds of others, that if the Government use our police force, they should remunerate the Town for their services. We do not have any objection to the enforcement of the law, but we do object to paying our Police force to do the work others are paid for doing. The proper enforcement of the Law is the duty of the Government, and we, consider that the Town of Campbellton, deriving no benefit from the fines, should not be asked to take its police force from other necessary employment.

Commendable as the enforcement of the Regulation of the Liquor Traffic is, we consider that our Police Court of last week, gave an illustration of the neglect of the proper attention to crime which must have flourished with the knowledge of our police, either direct or indirect. It is not conceivable that debauchery of that magnitude could possibly escape the attention of two alert policemen. The present Mayor and Councillors are standing for the proper enforcement of all laws, but they want it understood that they are not going to share the expense without sharing the income. The police force have their duties to perform for which they are paid, and we desire them to carry on, as directed by the Town Council, and not by any clique or faction. If there is any extra work to be done by them, we consider it is only right, that the Council be notified and their consent obtained.

We believe that our stand on this question will bring about a much more effective enforcement of the law regulating the Liquor traffic, and also give the Town of Campbellton a much more active and efficient police force.

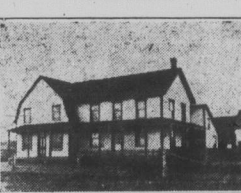

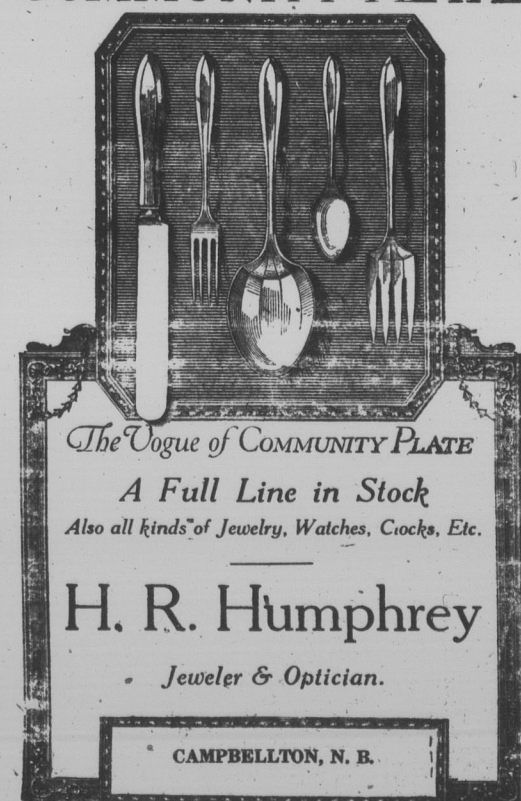

NEWSY ITEMS FROM NEARBY PLACES

Gathered by Graphic Correspondents—Contributions to this Column are Solicited from every District of the Bay Chaleur.

THE GASPE COAST

(Toronto Mail and Empire.)

One of the most romantic and least-known holiday regions in Canada is and inaccessible for the ordinary vacationist, but for the geologist, botanist, ornithologist, historian, artist and sportsman, an unfailing delight. Gaspé Peninsula forms the lower lip of the St. Lawrence. The great ocean steamers pass too far to the north to see it as they skirt the shores of Anticosti, but it is just over the horizon to the southwest. The peninsula is deeply indented on the north by Gaspé Basin and on the south by the Baie de Chaleur and on the point jutting out between them lies the picturesque village of Percé, with the famous piered rock and the Island of Bonaventure just off shore. Gaspé Basin is familiar to Canadians as the secret rendezvous of the great Canadian Armada of thirty-two troopships which sailed for England on Oct. 6, 1914.

Both the Basin and the Baie de Chaleur are known as among the first landing places of Jacques Cartier in 1534; and since that time the Gaspé coast has been better known for its cod-fishing and its extraordinary geological formation. The interior of Gaspé Peninsula is an unbroken and uninhabited wilderness of spruce and pine, a magnificent view of which may be obtained from Mont Ste. Anne, behind Percé village. The Gaspé coast is fringed with a strip of fertile farm land studded with a succession of thriving fishing villages with which is associated an interesting history. Three centuries ago the adventurous fishermen of Normandy used to sail their little ships across the Atlantic attracted by the rich cod-fishing awaiting them on the "banks" of the Gaspé coast, and from spring to winter the coast was a busy place, as the fishermen dried their fish on the shingle beaches of "flakes" of spruce and salted them down for shipment to France, the Mediterranean or South America.

The Cod Industry.

About the year 1760 the fisheries became so important that permanent settlements were formed along the coast, and to Charles Robit, a shrewd member of an old Jersey family, given credit for the organization and development of the cod-fishing industry which has flourished ever since. From the efforts of Charles Robit arose the great Charles Robit-Collins.

Co., still known as the "C. R. C." Red granite posts with "C. R. C." cut on them still mark the boundaries of their property. Like the Hudson Bay Co., it supplied the fishermen with their boats, nets, domestic supplies, etc., from the various villages, and in return the fishermen received credit for the fish they brought in. There were about thirty such stations, with headquarters at Paspébiac, on the Chaleur side, and reaching out even as far as Labrador. Apprentices were brought out from the Channel Island and trained in the cod-fishing and mercantile business.

It is not surprising that there is still a strong Channel Island atmosphere about the Gaspé coast. Jersey willows grow thick in the villages, Jersey and Guernsey are still home to many of the old and new residents, who speak the old Norman French and crisp English equally well. They bear French names, as a rule, but there are no more devoted British Imperialists in the empire than the sturdy Islanders whose proud boast is that theirs is the only part of the British Empire which has never been conquered. The little churches on the hillside, above the villages contain tombstones (cut in Jersey or Guernsey) showing the names of successive generations of historic Channel Island families, and the marriage registers of the coast clergy read like Channel Island directories. They are proud of their ancient lineage and there is a fine flavor of the Old World in their charming courtesy of speech and hospitality. Much might be written of the cod-fishing; it still flourishes, with methods little altered from those of two centuries ago. The most attractive of the villages is Percé.

A Dramatic Approach.

The background of the village is a vast amphitheatre sweeping up to the peak of Mont Ste. Anne, from which a wonderful view may be had of the sea, the forest interior, Gaspé Basin and the Baie de Chaleur. The approach by sea at early morning or in the evening is dramatic. A few hundred yards from shore, like a colossal warship advancing bow on, arises the pierced rock, a stupendous mass of limestone 150 feet long and 300 feet high, with two arches still remaining. Its origin and its fossils are magnets for geologists. To painters it is a delight and a despair; no artist will ever catch the delicate, fleeting tints which change hourly from dawn to sunset. Gulls wheel screaming around its lofty crest. Sombre cormorants pick and to and fro. To see the rock emerging from fog into the sunshine is a glimpse into fairyland. Two miles distant lies Bonaventure Island, once the haunt of privateers but now the peaceful sanctuary for myriads of sea-fowl. Gannets and Kittiwakes rest like banks of snow upon the ledges of its precipitous cliffs; puffins and murres sedately stand guard near by. Of late Canadian Government ornithologists have made valuable studies of local bird life, and for back in 1848 Sir William Logan (to whom a tablet has recently been erected in Percé) made exhaustive studies of Gaspé's

CANADA'S NET DEBT

Is \$2,248,868,623.19

From March 1919 to March 1920 the Debt Increased \$674,337,591.39.

Ottawa, March 2.—In the House yesterday Sir Henry Drayton tabled the report of the Deputy Minister of Finance on Public accounts for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1920. The report showed a net debt at March 31, 1920, of \$2,248,868,623.19, an increase from \$1,964,853,618.61.

Receipts on account of consolidated revenue fund for the year amounted to \$549,746,334.79, and expenditures on the same account, to \$305,843,929.99, showing a surplus of ordinary receipts over ordinary expenditures. Special expenditures were made chargeable to the consolidated revenue fund amounting to \$336,943,115.15.

The net debt increased by \$674,337,591.39 over the debt at March 31, 1919. The increase was accounted for as follows:

Special expenditures, \$336,943,115.15.

Capital expenditures, \$69,301,877.83.

Non-active assets, \$283,995,005.17.

MANY CITIZENS AT MEETING

(Continued from page 1.)

In reference to the account of the St. John County Hospital the public Charities Committee asked for additional time to get information. Request granted.

Coun. Bissett asked why the order was given for the manager of the electric light department to stop reading meters when he had read about three quarters of them.

Coun. Duncan said the order was given because some councillors thought that the resolution passed at the last meeting was effective.

Coun. Bissett—That resolution passed at no definite time. There seemed to be an under current of dissatisfaction in reference to the running of the electric light department. If there was any suspicion of irregularities let us have an investigation. The manager of the electric light department had been with the town twenty-two years and had been a faithful employee. He did his duty and very often more.

Coun. Belle-Ile said that the chairman of the Finance Committee was within his rights in ordering the Town Treasurer to order the manager of the electric light department to cease reading meters. As far as an investigation was concerned, that was coming. That was one of the objects

of the audit. Every department would be investigated.

Coun. Bissett was of the opinion that the council could not appoint a competent man to read meters, collect water rates and taxes without special legislation.

Coun. St. Onge—Why should three or four men be allowed to collect these accounts?

Coun. Patterson thought the Treasurer had authority to deputize another to act for him so long as he was responsible.

Coun. Bissett thought it a mistake for this council which was pledged to economy to think of hiring another high salaried man.

Coun. Moores moved that the matter of the appointment of a competent man to look after the reading of meters, etc., be left over until a later date and that the manager be authorized to read the meters.

The motion was lost on the following vote—For—Moores, Bissett, Patterson. Against—Duncan, Wallace, Chamberlain, St. Onge, Belle-Ile.

Coun. Duncan moved a resolution authorizing the Bank of Nova Scotia to advance the Town money on overdraft—Carried.

Coun. Duncan moved that the office hours of the Town Clerk and Treasurer be from 9 to 5 every day except Sunday and from 7 to 8 on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and that they take alternative dinner hours so that the office would be open all day—Carried.

Coun. Moores asked if the Council could not deal with the resolution re policemen's duties. The delay in dealing with this matter might interfere with the proper enforcement of the law.

Coun. Moores moved that the resolution referring to policemen's duties passed at the last meeting be rescinded.

His Worship thought that this was an important matter. Could we deal with it intelligently. If the council feels like doing this to-night it would be all right.

Coun. Duncan contended that as the duties of the policemen were set forth in the bylaws there was no need of Coun. Moores' motion. If this motion carried he would move for a systematic search of every house, from cellar to attic beginning at the lower end of the town and going to the upper.

Coun. Patterson did not think the temperance people wished any such thing. What they wanted was a reasonable enforcement of the law.

Coun. St. Onge asked if the inspector appointed by the government was carrying out the law. He knew that there were many selling liquor, selling it by the gallon who were never fined. Why were they not prosecuted. He spoke of a man going into his store and phoning to some dealer as follows: "Have that can of sardines ready, I will be up in a few minutes for them." A little later that man came along with a gallon can of red rum under his arm. Later the police caught a man with a few bottles of gin and he was fined \$200.00. His idea was that the man who sold those bottles of gin was the one to be fined. Get after the man who sold the liquor and we would have a better and drier town.

His Worship said that according to the Bylaws the police must enforce the law. They were bound to do this. The wording of that resolution was unfortunate, was not what was meant. What was intended was to convey the idea that the policemen were spending two-thirds of their time in enforcing one law and neglecting the others. He would suggest that the Council and citizens delegation get together and devise some measure for the proper enforcement

of the law. At the present there was no doubt the act was not enforced. It was queer that only the poor bootlegger was ever caught.

Coun. St. Onge—If we could get the government to pay the salary of another policeman he could devote his time to enforcing the prohibition law and then perhaps it would be properly enforced.

Coun. Moores thought this matter should be straightened out at once. The policemen were laboring under misapprehension at present. Let us rescind that motion and get the police back on their job.

On being put the following voted for the rescinding of the motion—Couns. Moores, Wallace, Bissett and Patterson.

Against—Duncan, Chamberlain, St. Onge, Belle-Ile.

The Mayor gave the casting vote in favor of the motion and declared the motion to be rescinded.

Coun. Belle-Ile contended that the vote was illegal as Coun. Moores had not voted with the majority when the resolution was carried.

The mayor agreed that the point was well taken and declared that the vote was out of order.

The Council then adjourned.
