St. PERISKRURG, Jan. 7.—Whole villages of Jews are bing depopulated on the precense that they are within forbidden distance of the frontier, and is some instances the villages are not really within the 50 versts. It is said that the letter of the Czarina to the Princess of Wales carnestly advises, as a matter of prudence and in the interest of humanity, English non-interference in Russia's policy toward the Jews. Behring Sea Dispute.

London, Jan. 7.—The Press Association says: Lord Salisbury is considering the 40-page dispatch received from Mr. Blaine, Dec. 30—the latest dispatch received from Washington. It does not contain a definite acceptance of Lord Salisbury's proposals for arbitration on the main question—that of the right of Eritish sealers to catch seal in the Behring Sea. Mr. Blaine discusses only the subsidiary point—arbitration on the time of closing the sealing. The Press Association adds that Mr. Blaine has not replied to Sir Julian Panneefote's note of June last, in which the latter says her Majesty's Government must hold the Government of the United States responsible for the consequences arising from acts of interference with British vessels contrary to the principles of international law. The Press Association also states that no preparations have been made to augment the British feet in the North Pacific Ocean, as such a step might be regarded as a menace.

Holiday Gifts.

London, Jan. 6.—The Queen at this season always makes a large donation to those of Windsor who are not well off. This takes of the form of beef and coal, and during the holidays which have just passed joints of beef of from three to seven pounds weight have been distributed, the size varying in accordance with the number of those who constitute the family. The total weight of these joints was a ton and a half. The other half of the gift, consisting of coal, is delivered at the houses of the recipients—so many sacks per family—and in this way 60 tens have been distributed.

Baron Rothschild has a curious fancy in regard to his new year's presents. He has a special regard for the drivers of omnibuses. The Baron lives in Piccadilly, and hundreds of 'buses pass his door every day, and he sends a brace of pheasants to each of them, who thus are enabled to enjoy a delicacy which would otherwise be quite beyond their means. In this way he distributes about 1,000 birds.

Scotch Railway Strikers Evicted from the Companies Houses.

A Glasgow dispatch says: "Seventy policemen, backed by hussars, yesterday evicted the strikers from houses belonging to the railroad companies. Many distressing scenes were witnessed. Much suffering seems in store for the families of the strikers. The evictions were generally allowed to proceed. Some houses, however, were barricaded against the evictors, and when battered upon were found crowded with people, who refused to retire, and were forcibly ejected. A few stones were thrown and there were outbursts of hooting and jeering at the officers from oulcokers. While a number of miners were returning from Motherwell, where the Caledonian Railway Company recently attempted to evict some of its striking employes from their homes, they sacked a shop in the village of Blantyre, eight miles from here. The men acted riotously, and the authorities summoned military aid to quell the disturbance. It is feared the miners' sympathy with the strikers will introduce a turbulent element into what was hitherto a comparatively orderly movement.

The disturbances caused by the evictions of the railroad strikers from the quarters provided for them by the railroad companies have not yet ceased in spite of the presence of large forces of police backed up by troops. Serious rioting was resumed today (Tuesday) at Coalbridge, nine miles from Glasgow on the Motkland Canal the chief center of iron manufacture in Scotland. They mustered at an early hour about the dormitory at Coalbridge occupied by the non-union men who have been employed in place of the strikers. After pelting the building with stones the rioters made a rush forward and stormed it. The police on duty at that spot used their batons freely, charging the strikers in spite of showers of stones hurled at them. During the conflict a number of strikers were more or less seriously injured. The rioters were finally repulsed, just as strong reinforcements of police and troops were being sent to the sc
