It has been attributed to Sir Robert Aytoun, but it is more generally believed to be the work of Trancis Sempill of Balltrees. The third song is Allan Ramsay's "Auld Lang Syne," first printed in the Tea Table Miscellany in 1724. The first record of the present in 1724. The first record of the present well-known version is in Burns' letter to Mrs. Dunlop, December 17, 1788, inclosing a copy of the verses as "an old song which has often thrilled through my scul." 
