The directors shudder to think of the discomfiture which would have been theirs had not the new buildings been erected this year. Such a flood of live stock would have swamped the old quarters. They are relieved to find that the horse stables, at least, are ample. Work is being rapidly pushed on the temporary buildings for overflow cattle, sheep and swine, and all will be comfortable housed today or tomorrow, it is expected.

MONDAY'S RING ATTRACTIONS. The complete ring attractions were given yesterday for the first time. The erowd looked smaller than it really was, on account of the enormous grand stands. The Seventh Band is playing today. THE AGRICULTURAL DISPLAY. In this prolific season it was to be expected that the display in agricultural hall would be of unparalleled merit, and such is the case. In quantity, quality and variety the exhibit excels that of any previous year. There is a magnificent display of nearly al kinds of vegetables, that of mangels and cabbages being remarkably fine. Potatoes are about the only vegetables that are not shown as extensively as in the previous years. The Indian exhibit, which occupies a large space, is highly creditable. It is chiefly in the vegetable line, but quite a lot of splendid fruit is included. The honey display is really beautiful, some of the exhibits being arranged most artistically. HORTICULTURAL HALL.

"The horticultural display," said Mr. J. S. Pearce to a reporter, "is better than it has ever been since the inauguration of the Western Fair."

The entries of flowers are largely in excess of any former year. The display of cut flowers is something unprecedented. Owing to the crush of exhibits, some of them have been placed in dairy hall. The interior of horticultural hall is both fragrant and beautiful. All the popular varieties of

plants are shown. Visitors to the hall agree that they never saw a finer collection of fruit at any Fair, either in quality or variety. Apples, especially, are magnificent, and grapes are exceptionally excellent. This has been a marvelous fruit season, and it was naturally expected that the Fair exhibit would typify the splendid yield.

DAIRY HALL.

The exhibit of butter is double the size of last year's. The entries this year number 63; in 1895 they numbered only 35. This increase is indicative of the progress that this branch of the dairy industry is making. The entries came from all parts of the Province, and even some from Quebec, showing that the reputation of the Western Fair is inter-provincial. The cheese is of much better quality than last year's, and the exhibit would have been very much larger but for the excessive heat of the last fifteen days of August, a period which supplies a large percentage of the exhibition cheese. The quality of the make was so much affected by the hot spell that many intending exhibitors were afraid to send their products for fear that the quality would be inferior. CATTLE, SHEEP AND SWINE.

As already announced, the rush of cattle, sheep and swine has almost swept the directors off their feet. Not only in numbers are the exhibits in enormous excess of any previous year, but no finer specimens were ever seen at any show. The energetic chairman of the department, Mr. Charles Tre-bilcock, is enthusiastic over the grand display, which would do credit to any exhibition on the face of the earth. In the cattle department the milking strains, the Jerseys and Ayrshires, are strains, the Jerseys and Ayrshires, are very largely represented, though all classes are to be seen. In sheep, all varieties are entered, though the coarse wool breed seems to be in the majority. The Merinos appear to be in the smallest numbers. There are many handsome Cotswolds, Southdowns, Lincolns and Leicesters. Every breed of swine is represented, and the show. of swine is represented, and the show-ing is unprecedented.

THE LADIES' DEPARTMENT. The exhibit in the ladies' department this year is away ahead of last year. Twice the space is devoted to it, and the work is particularly fine.

A change in the arrangement of the prize list has had a very beneficial effect. The display of tea cosies and toilet cushions was never greater and never finer in the history of the Fair. A great improvement is also noticeable in the lace work. Among the quilts are a few new ones and some old standbys that are familiar sights to annual visitors to the Western Fair. A truly magnificent collection of fancy work is exhibited by Messrs. Smallman & Ingram, and calls forth Smallman & Ingram, and calls forth all the superlative adjectives at the command of the visitors who examine it. It might easily pass for imported work, but the deft fingers of Miss Cockburn, of Smallman & Ingram, turned out these beautiful creations. The collection was awarded the bronze medal. There is something novel and very pretty in linen photo frames. The knitting is equal to former exhibits, both in fancy knitting and in hosiery. There are knitted and cro-chetted slippers of every color one can imagine. The work of Miss N. Bell, of Georgetown, and the Misses Pincombe, of Strathroy, captured a great many prizes. Mrs. Graham, of Toronto, exhibits largely. The superintendents of the department are Miss G. Street and Mrs. Fletcher.

Geld From British Columbia. Huge chunks of gold-bearing rocks from 20 different mines in the Ross-land Mining District, B. C., form an

exhibit of the greatest interest in these days, by reason of the recent discoveries in British Columbia which indicate that Canada will in a short time add millions to the world's supply of gold. The exhibit at the Western Fair is in charge of Messrs. Flood & Lindsay, of this city, representing A. W. Ross & Co., mining brokers, of Toronto, and are good, generous samples of the gold ore, some of the rocks weighing 400 pounds. They show quite plainly the different formation of rock in the different mines. There is also a large sample of the capping which covers the gold-bearing veins. It is greenstone, impregnated with pyritic and white iron. The ore is a massive mixture of copper and iron sulphide, and carries from one to three ounces in gold, 3 to 10 per cent copper, and a small varying amount of silver, usually less than 10 ounces, to the ton. In addition to the rock exhibits, there are some photos of parts of the mining district. There is one view of Rossland, the central town of the district, and apparently quite a desirable place to live. This town grew in less than a year from a straggling hamlet of a dozen log cabins to a prosperous town of 4,000 inhabitants, with an electric light plant, and a waterworks system. It is now noted for its quietness and respect for the laws, forming a striking contrast to the typical mining camp of the "Wild and Woolly West." The exhibit is certainly worthy the interest it excites.

### DUMPED HIS PEACHES.

Duty on the Fruit is Making Trouble at the Windsor Ferry.

Windsor, Sept. 15.-The Dominion Government levies a duty of 1 cent a pound on peaches imported into Can-ada, and scores of people who were taking over small baskets from Detroit yesterday were stopped at the custom house and made to pay a duty that in most cases was almost as great as the original price of the fruit. One man was so indignant that rather than pay he walked to the river and dumped

the peaches in, basket and all. The officers took him into the custom house and accused him of destroying property belonging to her Majesty's customs, for it has been decided by the courts that once an article has been landed on the wharven it is the property of the customs department until it is released. They threatened to arrest him, but he finally effected a compromise by paying the duty on the drowned peaches. Several other persons refused to pay the duty and allowed their fruit to be confiscated. It will lie in the custom house until it rots, and then it will be dumped into the river.


