HELPLESS RUMANIA GIVEN UNTIL NIGHT TO ENTER TEUTONS' PEACE CONFERENCE

Second Demand Made On Cornered Nation By the Central Powers To Take Up Negotiations Towards Ending War.

Amsterdam, Feb. 13.-The Berlin Tageblatt says that the central powers have addressed a demand to Rumania to enter peace negotiations and requested an answer by this evening. The newspaper says the demand did not take the form of an ultimatum with an inherent threat.

Late last week some of the German newspapers printed reports that Field Marshal Mackensen had sent an ultimatum to Rumania on February 6, demanding that peace negotiations be begun within four days.

Field Marshal von Mackensen, says a Berlin semiofficial telegram, is negotiating with the Rumanian army command regarding the continuation of the armistice. It is necessary to clear up the armistice question, says the message, owing to the present relations between the Okraine and Rumania. It denies that Germany has issued any ultimatum to Rumania.

New Draft To Be Ordered Under Military Service Act.

GOVT. STATEMENT COMING

Ottawa, Feb. 13.—It is stated that the Government will soon give out returns showing the result of compulsory military service, the number of men in khaki from the different military districts, and the numbers who may be available in the coming spring. The anticipated official statement, it is understood, is now under consideration, and may be issued shortly. Pending the issue of the official statement any returns published, it is stated, must be regarded as purely speculative. It may be taken for granted, however, that the issue of a statement, especially in view of the situation on both eastern and western fronts, must lead to a further call under the terms of the Military Service Act.

Great reluctance, he says, is manifested in Austria toward the prospect of fighting British and American troops on the western front.

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





YEAR AFTER END OF WAR LIMIT SET TO LEGISLATURE'S LIFE

Leaders Agree on Terms of the Bill.

PASSES FIRST READING

Lieutenant-Governor Can Dissolve Assembly Earlier if He Desires.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, Feb. 12 .- No time has been lost by Sir William Hearst and Mr. Proudfoot, the Opposition leader, In agreeing on the terms of the bill to extend the life of the present Parliament. The bill, as moved by Sir William this afternoon and seconded by Mr. Proudfoot, and given the first reading, provided for the extension of the Legislature until "after the close of the present war, the return of the Canadian forces serving overseas with the military and naval services of Canada and of Great Britain and of her allies, and until one year has elapsed, and a session of the Legislature has been held after a date certified by the minister of militia and defence, or declared by the governor-in-council to be the date of the return of the last of such forces transported from overseas by the Government of Canada."

Premier Explains.



Accused Agrees to Remit Amount Over-Charged.

The charge of levying excessive costs in connection with the seizure of goods for taxes has been withdrawn against J. D. Wilson, tax collector, Adelaide Township, an adjustment having been made in connection with the dispute. The case was to have been heard by Squire Chittick on Thursday morning. The charge was laid under the Assessment Act on information furnished by Edward Schweitzer, whose goods had been seized and sold for taxes.

Wilson agreed to refund any charges in excess of the amounts allowed by law. "All she wants," Premier Orlando declared, "and no less, and she can wish for no more, than the security of her national boundaries by land and sea and also the fulfillment of her national unity. unity.

"It is materially seen how Italy's citizens view the war question by the fact that the unfinished national loan already has brought in three and a half billion lire, and it will, within a fortnight, be double any previous loan—all this money despite our defeat last fall. Italians are determined to fight until victory."

ARTILLERY OF BOTH SIDES ACTIVE, SAYS FRENCH STATEMENT Four German Planes Brought

Down on Monday.

Paris, Feb. 12.—The war office announcement tonight reads:

"Both artilleries were active in Champagne, in the regions of the Monts on the right bank of the Meuse, and at several points in the Vosges. There was no infantry action.

"On February 11 four German airplanes were brought down by our pilots. In addition our aviators carried out various bombardments. Nine tons of projectiles were dropped on enemy depots, railway stations and cantonments, notably the Metz-Sablons station, where a fire broke out.

"Eastern Theatre, Feb. 11.—There was artillery activity west of the Vardar and northwest of Monastir. Enemy reconnaissances were repulsed in the upper Skumbi Valley.

"Belgian communication.—On the night of February 9-10, one of our patrols penetrated shelters for machine guns communication and returned to our lines, bringing back a German machine gun. 

NEW TAXES FOR FRANCE TO MEET BIG DEFICIT

Paris, Feb. 13 .- Faced with a probable deficit of 239,000,000 francs for the first three months of 1918, including in terest on the public debt, Finance Minister Klotz has addressed a proposal owing tax increases:

Income tax to be increased from twelve and one-half to fourteen per cent; stamp tax on marriage contracts, legal documents and so forth, from 25 centimes to 50 centimes; wine, beer and cider, an increase of two francs hectolitre; hygienic drinks, 90 centin wines, 50 centimes; cider, 100 per cent lncrease; sugar, 50 per cent, and vinega an increase of 10 centimes per litre.
