### LIGHTNING CAUSES MORE FOREST FIRES IN WESTERN STATES

Hundreds of Acres of Valuable Timber Consumed by Flames.

## THOUSANDS FIGHTING FIRE

High Wind Overcomes Temporary Advantage Gained in Same Areas.

San Francisco, July 24.—Much of the Pacific northwest was under a pall of smoke from grass forest fires burning today in Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon. Lightning was responsible for a number of new blazes reported, and high wind in many places overcame the temporary advantage, brought about by the slight rainfall which accompanied the thunderstorms, to the thousands of fire fighters who have been for weeks waging an almost ceaseless struggle against the flames.

In Western Montana and Northern Idaho, according to forest officials, there San Francisco, July 24.—Much of the Pacific northwest was under a pall of Idaho, according to forest officials, there have been 612 fires since June 10. About 2,500 men are employed in fighting the fires in that territory. A change in the wind last night brought temporare in the wind last hight brought temporary safety to the little town of St. Regis, Montanal which, for several days, had been threatened by fires on three sides. The most serious fire, to the north of St. Regis, covered an area of thirty miles in circumference.

Three crews of 300 men each, were fighting a fire along a fifteen-mile from in the Blackfeet forest, adjoining Glacier National on the west. It had covered 15,000 acres, and the only hope of extinguishing it was said to be in a heavy rainfall.

London, July 24.—Hon, Austen Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer, concluded the debate on the third reading of the finance bill, Wedgewood Benn ing of the mance hill, weagewood bein moved its rejection on the ground that it initiated a system of colonial preference. J. J. Wilson also objected to the extension of a preference to mandated territories. Mr. Chamberlain, in reply, territories. Mr. Chamberlain, in reply declared that it was not proposed tha declared that it was not proposed that we take for ourselves in a mandated country an advantage which was not open to any other members of the league of nations, but in respect to the mandatories' relationships we would give them in our markets something we did not give to all the world outside. (Cheers.) We contemplated favoring import into this country of goods from mandated territories. We were not securing any selfish advantage for ourselves in the markets of mandated territory and were not doing for the produce of the mandated country anything which any other nation might not do in its own market if it so pleased. If this budget was referred to in the future with any word of praise or commendation it would be because for the first time it established the principle of imperial preference by legislative act.



#### 80,000 GALLONS OF **GASOLINE EXPLODE;** FOUR ARE INJURED

Cause of Accident at Bayonne, N. J., Plant Not Yet Determined.

CONTAINED IN EIGHT CARS

Entire Plant For Some Time Appeared To Be Doomed To Destruction.

Bayonne, N. J., July 24.—Eighty thousand gallons of gasoline, contained in eight tank cars, exploded on the switching track of the Texas Oil Comswitching track of the Texas Oil Company here this morning, causing a fire which resulted in the serious injury of four persons, with many others suffering minor burns. The property loss to the company was heavy. The cause of the first explosion has not been determined. The first car exploded about 7 o'clock, and the flames enveloped the other cars before they could be removed from the danger zone.

Explosions spread to two sto houses containing about 15,000 gallons of oll in cans, as well as the filling room, where the tanks are filled, and for a time it appeared that the entire plant of the oil company was doomed.

# RUSSIAN TROOPS ON FRONT MUTINY, SURRENDER TOWN

British Government Receives Dispatch From Major-General Ironsides, Who Declares He Has Situation Well in Hand and Believes Fresh British Volunteers Will Bring About

London, July 24.—The Government has received a dispatch from Major-Gen. William E. Ironside, commander-in-chief on the Archangel front, stating that the Russian troops have mutinied and joined the Bolsheviki, handing over the town of Onega and the Onega front to the enemy. The latter also tried to take the railroad front, but were repulsed.

### **MUCH FOOD GOES TO COLD STORAGE EVEN** IF PRICES ARE HIGH

Cost of Living Commissioner Submits Report to Minister of Labor.

NO SHORTAGE EXPECTED

Eggs and Meats Are Being Put Away in Large Quantities.

OTTAWA, July 23 .- That stocks o ing the month of June, notwithstanding the high prices, and on July 1 we had 10,365,116 pounds of creamery and 1,000,634 pounds of dairy butter. This is a total of nearly 2,000,000 pounds above July 1 of last year. There should be no shortage here next winter if exports are not too heavy, although this is less than one-half of our requirements for next winter. Oleomargarine in storage is only 421,584 pounds, which is, as usual, less than two weeks market requirements. The cheese in storage amounts to 9,312,910 pounds. As in the case of butter, the heavy flow of milk in June has had a large effect upon the stocks, and we now have approximately the same quantity on hand as on July 1, 1918.

Eggs Coming in Freely.
Eggs are also coming into storage more freely than last year in soite of

begs are also coming into storage more freely than last year in spite of the high prices, but apparently not so freely as two years ago. The stocks of pork on hand in process of cure and in storage are just about equal to the average for these last two years. If our domestic trade were the only matter to be considered we have enough on hand today for five months.

The stocks of beef are 40.31 per cent less than last month, but greater than normally at this time of year. The price of beef animals is not so high as earlier in the season, and the prices for the meat have been advancing remarkably and this in spite of the fact that the reports from both London and Chicago have indicated that the world situation warranted a decline rather than an advance. The largest portion of the beef in storage is frozen, of which we have 15,737,658 pounds; cured beef amounts to 604,173 pounds; cured beef amounts to 604,173 pounds, and the quantity in process of cure is 397,972 pounds.







In that event it is doubtful if the genuine ownership of a newspaper would become known, for secret agreements may be made that give nominal

For instance if it could be proven that at the present time there existed in the House of Commons what is known as an "insurance ring" among members of Parliament, by means of which great industries allotted their insurance to member-agents, would that



At present the barber shops close at 7:30 p.m., while the shoe stores are allowed to be kept open all night.
