Sebastopol, Nov. 4.—Russian Bolshevik troops are unsuccessfully attacking the line held by Gen. Wrangel's army south of Perekop. The Soviet army is battering at the seven-mile trench system which extends east and west across the narrow neck of land leading to the Crimean Peninsula, but Gen. Wrangel's position is quite strong. It has on its left the Gulf of Perekop and on its left the Gulf of Sivash, or Putrid Sea. Back of his main lines, Gen. Wrangel has heavy naval guns and other artillery.

The town of Perekop, which has been ccupied by the Bolsheviki, is a mass of ruins.

BACK CIVIC PETITION ACHES FOR THREE M. P. P.'S

terview Government On ... Matter-Clerk's Request.

LECTURES PROMISED

Western Professors To Teach Labor—Carpenters Sorry For Hill's Action.

The Trades and Labor Council at its egular meeting last evening decided to send the necessary number of members on the deputation to interview the Government for the purpose of increasing London's provincial representation from one member to three. A letter asking the council to appoint the delean hour at all street inter-sections, and gates was received from City Clerk Samuel Baker but the number required was not stated. The cause of this side of Queen's avenue from Richmond street to Waterloo street, and also on the driveways at the hospitals. Chief Birrell said that Queen's avenue was greatly congested at night by care drawn up at the London Club, the Masonic Temple and the Winter Garden. He intimated that more stringent measures would be taken to enforce parking regulations on Dundas street between Wellington and Ridout streets and on Richmond between the G. T. R. tracks and Fullarton street.

There is no objection to cars being parked for a reasonable length of time in this area during the day time, the chief said, but cars parked at night while the owners are in theatres congest traffic unnecessarily. Enough police will be placed on duty to take the numbers of all cars parked for more than an hour in this area at night.

That Left Turn.

The advisability of prohibiting the left turn at Dundas and Richmond streets was discussed again. Most of the committee thought that the traffic was not sufficient to warrant such a regulation.

The Provincial Government will be petitioned to pass a measure requiring a head and tail light on all vehicles. A bylaw of this kind for the city was suggested. Chief Birrell pointed out that it would be of little use, because of the number of vehicles coming here from the surrounding district which which not here will not be subject to the law. NOISE PROOF PHONE PERFECTED IN LONDON

London. Nov. 2. — Harnessing the human larynx in such a way that it is possible to carry on a conversation direct from the throat instead of the mouth is the latest thing in telephonic advancement, now being exhibited in London.

An advantage claimed for the "Laryngaphone" is that it is unaffected by external noises, no sound but the human voice being heard.

The transmitter is about the size of a wrist watch. It gathers up the vibrations direct from the vocal chords when it is placed in contact with the throat and the sounds are plainly heard in the receiver.

A special apparatus has been designed for fire brigades, enabling a superintendent to be in constant touch with his masked men, and to converse with them readily. Hosemen working on ladders and roof tops can keep in telephone touch with those working in other parts of the burning building. The invention can also be used between chauffeur and motor car passenger, hetween air pilot and passenger in noisy workshops, in railway tunnels and in marine engine rooms. The submarine worker can talk to the men at the surface or to another diver below.

RULE RUSSIA

Alliance Is Likely To Direct East.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 3. While the Japanese are extending their occupation of Siberia, the peaceful penetration of Russia by the Germans is proceeding apace, and it is with the Germans that the Japenese expect eventually to make terms, and perhaps eventually to make terms, and pernaps an alliance.

This is the information brought to Washington today by Col. Frank R. Blunt, the Chicago railway executive, who has just returned from two and a half years' service with John F. Stevens' American engineers corps in reorganizing and operating the Trans-Siberian Railroad, Col. Blunt left with Mr. Stevens in Harbin, Manchuria, a detailed report of his observations of actual conditions not only in Siberia but in Russia proper under the soviet regime.

"There is no blinking the fact that "There is no blinking the fact that Germany is actively engaged in paying the way to acquire domination of Russia," said Col. Blunt tonight. "During the two and a half years I spent in Siberia I witnessed the arrival of Germans in ever increasing numbers, and the same phenomenon attracted the attention of many other American railway men stationed at various

railway men stationed at various points on the Trans-Siberian line." making Peaceful Invasion.

"I also know that Germany's peaceful invasion of Siberia is greatly exceeded in extent by the same movement in Russia proper, into which I penetrated as far as 140 miles west of the Urals. Germany is sending thousands of shrewd men into the Soviet republic, where they are settling and gaining the confidence of the Russians.

"In fact it was not until I got into

HYDRO PARLEY BRINGS NO MORE **POWER AS YET**

Meighen Government Refuses To Cut Off Export of Energy.

CORRESPONDENCE

Foster Contends That Hydro Commission Itself Is Exporting Most.

TORONTO, Nov. 3.—Matters with regard to the negotiations between the Ontario Government and the Electric Development Company for the required 25,000 horsepower additional power for the Hydro-Electric Power Commission were in about the same state tonight as they were last night.

The verbal offer of Sir William Mac-Kenzie, president of the Electrical Development Company, made on Tuesday to Premier Drury, to give relief to the extent of 15,700 horsepower, and suggesting that instead of linking up with the hydro-electric system the company should take over the hydro commission's contracts to that extent was to have been submitted in a memorandum but the memorandum had not reached the Government tonight. It was thought that it might be received tomorrow.

Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the Ontarlo Hydro-Electric Power Commission, today ridiculed Sir William Mac-Kenzie's claim that to link up with the hydro system might mean the Electrical Development Company's plant. He pointed out that for years the Electrical Development Company had delivered power to the Ontarlo Power Company, now owned by the Hydro Commission.

As to Sir William's contention that the most power his company could supply to the Hydro Commission was 15,700 horsepower, it is recalled by hydro engineers that there is on record a report of three judges who acted as a commission of inquiry that at one time the Electrical Development Company was exceeding its legal limit of 125,000 horsepower by 20,000 horsepower or more.

MEIGHEN GOVT. REFUSES TO CUT POWER EXPORT

OTTAWA, Nov. 3.—(By Canadian Press).—The Government today made public the correspondence with the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission with regard to the export of Niagara power from Ontario.

On October 6, Sir Adam Beck wrote Sir George Foster, complaining that the Toronto Power Company would not renew a contract with the commission for the supply of 13,000 horse-power and asking that the license of the company to export power be cancelled unless this block of power, and a block of 18,000 horse-power and asking that the license of the company to export power be cancelled unless this block of power, and a block of 18,000 horse-power presently under export on a contract about to

Sir George Foster sent Major Graham Beli, C.M.G., deputy minister of rallways and canals, to Toronto to go into the matter personally with the Toronto Power Company and the hydro commission. As a result, Major Bell reported that the block of 13,000 horsepower referred to by the chairman of the hydro-electric commission was required by the Toronto Power Company for use of its own customers in Canada, and that the hydro-electric commission had been notified in 1917 that the contract could not be renewed on expiration. It was true that the Toronto Power Company was exporting 18,000 horsepower out of a total development of 125,000, but the hydro-electric commission itself was exporting 50,000 horsepower out of a development of 200,000.

If the Government were eo accede to these requests the hydro Power Commission itself would be most affected and the Toronto Power Company is supplying more of its power to Canadian consumers than either the hydro or the Canadian Niagara Power Company."

The world over, the tendency in prices is downward. But coupled with that tendency, and no doubt checking it to some considerable extent, may be found efforts to reduce gradually and this is wise. To see in full play the clash of interests over the buying and selling of necessities of life one must, however, observe what is going on in Germany today.

Present prices of some of the common comnodities in Berlin are: Tomatoes, 12 cents a pound, white cabbage, 31/2 cents a pound; pears 26 cents a pound; eating apples, 26 cents a ound; salt, 5 cents a pound; cheese, \$1,34 a ound; marmalade, 78 cents a pound; geese, \$2.85 a pound; chicken, \$2.45 a pound; herring, 13 cents a pound; sausage, \$1.65 a pound. Potatoes form the staple diet of the poor. They are selling at 31/2 cents a pound. Milk, meat and bread are still rationed by the Government. The quantity of meat issued per person, however, is so small as to be almost negligible. For a family of five people the ration is considerably less than two pounds a week. SOME SUGGESTIONS ON DEMURRAGE. [Monetary Times.]

Over 71,000 days of demurrage were charged on freight cars in Canada during the month of June this year. This means 71,000 car-days wasted over and above the usual three days free time allowance for loading, unloading and clearing the customs. sum paid by shippers for this demurrage was \$186,791-or say \$2,000,000 a year. There are in Canada about 200,000 freight cars available for 30 days per month, or, in railway parlance, 6,000,000 car-days. Approximately 71,000 of these are accounted for by the above-mentioned delays, or say 1.1 per cent of the month's freight-carrying capacity of the Canadian railways. While these delays do not occur simultaneously, the effect in the end is as expensive as would be the total cessation of freight loading in Canada for a period of say, four days each year. Conversely, if such delays do not occur (and most of them need not occur), the railways would be in a position to move,

DAM KETTLE CREEK TO SECURE WATER FOR RAILWAY CITY

Scheme Recommended by Joint Meeting For Consideration of Ratepayers.

WILL COST \$200,000

Plans Include Purchase of 600 Acres of Land Along Creek.

ST. THOMAS, Nov. 3.-A system that will conserve the water supply, having its source in the territory bordering Kettle Creek, was approved tonight by s joint meeting of the water board and representatives of the city council, the board of trade and trade and labor

council.

Three plans were submitted, that of wells, Lake Erie and a concrete dam for storage. The latter was recommended as the most feasible and economical. The Lake Erie scheme at an outlay of \$450,000 with its high cost of maintenance was not favored. It meant, said Clerk Perry, that the rate would be doubled or an alternative of an addition of six mills on the dollar, annually. The expenses in securing a supply from wells was not considered satisfactory. After thorough and comparative discussion of the merits of all possible schemes the meeting endorsed the proposed plan of storage of water in Kettle Creek, by means of a dam or series of dams, as suggested by the experts employed, and will recommend it to the citizens as a solution of the question of a sufficient supply for all purposes for at least a population of 50,000.

The probable cost of the storage system was given as \$200,000; of this \$40,000 on the dam proper, \$17,500 on cost of a bridge near the McBain road, and the balance for miscellaneous expenditures. An area of 600 acres will be secured

The dam would be constructed above the creek where it crosses the Edgeware road, and would be large enough to hold 6,000,000 gallons of water.

The owners of the property adjacent to the sources of supply will be called to confer with the board in regard to adjustment of prices. A bylaw to raise the necessary sum will be given the ratepayers at the municipal elections. New Regiment Filling Up.

There are many rumors of a possible change in the Soviet Government through the admission of non-Bolshevists to high positions in order to give the government a coalition form and facilitate the efforts to gain recognition by the facility of the sovernment and solution form and facilitate the efforts to gain recognition by the foreign powers and speed up the movement for a resumption of trade relations.

Reports that the Russian Soviet Government is tottering to its fall were characterized by Ludwig A. C. K. Martens, Bolshevist "ambassador" in New York, as a "barrage of propagandas." He declared that the trade agreement between Russia and Great Britain, for which the Bolshevist delegation headed by Leonid Krassin went to London to negotiate, will be signed soon.







LIGHT CROPS CAUSE **FAMINE SWEEP OVER CHINESE PROVINCES**

ens 20,000,000 Unless Help Comes.

PEKING, Nov. 1.—(By the Associated Four Million Gallons Per Day Press).-Famine conditions in Chihli. Shansi, Shantung and Honan provinces, due to repeated light crops, followed by almost complete failure this summer are reported by investigators to be the worst in years. It is estimated that 20,000,000 people are in peril of death from starvation and disease during the coming winter unless help on a large scale is afforded. Thousands of families are already afoot making their way northward in the hope of finding food and employment. Others are selling their belongings piecemeal to procure food at greatly-advanced prices. cure food at greatly-advanced prices. Farm and draught animals are being disposed of for a song for lack of fodder to keep them and fuel to cook them if slaughtered.



If Purified Could Be Used.

Preliminary reports on the possibility of using sulphur water to augment the city's drinking supply may be available for the public utilities commission when it meets Friday afternoon. According to present opinions at least four million gallons could be obtained from this source. Large supplies of this kind of water are said to be available 150 feet below the surface of any part of London.
