MARAKOFF THANKS HIS MEN.

A Port Arthur dispatch says: 'Grand Duke Cyril, cousin of the Emperor, has arrived here. Vice-Admiral Marakoff today visited the torpedo boat destroyers which participated in the fight with the Japanese on March 10, and warmly thanked the officers and crew for their splendid behavior. The admiral distributed decorations.' The Czar will receive the German and Swiss military attaches at St. Petersburg, who leave for the front Friday, these being the first of the foreign attaches to go.




