

Two Life-boats Of Wreck Of Steamer Ashore At Christian Island

#### THE DETAILS ARE GIVEN

Owen Sound, Nov. 29.—The reported finding of wreckage from the steamer J. H. Jones was confirmed yesterday morning, when a letter was received by Mayor Joyes from Rev. John Wilson, Methodist missionary, and teacher of the Indian School at Christian Island, which leaves no room for doubt as to the fate of the boat.

Rev. Mr. Wilson gives details as to the wreckage found, which includes two lifeboats bearing the name J. H. Jones, and part of a wheel house. He adds that the northwestern shore of the island is strewn for miles.

A rumor was current yesterday that Captain Crawford, Engineer Shaw and a passenger had been found, still living, on Barrier Island, but so far no foundation can be found for the report. It is, however, possible.





## ROSS DEAL

Late Premier's Bond Bargain Which Colleagnes Killed

DISPOSING OF BONDS

Toronto, Nov. 29.—Hon. A. J. Matheson, Provincial Treasurer, announced yesterday that the whole of the T. & N. O. Railway loan of \$3,000,000 had been subscribed, the last cheques, for \$168,000 and \$3,000, having arrived in the morning.

The loan is at 3 1-2 per cent., and is free from provincial taxes and succession dues. Nearly the whole amount was subscribed in Ontario, and only \$100,000 went outside Canada, to an American insurance company, which placed it on deposit in Ottawa.

The accrued interest since July is more than sufficient to pay the advertising account and for engraving the bonds, and no commission was incurred, as the Government handled the affair direct. "I could not at first locate the correspondence, but finally found it in the railway office. From it I found that \$1,000,000 had been sold at \$91.31, with the guarantee of the province. This is nearly 5 per cent. lower a rate than Mr. Ross undertook to condemn last session.

"The parties who tendered were notified of the acceptance of their offer, but I understand that, subsequently, certain of Mr. Ross' colleagues raised objection, and the tenderers were persuaded to withdraw after being accepted.



Sir Wilfrid Laurier regretted that he could not go so far as his hon. friend from South York, but he agreed with him that the resources of Canada shovid be preserved for the people. He could only at present go as far as municipal ownership. He was not prepared to say that the exportation of electric power should not be prohibited, but counselled awaiting the report of the Waterways Commission.

No Need to Delay.

R. L. Borden: I hardly think the Prime Minister (Sir Wilfrid Laurier) is well advised in the view he has expressed as to the necessity for delay. In fact that was not the opinion of the Government last year. Hon. members will recollect that a bill was introduced by the Minister of Justice to deal with the very question which the Prime Minister now says cannot be dealt with until the report of the commission is received. Though that bill was withdrawn, its withdrawal was for quite other reasons than that suggests. No Need to Delay. was withdrawn, its withdrawal was for quite other reasons than that suggested by the Prime Minister, and he did not think the consideration mentioned by the Prime Minister a paramount one. Mr. Borden declared himself opposed to locking up power, and to the "pernicious practice of floating watered stock."

There are several witnesse who will be called to-day, after which Mr. Gardiner will undertake his own defence.
