A parcel of moderate-sized Oak and of fair quality has been sold by auction at 2s 1144 per foot, and other pareds have been sold at a lower rate. Large sized Oak of first quality is always in request; such logs would bring 3s 6d per foot. A parcel of Elm of fair quality has been sold at 2s 4d per foot, but for small quantities 2s 6d per foot is obtained. Ash may be quoted at 16d per foot.—There has been a better demand for Quebec Standard Staves, and they have improved in price; fair specifications have long the 15th of 55 per m. and all pipe lengths 560 per m. Puncheons Staves beang mere abundant, do not improve in price; White Oak may be quoted at £17 to £18 per m. and Red Oak at £14 to £16 per m. St. Jehn's Hogshead Staves bring £8 per m.
