Another weekly journal, which still retains its high literary character, has fallen so low in circulation that the loss by ter, has fallen so low in circulation that the loss to it is now about £25 weekly. A third weekly paper of some note, in the attempt to established which at least £12,000 were expended, is also for sale, but none, I presume, who inquire into the position of the property, will make any offer for it.
