
Frightful Congestion.

Despite their genius for organisation, their lines of communication must now be frghtfully congested. The evacuation of the wounded and the return of "empties" cannot but seriously interfere with the replenishment of ammunition, and now the sitflation is complicated by the necessity of supplying the troops with winter kit.

Take the item of blankets alone. How is it humanly possible to distribute 1,000,000 blankets to the German troops under the present conditions? Remember that the supply of reinforcements and ammunition must be constant. Otherwise all is lost. Already the enemy's transport service is trained to the breaking-point. Under this added weight it must collapse. This would mean the beginning of the end.
