London, Feb. 18.-Again the British have struck on both sides of the Ancre, cutting a wide gap in the German lines and pushing within a few hundred yards of Petit Miraumont. A successful attack

It was another of the thoroughly-planned attacks the British have delivered recently on the Somme-Ancre front, far different from trench raids. Its main object was to push closer to the immediate objectives of Miraumont and Petit Miraumont, north and south respectively of the Ancre and on the road to Bapaume. On Sunday the Germans tried to regain the positions taken from them by the British, but their attempts were fruitless. Attacking in waves, the Germans came under the concentrated fire of the British guns and were swept back to their trenches, suffering heavy casualties. At no place did the attacking forces reach the British line, and the British suffered no casualties. The British captured 780

London, Feb. 18.—By a series of attacks uniformly successful the British in Mesopotamia have tightened their hold upon the defences of Kut-el-Amara. Turkish resistance was almost paralyzed on Thursday and Friday, and the capture of almost 2,000 prisoners. including high officers, and much war material, is reported by the

This spoil, unusually large for the Mesopotamian fighting, fell into British hands as a result of assaults upon the strong Turkish fortifications on both banks of the Tigris where it winds about Kut. 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

Sergt. Amirkanian The tragedy of Armenia, Sergt Amirkanian pointed out in his onening remarks, was not the tragedy of one man, not that of one house, but of over eight hundred thousand slaughtered women and children, of thousands of ruined and desolate homes. There was an ancient tradition that Armenia had been the site of the Garden of Eden, and the tragedy of Armenia to-day was that of a ruined Paradise.

For centuries the Turk had been the oppressor of Armenia, but dur-ing the past forty or fifty years the sufferings of that country had been brought about by the German foreign policy. The speaker reviewed briefly the Armenian Massacres of the past forty years, pointing out that in each instance German influence had been directly responsible for the outrages:

Eleven years ago the speaker had come to Canada, after having been thrown into prison in Armenia at the age of 17 years because he struggled for the freedom of his country. BERNSTORFF BLAMED For Lack of Tact in Dealing With American Gov-

Paris, Feb. 18.—I hear from a very good source that the news of the diplomatic rupture with the United States arrived like a bombshell in the

Imeprial circles at Potsdam. New tension with Washington after the submarine note was expected. but nothing as drastic as a rupture. On the same morning (Feb. 3) a cablegram from Count von Bernstorff announced that a new note from President Wilson might be expected, but nothing else.

The emperor received news of the

rupture as he was sitting down to the table and flew into a violent rage, so those who were in touch with Potsdam circles affirmed.

Remarks made by the Empress to her intimates gave the latter to un-derstand that the Imperial wrath

was directed principally against von Bernstorff. The Empress complained that the Emperor's representatives at Washington invariably created misunderstandings, and had always been man lacking in tact, especially in handling "the hypocritical Eng-lish pastor at Washington," meanng President Wilson.

Chancellor von Bethmann-Holl-weg finally managed to appease the Kaiser taking up von Bernstorff's The Emperor ordered the Chan-cellor to do all that was possible to avoid making matters worse. This would explain the memorandum, transmitted by the Swiss Minister, is being prompted by von Berntorff, following a message from the

WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Suskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Dutles—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions.

A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre

Dutles—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead tent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his home-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

A settler who has exhausted his home-stead right may take a purchased home-stead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per

acre.

Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.
