## The Question of Immigration.

A SUGGESTION AS TO HOW COUNTRY STOREKEEPERS COULD HELP TO BUILD UP THEIR OWN COMMUNITIES. TRY IT.

There is one thing we are all agreed upon, in the Maritime Provinces, which is that we want more people. As a matter of provincial pride we cannot afford to have two constituencies made into one (as has already happened) for purposes of representation in the Federal House. Besides, a very important side to the question is its bearing on business. The more people we have the more business there will be. As it seems to be important in these days of continually increasing expenses for the merchant to do more business in the year than he did in the preceding one, it is hard to see how any profit, the question of population has an important bearing on the success of anyone in the Maritime Provinces who conducts a store.

Now, we have talked about this immigration question a great deal and everyone is agreed that it is most important. The next thing is, what practical movement can we make to help it along? Resolutions by boards of trade, are all right in an educative way, but are not sufficient to bring the desired results. The provincial government of Nova Scotia is spending a small amount of money and getting a fair return. No doubt they should spend more than they do, but the province would approve even if they spent four or five times what they are spending at the present time. But we want even more than that. The Federal Government must give a better share of attention to the Maritime Provinces.

The West has held the centre of the stage so long that we in the Maritime Provinces have been completely overshadowed. We want a vigorous immigration campaign at the expense of the Federal Government. But this and the other policy mentioned are still not enough. We must still have individual effort by communities.

These communities must co-operate with provincial and federal authorities, and this brings us to a point in the discussion where we might very well ask ourselves the question: Who in these communities is to do this duty? Who will feel that it is his duty to do it? And who will feel that there is anything in it for him?

Let us take an imaginary illustration. Let us call it the district of Blankville. It is a fruit growing section, let us suppose, and over 90 per cent. of its population is agricultural—fruit growers—the balance being storekeepers and others who make a living by serving the people in various ways. Now, most of these growers are fruit growers with small holdings. They have no more land than they hope to develop themselves. So perhaps with few exceptions there is no chance to find enough accommodation for another family by splitting the farm up. The only thing one of these men could do would be to sell out his farm if the new man came in, and go elsewhere. This, of course, is not what we want to do. The policy of the country should be to hold the

## Neckwear for Christmas Presents.

A pretty side frill is made by sewing Valenciennes in various one inch and a half wide to a strip of fine batiste or handkerchief linen. The strip should be nine inches by twenty seven, and it should be side plaited. Put it into a bind ten inches long, make it nine inches at the top, and let it taper to an inch at the bottom.

A side frill of black and white malinette is very smart. Since the material is practically impervious to damp, any work upon it is well worth while. For a wide side frill buy three-quarters of a yard of black and the same amount of white. Cut a strip 18 inches wide by 27 inches long of each color, and after folding them to make strips nine inches wide have them knife-plaited. To a strip of any pretty lace long enough to reach from neck to belt, sew your two plaited white one underneath. Have the frill nine inches at the top, tapering quickly to nothing. Cover your strip of lace with a double fold of black malinette.

This frill may be worn with any plain silk waist. To make it more elaborate, add a small butterfly bow of the plaited black and white malinette.

Even newer than the wide side frill are elaborate jabots edged with lace. They are for afternoon wear. Now is the time to use any handkerchief too handsome for ordinary use; for a lace-edged handkerchief can be folded to make an adorable jabot. Fold it diagonally with one end to the neck and the other, plait the wide part together with a knot of black velvet. This makes a bow with four sides.

## Two Cheese Sandwiches.

Here are the recipes of two kinds of cheese sandwiches: Cut some thin slices of buttered bread (brown or white) and make them up as sandwiches, with a filling of cream cheese mixed with chopped nuts or almonds. So much for recipe number one.

## Where Women Vote.

New Zealand and South Australia were pioneers among the British possessions in granting votes to women. In New Zealand the voting franchise was first exercised by women in 1863 and has since continued. The women have now voted in six general elections there, and appear to enjoy the privilege. Sometimes a larger proportion of the women than of the men whose names are on the electoral roll turn out to vote. The fact of women voting also appears to have a stimulating effect in bringing out the masculine vote.

At the first election in which both men and women voted in 1893 there were 82 per cent of the qualified women who voted and 67 per cent of the qualified men. In 1908 the proportions were 81 per cent of the men and 78 per cent of the women. This proportion depends somewhat upon the principal question at issue in an election, the women sometimes taking a strong interest in matters in regard to which men are indifferent, and vice versa.

As regards the fear that voting might lead to women neglecting their domestic duties and the care of their children it is pointed out that while the birth-rate is declining in almost all other countries, it is advancing in New Zealand and official statistics show that in New Zealand and South Australia, where women have been voting for eighteen years, the infant mortality is the lowest in the world. So the voting mothers appear to take good care of their babies.

## Editorial Chat.

It seems too bad that the popular young representative of this county at Ottawa has failed to please that dignified and aged, though somewhat behind the time journal, the Yarmouth Herald. The Herald objects to Mr. Foster being styled the brilliant young Conservative member for Kings. The Liberal organ in this county also professed to be disappointed in Mr. Foster on nomination day although we suspect the real disappointment came to the Chronicle a week later. That Mr. Foster fails to please his political opponents may not, after all, be regarded as detrimental to him. It will be his aim, we predict, to make good, however, in the eyes of his friends and supporters.

An interesting case relating to Stipendiary Magistrates is to be argued before the full bench of the Supreme Court in Halifax in January. An appeal is being made from a Stipendiary's decision in a liquor case in Yarmouth on the ground that the Stipendiary had appointed stipendiary Sir John Thompson having given an opinion to this effect a number of years ago. Mr. J. J. Power, K. C., of Halifax, is responsible for this ground of appeal. It is needless to say that if it is sustained a good deal of confusion will reign for a time in civic court business in Nova Scotia.

In an address on 'Fraternity Among Baptists' given at a recent meeting of the Massachusetts Baptist Missionary Society, Dr. A. K. DeBolis said: 'We need a Social Conscience, that feeling of Unity which is a mighty power. The past few years there has been a great approach to this among our Baptist people. We have emphasized local self government in church polity but there is a federal principle also which is essential to complete church life. We are many members, but one people. We need this unity of spirit and action to meet the evils of the age.'

Picared in all the offices of the recently deceased owner and editor of the New York World, Mr. Joseph Pulitzer, was the legend, 'Accuracy, terseness, accuracy.' He insisted that even words should be used sparingly. It was a grave wrong, in his eyes, to use four words where two would do. He not only objected to the waste of time in writing unnecessary words, and the waste of space in printing them, but held that the terse form of words had better effect. And he was right.

At the present rate of progress, it will have taken months before a jury is secured and the actual trial of the McNamara in Los Angeles can proceed. Without endangering the cause of justice or minimizing the interests at stake, twelve men capable of trying the case could probably have been found weeks ago had such a procedure suited the general strategy of the prosecution and the defence.

The late census of the United States shows that the percentage of colored people in the whole population is decreasing. Thirty years ago men classified as white constituted 86 per cent of the whole; in 1910 they constituted about 90 per cent. Moreover, the blacks while they increased in number between 1900 and 1910, did so at a lesser rate than in the previous ten years.

Mr. N. Curry, of Montreal, formerly of Amherst, who recently gave the magnificent sum of \$25,000 to Acadia University, has again exhibited his generosity by the gift of a like sum to the endowment fund of McGill.

Yesterday was Thanksgiving Day in the United States. It was a beautiful day here.

## Canadian Birth Greatest Qualification.

Andrew Bonar Law, the New Unionist Leader in the House of Commons, made his first speech as a leader at the annual conference of the Conservative Association of Great Britain at Leeds.

His speech was straightforward and businesslike, without any remarkable oratory. He called on the Unionists to work for the turning of the government, to fight against the disestablishment of the Anglican Church in Wales, and against Home rule and for the tariff. He made much of the Government's dependence upon Irish party and emphasized his remarks by saying:

'If there is one national Ireland there are two which are separated from each other far more acutely than either is separated from the English.' He urged a tariff as a means of raising the general level of wages, though he did not pretend that a tariff was a cure for all evils. He held that it was a help for the greatest of them, namely a chronic lack of employment for working men.

Mr. Law dwelt at length upon the Canadian elections which he believed would be a landmark in the world's history paying a warm tribute to Premier Laurier as being the first to give preference to Great Britain and thereby setting an example to be followed by the other Dominions. His admiration for Sir Wilfrid Laurier was not abated a jot, when he rejoiced at the result of the elections.

It was an ignorant and impudent claim, he said, that the elections did not bear upon the cause of preference. They were, and are an emphatic reminder that reciprocal preference is the aim of Great Britain's autonomous dominions. The Canadians through the electoral decision, had done their part; it was up to the Old Country now, he said.

He regarded his Canadian birth and early training as one of the greatest of whatever qualification he might have for the leadership of the Unionist Party.

The Conservatives are apparently on the crest of popular favor these days. Eleven years ago the Dominion and nearly all the Provinces were under Liberal leadership. Manitoba fell into the Conservative Column in 1900, British Columbia in 1902 Ontario in 1905, New Brunswick in 1908 and have so remained.

This year came the great overturn in federal affairs replacing Sir Wilfrid Laurier by Mr. Borden as First Minister and yet Nova Scotia, Quebec, Saskatchewan and Alberta retain their Liberal Governments. The recent bye elections in Prince Edward Island place that 'right little party' in the Conservative column.

It is not surprising that the Liberal party is taking advantage of the big vote in the general election, following which an announcement Mr. McKay, the Liberal leader for the Province has been chosen to succeed him. The party is meditating a new policy along with its new leader, but apparently with little hope of winning a victory in the coming election.

In the meantime in Alberta, a province hitherto almost solidly Liberal, four bye-elections have recently been held and Conservative representatives have been returned in place of our Liberals who held the seats before. How much further the pendulum will swing can only be guessed at present.

## West, Not All Roses.

A letter written by a former New Brunswick who is now out west in Saskatchewan, has several statements of much interest to would be settlers in the west.

The letter was written Oct. 5th, and among other things the writer says:

'Well, we are having awfully wet weather. It is just a chance it all the grain is threshed this fall. There are millions of acres that are so wet they will be able to do nothing with it and some places they have not finished cutting yet. Farming here is very different from N. B. farming. You have to work the ground so as to step the crops from being too heavy. Wheat sometimes turns out 50 bushels to the acre; some farmers have 100 acres. Then, it is very uncertain; the frost comes so early that it grain is not ripe it gets frozen and every year there are hail storms that spoil the crops. Sometimes these are so severe that the ground just looks as if it was plowed and a farmer has a hard time to find where he had that large crop of wheat. The hail is sometimes as large as hens' eggs and has been known to kill horses on the prairie, so you see that farming is a better business in N. B. Wages are good, but farm produce is almost given away; potatoes 15 cents a bushel and hay is 30 c a ton.'

These are statements which every western farmer should weigh before he makes up his mind to 'try the west.'

4. Believing that the beverage use of intoxicating liquors is productive of insalubrious evils in the province, we respectfully request the management of all political and social gatherings to make no provision for the use of the same.

5. Having learned that at the military conference in Ottawa, it was proposed that the sale of alcoholic drinks be permitted in connection with the canteen service in the Canadian militia, the Nova Scotia Temperance Alliance most earnestly protests against such action.
