On Sunday last, after a long and useful life, there passed away one of Wolfville's oldest and most esteemed residents, Mrs. Robert Schofield. The deceased was 87 years of age last December and retained her physical and mental powers to a remarkable degree. Death was due to an attack of pneumonia notwithstanding loving and untiring care. The deceased was formerly Miss Emma Pick, daughter of the late James Pick, of Black River, where she resided after her marriage until twelve years ago when she came to Wolfville to make her home. Her husband, the late Robert Schofield, predeceased her three years ago last January. Mrs. Schofield made many warm friends during her long life and was held in very high regard by all. She is survived by three sons, Howard, of Winnipeg; Emerson, living in Connecticut; and Otis, at Gasperau; and four daughters, Mrs. (Dr.) Cowern, of St. Paul, Minn.; Mrs. Holmes, of Wakefield, Mass.; Mrs. Redden, of Wolfville; and Miss Emma, at home.

The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon, the service being conducted by Rev. Dr. MacDonald. Rev. Dr. Gates, a former pastor, gave an appreciative and fitting address, and Rev. M. P. Freeman made the closing prayer. The interment was deferred until Wednesday morning to enable members of the family to arrive.

Notes and Comments

General Sir Arthur Currie has been offered and has accepted the Principalship of McGill University.

The scarcity of potatoes in the Maritime Provinces arises from Yankee buyers, who have been down here in droves picking up everything for sale.

Review of Reviews, in the following brief paragraph, gives due recognition to the local weekly newspapers as a medium of peculiar value to the man who would get the attention of the people of his community:

"Country weeklies are pre-eminently the home papers of newspaperdom. They are not hurriedly scanned while men travel to business, then left to brakemen to gather up. They go directly to homes where their reading is a duty as well as a pleasure. Hence their peculiar value as an advertising medium."

Food prices will continue to be high for several years. At least this will be true if prices are governed by the supply. Dr. J. W. Robertson, than whom there is no better authority anywhere, addressing the parliamentary committee on agriculture and colonization at Ottawa recently, said it would take at least two big crops to catch up to anything like the normal supplies of breadstuffs, ten years to attain the pre-war status on milk products, and four or five years for beef products. Dr. Robertson went at length into his experiences overseas, reiterating his statements that prices were dependent entirely upon world conditions. Increased production in Canada would not lower prices because of the continued abnormal demand.

According to a Horse Act passed in the year 1912, entitled "An Act for the Encouragement of Horse Breeding in Nova Scotia, amended in Chapter 20, of the Acts of 1918, it is illegal for any party or parties to offer a stallion for public service in the Province of Nova Scotia unless such stallion is duly enrolled with the Department of Agriculture. Such stallion must be enrolled either as a Pure Bred, Grade or Scrub, depending upon which class he belongs to. It may not be generally known but none the less it is the law of this country, that no charge made for the service of any stallion not enrolled shall be recoverable by any action or proceedings. Parties interested in Horse Breeding are referred to advertisement in another column of this paper, in which will be found the names of horses and their owners that have been enrolled in this county for the current year.

7. Music tends to encourage a higher form of citizenship.
8. Music is a powerful curative for mental, moral and physical ailments.

Grand Operatic Concert

Mr. Wadsworth Provandie, one of America's foremost baritones, and Miss Lina Tufts, one of America's noted pianists, are coming to Wolfville and will appear at College Hall, on May 22nd, giving a joint operatic concert, which promises to be the best concert ever heard in Wolfville. Mr. Provandie and Miss Tufts are visiting the provinces and during their sojourn here, they are giving a series of concerts in the principal cities.

Mr. Provandie is a young American possessing a pure rich baritone voice of great power and extended range, singing as he does an A-natural with the ease of a tenor, and the great DeRaszke, of Paris, termed Provandie the King of Baritones.

Mr. Provandie studied singing with Arthur J. Hubbard, of Boston, and went to Europe in 1919 to open his operatic career there, and after a few weeks in Paris, he was offered the role of Germont in "Traviata" at the Covent Garden, London, where he made a decided success. He subsequently sang in the leading Opera Houses in France and Italy, where his success was instant and unquestioned.

His American debut after returning from Europe was made with Mme. Matzemur, Metropolitan Contralto at the famous Worcester Festival. Since then he has been re-engaged for that festival three consecutive seasons.

In an interview Prof. Willani, of Milan, Italy, told the N. Y. World the following: "In Provandie, America has sent us as great a baritone as was ever heard anywhere. He is not only a wonderful singer but one of the best actors I have ever seen in charge."

Miss Lina Tufts, the noted pianist, made her first appearance before the public at the age of seven years, showing even then decided musical ability, and at the age of nine appeared at a musical given by her teacher, Mme. Antoinette Szumowski, the eminent Polish pianist, with whom she studied for years. She also studied with the great American pianist, Alexander Lambert, of N. Y.

Miss Tufts has the distinction of playing before Paderewski, the greatest pianist in the world, who called her his grand-daughter at the piano. She is a masterful performer.

New Canadian One Cent Piece

Authority has been given for the issue of the new Canadian cent on and after May 15. The coin will not, however, actually be in circulation until the last of the month. The cent will be slightly larger than the Canadian ten cent piece or three-quarters of an inch in diameter. It will bear the following design: Obverse impression—His Majesty's crowned effigy, consisting of head and bust, wearing the royal robes, and looking to left with the inscription "George V. del. Rex et ind. imp."

Reverse impression—The words "one cent" supported by a maple leaf on either side, and bearing the word "Canada" above and the date below.

"Ten Commandments For The Motorist"

Reprinted from 1919 edition of the Motor Vehicle Laws, New York.

1. Don't forget to slow down at street intersections. It may save a human life.
2. Don't forget to look to the right and left before passing a railroad crossing.
3. Don't forget, when signalled by a vehicle in your rear, to turn slightly to the right and allow such vehicle to pass on your left.
4. Don't forget the pedestrians. They too have rights on the streets and highways.
5. Don't forget to use extra precautions when you see a child crossing a highway.
6. Don't forget that in case of accident you must stop immediately and give your name, address, and license number to the injured party or police. If no police officer is in the vicinity, report to the nearest police station or judicial officer.
7. Don't forget that all motor vehicles must be equipped with adequate brake horns or other signalling devices.
8. Don't forget that your lights must be lit within half an hour after sunset.
9. Don't forget that Safety First saves life and limb and often your temper.
10. Remember the A. P. C. of Motorists—Always Be Careful.

The St. John Exhibition is again going to hold a show and has fixed its dates at September 4th to 11th inclusive. This will be the first Exhibition to be held in St. John since 1914 as the Exhibition plant has, for the last five years, been employed for Military purposes. Sunflower's Many Virtues

Every part of the sunflower has some economic value. The leaves form a cattle food and the stems contain a fibre which may be used successfully in making paper. The pith of the sunflower stalk is the lightest substance known; its specific gravity is 0.028, while that of elder is 0.09 and cork 0.21. The discovery of the extreme lightness of the pith of the stalk has essentially increased the commercial value of the plant. This light cellular substance is now carefully removed from the stalks and applied to many important uses. One of its chief uses is the making of life-saving appliances.

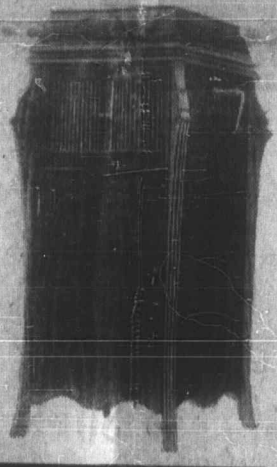

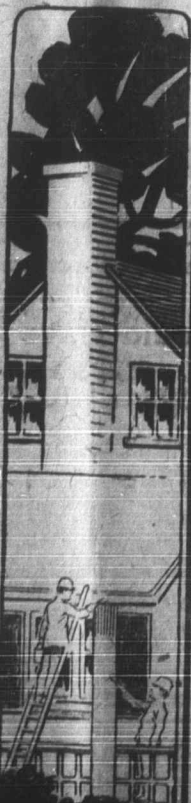

To the Editor of THE ACADIAN

DEAR SIR,—THE ACADIAN finds me every week and is read with no small interest, bringing, as it does, news of the old home town, second to none, in my humble opinion. To judge from reports contained in this little messenger, Wolfville surely is forging ahead. It would almost appear that the climax had been reached, or covered, by the numerous clubs, leagues and societies. I admire the spirit that has the general good at heart, all success to it; but as I read these reports from week to week I am more than surprised at the lack of interest in one branch of improvement necessary, to me the most important of all, and I am not alone in my opinion. I refer to the cemetery which, save a very meagre report of the annual meeting, "slimly attended", we are told, receives not even a passing notice in the pages of your paper. Being a resident of Wolfville when this fine tract of land was presented to the town by the late J. W. Barss, I became much interested in its up-keep, an interest that has strengthened with the years, because of those who were of my nearest and dearest, laid to rest there. "Beautiful for situation" may well be said of Willow Bank, but is that enough for a resting place wherein lie our blessed dead? "Nay, truly" will be the response of all. Why the inhabitants of a town, noted for its beautiful homes with esthetic surroundings and cultured tastes, tolerate such conditions, is a question not easy to answer. Perhaps you can explain it, Mr. Editor, as others fail to. "To forget our dead is to neglect the living", is an old saying.

But it is little use to criticize, unless some remedy is offered, so, at the risk of being lengthy, I venture to suggest that the Civic Club, the Social Service Club, and the other and sundry societies aiming at the betterment of the town, make a grand rally and place this first on their list of improvements. Surely the public spirited citizens are not all dead! Just wake them up. Get behind the directors of the Cemetery Co., and you will be surprised, doubtless, at the generous response. "Just waiting to be asked" so to speak. Let it be a forward movement in deed and truth. Show your interest and be a helper, not knocker. Interest inspires, where indifference kills and disheartens. I note the return of the secretary, R. E. Harris. If he is the live wire I remember him to have been in his own business in days past, he will not fall down on this undertaking, but rejoice in the privilege of reclaiming the waste place and thereby handing his name down to posterity, as a promoter of good in the highest degree. Go to it, friends, and let us all help and encourage those who try to make Willow Bank cemetery worthy the name of God's acre, and second to none in the province of Nova Scotia.

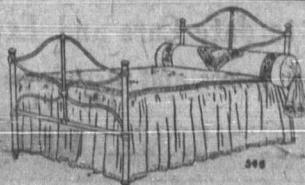
