ALLIES QUIETLY WAITING FOR THE EXPIRING OF TIME LIMIT FOR HUNS

Enemy Becomes Angry Over Terms Imposed but has Little Option but to Sign the Peace Treaty.

LONDON, June 18.—A period of waiting has settled over the peace conference in Paris while the Germans at Weimar are making up their minds whether to accept or reject the recently arranged treaty of peace which ended at Versailles on Monday.

While the Germans are discussing the situation President Wilson is to make his long promised visit to Belgium and David Lloyd George, the British prime minister will go over the Verdun battlefield.

Expected More Concessions. A telephonic message received at Weimar from Versailles shortly after the treaty and the note were placed in the hands of the Germans characterized them as extraordinarily rough and overbearing.

At last accounts Berlin was in ignorance of the terms of the treaty and although M. Clemenceau's note was being received it was feared that there would be a delay in informing the public of the terms of the peace.

SINN FEIN COUNTESS GIVEN FOUR MONTHS

MALLCOW, Ireland, June 18.—The Countess Georgiana Markievicz, Sinn Fein leader, and the only woman member of the British Parliament was sentenced to four months' imprisonment today on charges growing out of disorders in Cork on May 17.

MONTREAL, June 18.—The Canadian Railway War Board, handling the entire matter for Canadian railway lines reported that the railways would continue to operate without any inconvenience for a time at least in the event of a strike.

PARIS MOB STONES GERMAN DELEGATE

PARIS, June 18.—Dr. Theodor Melchior, one of the five principal delegates, and Frau Dorblinsh, one of the Secretaries to the German peace delegation, were struck on the head by stones during a demonstration against the German delegates when they departed from Versailles last night.

MEXICO IS SILENT

FOREST FIRES IN NEWFOUNDLAND

CANADA'S ARMY 10,000

Bill in House Provides for Doubling Dominion's Regular Force. OTTAWA, Ont., June 18.—Major General S. C. McBurn, minister of militia has introduced a bill in the house of commons amending the militia act to increase the permanent force of the Dominion from 5,000 to 10,000 all ranks.

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MONTREAL HIT HARD

Over Twenty Thousand Men on Strike in That City

MONTREAL, June 18.—Four thousand employees of the Dominion Textile company in Montreal struck yesterday for higher wages and shorter hours. A strike, which may spread to the whole of the building trades here, was started this morning by electrical workers. Four hundred men were affected. There are now 20,000 strikers in Montreal.

LABOR AGAINST RECOGNITION FOR SOVIET RUSSIA

American Federation Engages in Bitter Debate and Refuses to Support General Strike in United States on July 4th. ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 18.—Amid general uproar, delegates attending the convention here of the American Federation of Labor have refused to endorse recognition of the Soviet Russia, although urging recognition by the United States of the existing Irish Republic, and voted against the general strike proposed for July 4th in behalf of Thomas J. Mooney, convicted in connection with the preparation of day bomb explosion in San Francisco.

DISCUSSION OF BOLSHIEVISM DEVELOPED

When the resolution committee reported a resolution asking withdrawal from Russia of American soldiers but refused to report other resolutions demanding recognition of Soviet Russia and lifting the blockade of Russian ports. The committee refused to endorse recognition of the Soviet Russia until the people of that country by constituent or other form of national assembly, shall have established a truly democratic form of government.

American Travellers Want Private Ownership

The Traffic Club of New York, with a membership of eleven hundred, of which the majority consists of users of the transportation systems of the country, has adopted the following resolution:

MARKETING OF POULTRY PRODUCTS

(Experimental Farms Note.) Marketing has much to do with the success or failure of any poultry plant. No matter how successfully the plant may be run, if the marketing end of the business is not properly looked after, the whole enterprise will sooner or later end in failure.

TABLE POULTRY — Immediately following the spring lay, the flock should be gone over and all useless cock birds and those hens that show they intend to rest for the summer, should be put into crates and fed heavily for a week or ten days, and then sent to market either live or dressed according to market requirements.

ROASTERS — In the general purpose breeds such as Plymouth Rocks and Wyandottes, the main crop of cockerels should be held for roasting. These should be crated fed for from ten days to two weeks or even four weeks, according to requirements.

FARM LOANS for SOLDIERS

Agricultural Training For Soldier Settlers

A SOLDIER is entitled to the benefits of the Soldier Settlement Act if he can satisfy the Agricultural Qualification Committee in his district that—

- (a) He has performed the required military service; (b) He is sincere in his intention to make farming his permanent occupation; (c) He is physically capable and is fitted in general to make a success of the farming business.

When a settler is deemed qualified by the Agricultural Qualification Committee, the Board will assist him to become established on a farm of his own, and will, through its Agricultural Advisers, continue to co-operate with him in his work, thereby ensuring his success and consequent ability to discharge his obligations and become permanently established.

Training Centres For Soldier Settlers

The applicant who is recommended for instruction in agriculture may first be sent to a Training Centre, specially operated for the purpose, where he will learn, by practical experience, how to handle and feed horses and other live stock; milking; the operation of farm machinery, ploughing, etc.; general farm building work; farm blacksmithing; the different kinds of soil and rotation of crops; the selection and judging of live stock and the marketing of farm products.

PATENT MEDICINES

Government Will Test Those Said to Contain Alcohol

In the very near future all patent medicines being sold in Canada will be given a thorough test by government experts and all medicines containing alcohol in any form above a certain percentage will be listed and only allowed to be sold in minimum quantities, according to a report from Toronto. The Canada food board has arranged to have a committee appointed by the government to carry on this work. Certain patent medicines widely advertised are said to contain a large quantity of spirits and it is in order to stop the sale of these that the food board has decided to test all patent medicines. Medicines when listed will be sold in small quantities and the buyers will have to sign for each bottle. The sales of the medicines are then inspected by the government officials.

MIDLAND SHIPBUILDING PLANT CLOSES DOWN

Striking Iron Workers Refuse Both Offers Made By the Company

MIDLAND, June 18.—After ten days of negotiations between the striking iron workers and the officials of the Midland Shipbuilding Company the plant closed down last night. The strike started on the 6th, when 175 men walked out because the company refused to grant a 44 hour week and an increased scale. Two proposals were made by the company: first, that the men take over the boat now under construction for the Imperial Government and work such hours as they decided upon, the boat to be completed by a named date, the men to receive their present wages in the meantime and a bonus at the appointed date. The other proposal was that the iron work should be completed for a lump sum, to be divided as the employees saw fit. Both offers were refused and the plant is therefore closed down, affecting 305 men who were drawing weekly wages totaling \$9,000.

WHAT'S TRUMP IN POULTRY

NEWS OF FEATHERED WORLD

Items of Interest and Aids to Success
—Seasonable Talks and Timely
Hints.

Cool spots where the chicks can
retire during the heat of the day
must be provided if they do not al-
ready exist. Chicks that are forced
to spend their day in the blazing sun
and their nights in badly ventilated
or over crowded coops stand a poor
chance of developing into anything
like profit earning stock, much less
into show birds. Over crowding is
responsible for most of the summer
troubles of the young stock and lack
of shade will account for the rest.
Chicks that are stunted at any time
during their growing period rarely
fully recover and attain their proper
size. The pullet that does not come
up to the standard weight is hand-
capped in competition and may not
prove as good a layer as nature in-
tended her to be.

Under the best possible conditions
chicks grow but slowly during the
heat of the summer. Under any but
the best care they will be liable to
stand still in the matter of growth.
Grain fed that does not make a re-
turn in growth adds to the expense
of producing a mature bird. To be
successful in raising chicks all hand-
icaps must be removed, and every-
thing calculated to hasten strong,
healthy development must be pro-
vided. Shade during the day and
well ventilated, roomy quarters at
night are necessary, especially during
such weather as we have been hav-
ing, and are likely to have for the
next two or three months.

TIPS TO HOUSEWIVES

A delicious filling for a sponge
roll is a cream paste of mashed al-
monds and honey.

An excellent crust to use for a
meat pie is the ordinary baking
powder biscuit crust.

Use a soapstone as a flatiron stand
on ironing day. The irons retain their
heat longer.

Honey is not only cheaper than
sugar, but it is actually better in
some kinds of cooking.

'Tis well to have a pitcher for left-
over pancake batter. Bread crumbs
and crumbs, cereals and milk may go
into it.

You can refresh the Oriental rugs

The Silo In Western Canada



On a Western Cattle Ranch.

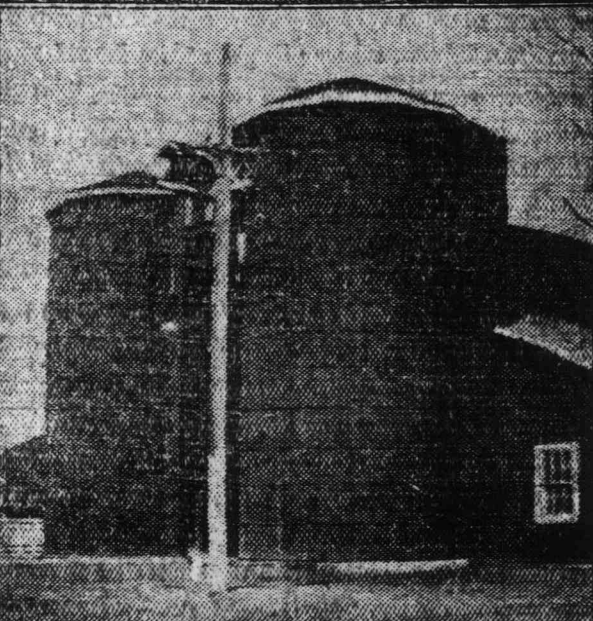
To raise two head of cattle where only one could
otherwise be raised—that is what thousands of farmers
all over the American continent have been able to do
with the help of silos. It is no wonder, then, that as
the land in Western Canada is becoming more settled,
silos should be making their appearance in greater and
greater numbers there. Already in Manitoba many
farmers are beginning to look upon the silo as a ne-
cessary part of the farm, and more than a hundred of
them are in use in various parts of the province. Sta-
katchewan and Alberta, together have probably about
half the number as Manitoba, and the number in all the
provinces is being slowly but surely added to every
year.

With plenty of unoccupied prairie land growing an
abundance of nutritious grasses the cattle feed prob-
lem in Western Canada has not been a really difficult one
in the past. During the summer months the stock could
forage over a large section of the country and there
was no need for the owner to compute how many acres
would support a cow. The obtaining of winter feed
was just a matter of energy—a man could have as much
hay as he could cut, free for the cutting. With such
conditions as these, and they still prevail in many parts
of the country, the need for silos has not been greatly
felt up to now.

But the days of free range are drawing to a close.
Already there are parts of the country where little or
none is to be had. And as the country is getting more
and more settled, and, moreover, as a system of mixed
farming is becoming the rule throughout every pro-
vince, even in those parts where for many years
straight grain growing was practiced, the need for some
additional means of ensuring a steady supply of feed all
the year round is beginning to make itself felt in various
parts of Western Canada.

Silos will, therefore, continue to spring up through-
out the country. Near Lacombe, Alberta, a ranching
company, which has made a great reputation for the
quality of its beef production, is contemplating the erec-
tion of four new silos this year. This company has
found with the silos it is in use that it can maintain
double the number of cattle hitherto supported on the
same area of land. Many smaller farmers are having
the same experience. It is, as one farmer aptly ex-
pressed it, "like getting another farm for nothing."
In times not long past, it was not difficult to get a
farm for nothing or "next to nothing" almost anywhere
in Western Canada, and although land is still very cheap
compared with its productive capacity, it is not always
easy for a farmer in older settled districts to expand,
and the only thing for him to do to increase his pro-
duction, and thus his prosperity, is to intensify his
methods. That this stage is being reached in some
districts is a good sign for the future development
of the country.

In the large irrigated area in Southern Alberta east
of the growing city of Calgary, there is on foot a move-
ment that may eventually lead to the establishment of
silos on most of the farms in this territory. It is a
country admirably suited for dairying and other

branches of the livestock industry, capable of produc-
ing sufficient food for the support of hundreds of thou-
sands of horses, cattle, sheep or swine. Most of the
farms are for Western Canada, on the small side,
generally from 80 to 320 acres each. But the soil is
wonderfully fertile, and with an assured supply of water
made possible by irrigation, will grow abundant
crops of grain and fodders, including wheat, oats, bar-
ley, alfalfa, various kinds of grasses and clovers, and
also roots and vegetables. For ensilage purposes, corn,
sunflowers, alfalfa, peas, oats and many other crops
can be grown. In years to come this part of Alberta
will be one of the greatest food producing areas in the
world.

What crops are used for ensilage purposes in West-
ern Canada? In Manitoba corn is mostly used, but
in Alberta peas and oats are most popular. Other
crops used are sudan grass, millets, rape, buckwheat
and alfalfa. Sunflower is also being tried, but as
present it is only in the experimental stage. The silo-
crop with which peas and oats are grown, the enormous
yields and high feeding value of the mixture, to-
gether with its succulence, palatability and flavour, ac-
count for its popularity and it will always maintain a
leading place with the farmers of the most westerly
of the Prairie Provinces, no matter what strides may
be made in the growth of suitable varieties of crops.

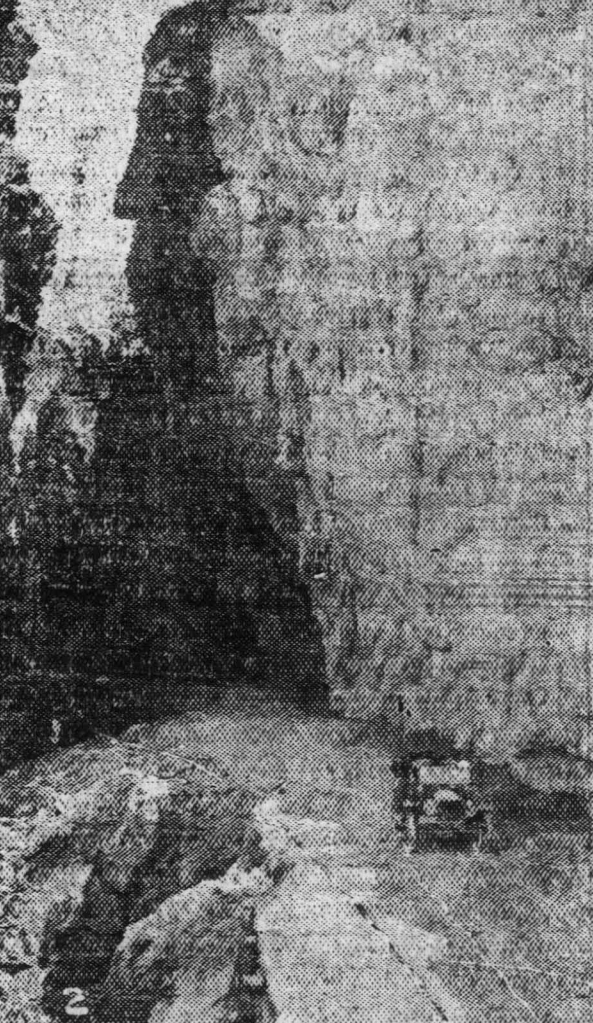
Silos are coming to stay in Western Canada. Their
appearance in slowly increasing numbers is a land-
mark in the development of the country. As they in-
crease in numbers the prosperity of the country will
grow, and, as one far-sighted man has put it, "Western
Canada will then not only be the granary of the world,
but a universal provisioner as well."

Highway of the Great Divide



In Canada, opening up an Alpine
region of entrancing beauty. It will
be possible to motor from Calgary to
Windermere between Banff and
Spokane through a hundred miles of the
most glorious scenery in North Amer-
ica. A good automobile road runs
south to Fort Steele and Cranbrook,
and from Cranbrook there are excel-
lent roads to Spokane, or eastwards
through the Crow's Nest Pass, and
back to Calgary. The Good Roads
Association of Alberta is enthusiastic
over the prospect as this will mean
the advent of many tourists from all
over America. The new road will also
be of great benefit to the Upper-Colu-
mbia Valley which has many attrac-
tions for settlers on account of the
fertility of the soil and suitability for
mixed farming. This valley is served
by the Kootenay Central Railway, a
recently constructed branch of the
Canadian Pacific.

Between Banff, the popular summer
resort in the Canadian Pacific Rock-
ies and Lake Windermere, the head
waters of the great Columbia
River, lies an Alpine ridge of
spectacular beauty, forming part
of the Great Divide. This ridge
is penetrated by two comparatively
easy passes, the Simpson, and the Ver-
million which lead into the Valley of
the Kootenay River, a region abound-
ing in game on account of its being
well south of the main line of the
Canadian Pacific Railway. Between
the Kootenay River and the Columbia
River is a small range of mountains
through which the Sinclair Pass and
Canyon provide an easy road. When
the first surveys were made for an
automobile road between Banff and
Windermere it was planned to use the
Simpson Pass, named after Sir George
Simpson, Governor of the Hudson's
Bay Company, who made this crossing
in 1841. But the route over the Ver-
million was found to be easier and at
the same time more beautiful, and con-
struction of the Highway of the Great
Divide was commenced from opposite
Castle Mountain in this direction. At
the same time the road from Wind-
ermere through the Sinclair Canyon was
also commenced and at the time of
the outbreak of war a gap of only
thirty miles separated the two roads.
War put an end to construction, and
a gap of about seventy miles
miles of the western end, so that the
project seemed to have been abandoned.
Now, however, the Dominion Govern-
ment has made an arrangement with
the British Columbia Government by
which the route of the road comes un-
der the jurisdiction of the Dominion
Parliament, and a substantial appropriation
has been allotted to finish the work.
In this way there is every prospect of
the early completion of what will be
the most wonderful automobile road

DEMPSEY DIPPED THE BEAM AT 201

Challenger was Glad Only in Swimming Suit and Boxing Shoes. Weighing One Pound

STOOD IT ELEVEN ROUNDS

Willard Went one Short of the Full Distance—Joe Chip Speeded up Champ's Glove Work.

TOLEDO, O., June 18.—Jack Dempsey, matched to meet Jess Willard for the heavyweight championship here on July 4th, gave his admirers their biggest surprise yesterday when he weighed himself on a set of tested scales and tipped the beam at exactly 201 pounds. Dempsey was clad only in a swimming suit and boxing shoes, which weighed about a pound.

The weighing was done publicly after a dinner at the challenger's camp attended by Tex Rickard, promoter of the contest, Mayor Schreiber, C. F. Wall, director of public safety; numerous sporting celebrities and newspapermen. Even Jack Kearns, manager of the challenger, looked astonished when the beam passed over the 200 mark. He announced yesterday Dempsey would scale about 195 pounds.

Considerable of a jolt The challenger's poundage was considered of a jolt to admirers of Willard, who had claimed that Dempsey's hand work under a scorching sun would likely burn him out and send him into the ring against the champion in the light heavy-weight class or around 190 pounds.

Dempsey appeared to be in perfect condition when he jumped on the scales. There was not an ounce of surplus flesh on his body, which has been burned to a copper color as a result of weeks of exposure to the sun.

Willard boxed eleven three-minute rounds yesterday, one short of the distance he will have to travel if he and Dempsey go the limit in the Fourth of July engagement. Joe Chip, a middleweight champion, joined Willard's staff of sparring partners and furnished the champion with the most interesting workout of the afternoon.

Chip weighs more than 160 pounds, but he looked like a lightweight against the champion.

Delighted the Big Crowd. He is fast and speeded up Willard's work, to the delight of the big crowd. Willard boxed three rounds with Jack Hempel, two with Chip, three with Jack Hemen, and three with Walter Monahan. He used fourteen-ounce gloves instead of ten-ounce ones to save his sparring partners, who are wearing padded mitts and bruises as a result of the mauling they received Monday.

Dad Bushart had a couple of do with keeping London such a hot last, but there is no getting away from the fact that the boxers have had an extra tiring this season.

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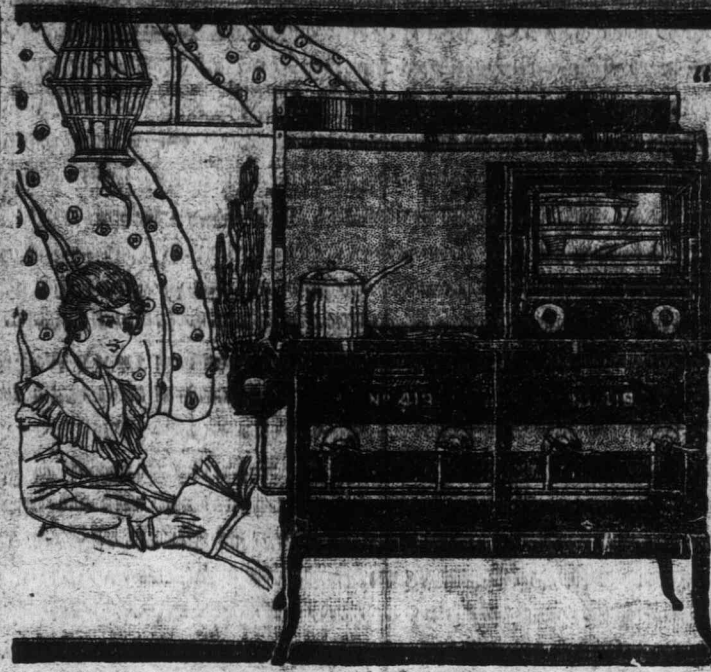

**POINTS LOOKED
FOR IN A GOOD
VIOLIN BOW**

Greatest Bow-maker Lued Perham-buco—Must be Properly Seasoned—If Grain is Uneven or Curly, Bow Will Warp.
It is a mistake to think that the selection of a good violin requires some pains, but that any bow will do. People who are fond of violin music are apt to place a sort of halo around the fiddle while the bow is thought to go along with it like the chord with an electric iron or laces with a new pair of shoes. It takes more than passing care to pick a satisfactory bow.
Tourte is conceded to be the Stradivari of bow-makers. After many intricate experiments, he became convinced that pernambuco wood alone combined the necessary qualities of lightness and stiffness required in the best possible stick. He practically created the bow which having little if any working model from which to develop it, and his success made possible many if not all phases of violin technique. Before his time there could have been no staccato, no notable delicate shadings of piano and forte, no power, no real purity of tone and little firmness under control.
Tourte used wood that was of fine, yet strong, texture; he learned how to heat the stick to the marrow (which insures the permanency of the curve) without ruining the exterior; he perfected the mode of bending the stick upward. The earliest examples of bows show the wood bent outward, and this improved idea enabled the violinist to better relax the weight of the fingers and thumb against the stick while exerting the same time the bow becomes more sensitive to pressure, and proper distribution of weight became possible.
He determined the curvature, with the desirable point of gravity (or balance), and decreased the diameter of the head as well as the height, which determined the distance the hair should lie from the stick. This is accomplished in part by the attachment of the screw, by means of which the hair can be tightened or loosened at will; the earlier method requiring such an advantage impossible. He also hit upon the length of stick best adapted to the violinist's arm, and then invented the ferule at the nut which spreads the hairs to the proper width and thickness, and which previously had been attached to the stick in a kind of round bundle. And so we have our modern bow as it was conceived by him, with the exception of the metal slide on frog which attaches to the stick. This improvement was first applied by Lupot. It is said Tourte never stamped his name on his bows.
Some of the wood used in cheap bows is not properly seasoned, and the playing life of the stick is proportionately shortened. If a stick is not straight the parts will not pull and work together. If the grain is uneven or curly, the bow is more subject to warping out of line. Nor does the average bow work equally well for all styles of playing. And a clever violinist will select a stick which will weak points in his bow-arm technique.

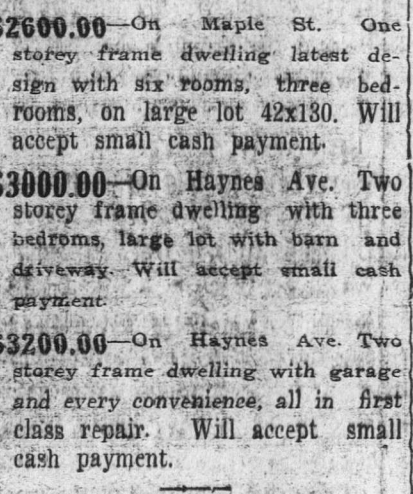

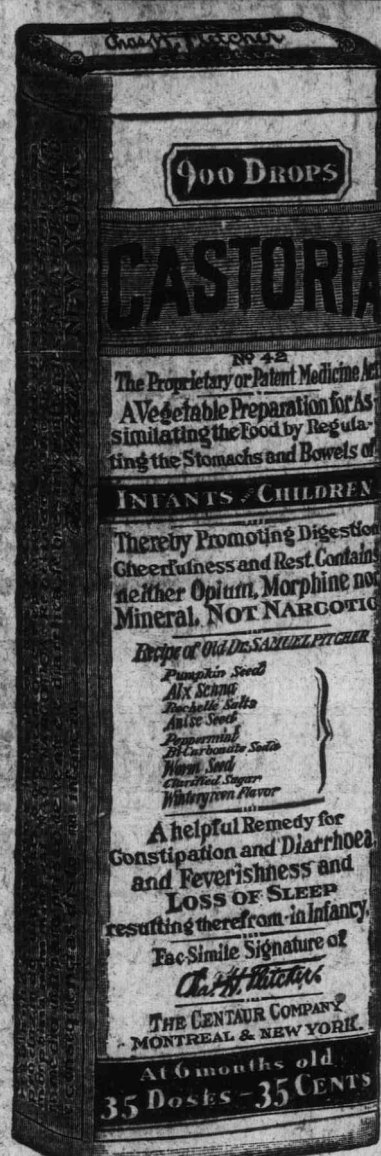

GASOLINE SUPPLY

France May Make Importation Government Monopoly

PARIS, June 18.—Louis Kloetz, the French minister of finance, submitted yesterday to the French cabinet the bill for a government monopoly of the importation of gasoline which he told the chamber on May 27, he would introduce later. The bill in general would continue wartime regulations under which petrol was imported. The state would be the sole purchaser abroad and it would control all importations. It is estimated this monopoly will yield an annual revenue of thirty five million francs.

Refining and wholesale selling would be permitted by others than the government, but Minister Kloetz said he was studying proposed measures whereby the government would share in the profits of such private industries.

Er-mier Clemenceau at the meeting of the cabinet yesterday informed it concerning the revised terms of the allies' reply to the German counter-proposals.
