LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The Northern Light is in Sight. The Civil Election are going on today.

No mail crosses from either side at the Cape yesterday.

A fancy dress carnival will be held in the Recreation Park to-morrow evening.

Thundersnow drifts are reported along the Lake Superior division of the C. P. R.

We are indebted to D. A. McDonald, Esq., of San Francisco, for California papers.

The telegraph wires were down on Monday, consequently no telegraphic news reached here.

The attendance at the Market has, of late, been very small, owing to the cold and stormy weather.

Some more than one thousand nine hundred and thirty-six more people enrolled in Manitoba in 1886 than in 1885.

On Saturday night last the thermometer went down to ten degrees below zero, and on Sunday night it registered nine degrees below.

It is estimated that the amount of gold actually in circulation in England is about eight hundred and sixty-five tons.

A LANSO clock has been placed in the corridor of the Post Office. The lower portion of the clock is used as an advertising medium.

It is said that the Messrs. McMillan, of St. John, N. B., are about publishing a historical drama, entitled "Robbervil," by Col. Hunter Duvar, of this Island.

The cast-iron pipes for the Charlottetown Water Works are being made in Glasgow, Scotland. It is expected that the Works will be in operation next autumn.

An Ottawa telegram, dated yesterday (the 24th), says Prof. Conservator, was elected by acclamation in Victoria, B. C., on Monday last, for the House of Commons.

We are much pleased to learn that Mr. Joseph McCarty, of the Post Office Department, has passed the Civil Service promotion examination. Mr. McCarty is a very obliging and popular official.

The Illustrated London News (American edition) still maintains its reputation as a first-class publication, both as regards reading matter and illustrations. The office of publication is in the Peter Building, New York.

Several new ventilators have been placed in the Court House. This is an improvement which will, doubtless, be highly appreciated by the judges, counsel and jury, who are obliged to sit there six or seven hours every day.

Hos. D. Fennell's lectures in the new hall of the Emerald Branch, R. I. S., on Friday night next, the 27th inst. Besides the lecture there will be vocal and instrumental music. The occasion will be a most interesting one.

A few days ago, the Pittsburg Steel Co.'s works east of the United States Government, a steel gun, nearly twenty feet long, and about nine tons in weight. It is expected to have a muzzle velocity of about two thousand feet per second.

A slight fire occurred in a house on Dorchester street, on Sunday night last. The chimney caught fire, and the flames were communicated to the floor of a room on the second floor. The fire was extinguished before any damage was done.

Owing to the severity of the snow storm, the railroad track was so drifted up, that no trains were moving on Saturday last. On Monday the trains from Summerside were two hours late, and the train from the East was also late. Yesterday all trains were running on time.

Fifty-five bags of mail matter were brought across from Cape Tormentine to Cape Traversed on Sunday last. They were forwarded to Summerside, by which, on Monday morning, but were not in time for the train coming to Charlottetown, so they arrived in this city yesterday forenoon.

This question whether the wheat of Manitoba can be transported through Hudson's Bay direct to Liverpool is of serious moment to this country as well as to Canada. On this subject, in the American Magazine for February, J. Macdonald's article will throw what is the latest and most reliable information of existence in a region where mercury freezes solid.

About 10 o'clock last Friday night, a man named John Gillis, belonging to this city, and employed at Messrs. The yield of gold in Victoria during 1887 was 602,196 oz., which was the lowest for 15 years past, the average having been 1,511,785 oz. The yield from quartz was 91,268 oz., an average of 9 dt. 10.31 gr. per ton, the highest average being obtained in the Steiglitz division of the Ballarat district, viz 9 oz. 3 dt. 12.10 gr., and the richest parcel of quartz raised 46 any mine during the year being 48 dt. 10.31 gr. per ton, from the mine of the New Balfour Company, Maidon. The yield from the alluvial gold was 245,362 oz., the average being 1 oz. 13 dt. 14.94 gr. per ton, the highest average yield being 2 oz. 7 dt. 20 gr. per ton, obtained in the Stippleton district, and the lowest 11 dt. 10.34 gr. per ton in the Boothby district. The machinery employed in gold mining was estimated on the 31st of December last at £2,797,925, namely, £1,477,785 in quartz mining and £2,319,140 in alluvial. The population of the colony was on December 31st last 25,214, a decrease of 978, as compared with the previous year. Of the total number of miners 30,728 were Europeans and 4,478 Chinese. Since gold mining has commenced in Victoria, the colony has contributed to the world's yield of gold to the end of last year no less than 4,494,592 oz., of the value of £217,697,000.
