LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS, S. S. Virginian

The mails are coming daily, at the Cape.

The advertisement of the St. Patrick's Day entertainment in the Dominion appears in this issue. Tickets will be on sale at the usual places Friday morning.

Twenty-four Greek laborers started to cross the Sacramento River in a boat from Redding, California, Monday afternoon. The boat capsized and twenty-two were drowned.

The railroad station at Montague was entered by a thief or thieves on Friday night last when the safe was opened and eighty-two dollars stolen. Entrance was through the front window. The matter is under investigation.

Dr. Orvinsky, Supreme Chief Ranger of the Independent Order of Foresters, died last week, in the South, whether he had gone in search of health. His body was taken to Toronto for interment. He is succeeded as head of the Foresters by Supreme Councilor, Eliot T. Stevenson.

The fast train No. 38 on the western New York and Pennsylvania division of the Pennsylvania Railway was wrecked last Wednesday night near Warren, Pa. The train plunged over a 25 foot embankment and nine passengers were injured, but none fatally.

The government cable across Bras Dor has been broken and as a result the service to Northern Cape Breton points has been interrupted. An effort will be made to effect temporary repairs, but a good deal of trouble is anticipated on account of ice.

The Naval Court Martial sitting at Chatham, England recently found Captain Kingsmill and Lieut. Noaks guilty by default of entering the big battleship Dominion to be stranded in the St. Lawrence river August 13th of last year. The two officers were sentenced to be severely reprimanded.

Prince Henry of the Netherlands, announced his decision to decline the proposed national testimonial for assistance he rendered in saving the lives of the survivors of the British steamer Herald wrecked at the Hook of Holland, February 21st. He says, that on that occasion he merely did his duty as a Dutchman and cannot permit special recognition thereof.

The winter steamers are both in the ice. The Minto is in the same position as she was a week ago, near Plover Island. Yesterday thirty of the passengers landed and walked on the ice to Caribou. About sixty more remain on board. The Stanley left Georgetown Monday morning in an attempt to go to Plover. She did not go far when she struck fast in the ice near Cape Bear. She is still there.

Frank W. Morse vice president and general manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific, stated in Toronto the other day that his company was contracting to secure the services of 20,000 laborers from England, Scotland and Russia for construction work to be commenced this spring. Mr. Morse expressed concurrence in the opinion of Bryce E. Walker to the effect that the development of the west would accommodate the employment of Oriental labor.

A despatch of Saturday, from St. John's Nfld., says:—A heavy blizzard has raged throughout Newfoundland for the past 48 hours, blockading railways and damaging shipping. An unknown fishing vessel with seven men on board was wrecked and all hands were lost. The high gale drove three vessels seaward, and the crews were obliged to abandon the crafts to save their lives. On account of the blockade on the railway six hundred sealers on their way to St. John's to join the sealing steamers sailing on Monday are unable to reach here. Business in many places is at a standstill.

The small-pox situation in the Auburn Settlement, Fort Augustus, has not materially changed since last week. All the houses, about twenty-four, are flagged and communication with them by outsiders is forbidden. A fatal case in it is being attended to by the health officer. One case was discovered in the city on Friday last, a young man named Benjamin Molins. Measures were at once taken by the board of health to prevent any spread of the disease. The schools and churches were closed and public meetings forbidden. Vaccination is going on and every necessary precaution taken. No new cases have since developed and Molins is reported doing well.

Col. Roderick McLennan, ex-M.P. died at Cornwall, Ontario last Friday. Deceased was one of Glangarry's prominent men. In his younger days he was famous as a hammer thrower at the Caledonian games, and many Islanders will remember his visit to this Province and participation in the Scottish games at Charlottetown some years ago. He was six feet four inches in height and stood in proportion. As a railroad contractor, a militia officer and member of the House of Commons he had a wide circle of acquaintances all over the world. Col. McLennan was a Conservative and one of St. John McDonald's good friends. He was 65 years of age.

The worst snow storm experienced for many years, swept Cape Breton and other parts of Nova Scotia on Thursday last. No trains left Sydney on that day, the round house and other railway buildings were completely covered up with snow. A number of men were working all day to effect an entrance to the round house. Trains and teams were at a standstill. Several persons who ventured out in the storm were exhausted and some of them died. At Sydney Mines a young man named Brown eighteen years of age perished in the blizzard. Two boys were drowned in the storm. While attempting to get to their home from a colliery. Two other men employed about the mines were struck by an engine. One had his skull fractured and the other had his leg broken. A young man named Angus McDonald, started from Antigonish at the beginning of the storm for Antigonish Harbour, about five miles distant. He lost his way on the ice, and his lifeless body was found a few hundred yards from the shore just opposite his home. Other fatalities are reported.

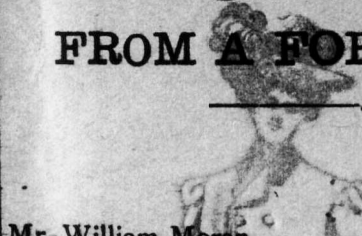
