

WITH THE FARMERS

FIELD CROPS IN CANADA. Ottawa, January 4.—The final estimates of production and value of the field crops and the per cent. number on hand and condition of live stock in Canada are given out today by the Census and Statistics Office.

Total \$283,710,000 For Three Crops. The principal grain crops of the country are wheat, oats and barley, which this year aggregate in area 16,617,600 acres and in value \$283,710,000.

Values by Provinces. The condition of the new crop of fall wheat this year was 93.333 of a standard, as compared with 75 per cent. last year. In Alberta there is an increase of 21 per cent. of fall wheat seeding and in Ontario an increase of nine per cent. over the area sown last year.

Winnipeg's Grain Markets. Winnipeg, January 4.—The general upward trend of markets continued, and there was a good demand for all grades of wheat with light offerings.

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STREET RAILWAY SEES A CONTINUED GROWTH

The figures for December show the Biggest Total Since Service Was started. A Quarter of a Million Passengers Were Carried During the Last Month of the Year.
