





### Fads and Fashions.

To mend a tear or cut in a rubber glove put a piece of adhesive plaster a little larger than the rent inside the glove, hold the sides of the tear in place and press the plaster and the glove together firmly. Of course the sticky side of the plaster is laid next to the glove. This will hold the rubber fast, and it will wear for many days despite the unfortunate rent.

Many people have been annoyed at finding their irons quite rusty after they have been put away a few days. The way to prevent this happening is, before you put them away, to rub a little warm grease over them and then wrap them up in brown paper. When you take them out to use, dip them into hot water that has had a small piece of soda dissolved in it, rubbing and then putting them to heat in the usual way.

I find that hemstitching can be done on the sewing machine in this way: First, draw the number of threads desired, then baste the edge of the hem in the centre of the drawn threads. Now lengthen the stitch on the machine and stitch exactly on the edge of the hem, pulling the bastings out, and pull the edge of the hem to

ROME, Sept. 27. Italy's next move in Tripoli will depend upon the answer which the Porte makes to the note presented by the Italian Charge d'Affaires at Constantinople in which the Government at Rome demands guarantees against a repetition of certain acts on the part of Turkey, which have been made a subject of complaint by Italian residents in Tripoli. These guarantees are extensive and include the right of Italy to supervise measures which she considers necessary for the conduct of affairs in the Province. The note is couched in strongest terms, and is to all intents an ultimatum. It is said that Britain, France and Russia have been solicited by Turkey to intervene, but have refused. It is reported that four Italian torpedo boats are patrolling the Barbary coast in order to prevent the landing of Turkish troops and war materials.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Sept. 27. The Morning Post's Constantinople Correspondent says that at an extraordinary cabinet council it was decided to take measures to oppress the Italian projects in Tripoli. Official circles are convinced that the Powers will not allow Italy to land troops in Tripoli. The Powers are willing to grant the Italians some economical advantage, but refusing a privileged position. The Morning Leader's Constantinople correspondent says that an Ottoman agency has announced that Italy proposes to pay between \$15,000,000 and \$20,000,000 in exchange for Tripoli. The statement is discredited.

### IN FOR A RECORD.

The chances of the present administration making a record in unpopularity are favourable. It will undoubtedly outdo that Tory administration, which met its Waterloo in 1888, and its chances of exceeding the Tory administration which came a cropper in 1900 are distinctly good. The standard we have set up is undoubtedly high, but we believe our confidence in the present Government's power of rousing antipathy is not misplaced.

The success of that administration in bringing its career to an early close was not more marvellous than its success in estranging the feeling of the electorate.

We have no desire to see the Government fall apart like its Tory predecessor did some eleven years ago. We would much prefer to see what a Tory administration, which keeps united, can really do in rousing popular antagonism, and we are fully convinced that if the Government works harmoniously they will break the Tory record of 1890 at the next general election. We have mentioned general elections, because they afford the people a decisive means of expressing their feelings, and that expression is given in terms definite and determinate. For instance, they record to which we have referred was a definite and determinate expression of the detestation of the Tory Administration which they had put in power in 1897. The returns showed 4 Tory candidates elected as against 3 of their opponents.

So far as history shows this is the high water mark of unpopularity earned even by a Tory administration. But the present administration bids fair to outrival even that government. The feeling of hostility to the Government throughout the Colony is intense.

The picketings, the givings-out of land and patronage, and the reckless administration generally are having their natural sequence and evoking a feeling that will not only oust the Administration but all or almost all who arrogated to their party the name of People's Party. A more apt title is in the mouth of everybody.

### Pilot Boat and Fire Service

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—Learning that the Pilot Commissioners contemplate purchasing another small steamer for the use of the pilots, permit me to respectfully suggest to the Commissioners not to proceed too hurriedly in the purchase of a tug—a little delay in so doing may prove beneficial to the waterfront property holders, and particularly to the pilots. The men engaged in this hazardous calling are certainly entitled to better treatment at the hands of the Commissioners than to again be compelled to trust their lives in another cockleshell such as the "Ohio," especially as they annually contribute large amounts to a fund which is known as the "Pilot's Fund," which is reported to be now in the neighborhood of \$14,000. If I err in the amount mentioned I would be pleased if Chief Commissioner Capt. Ed English would correct me. What I suggest is: let a larger steamer be purchased by the Commissioners and then let a meeting be called of the five underwriters, the Municipal Council and Inspector General Sullivan to discuss the question of supplying the steamer with a first class fire apparatus, which could be at all times in readiness to cope with a conflagration on the water side. This would undoubtedly be a long felt want supplied. Therefore I think the time is never more opportune to supply a comfortable boat for the pilots out of the enormous fund at their disposal—the result of 40 years' service. Then let the underwriters and Municipal Council supply the necessary machinery and a competent engineer to be paid by the body; and this accomplished, the high rates of insurance now levied on waterfront premises can be materially reduced.

### Music and Drama.

If my friend would take the trouble of reading over my letter again, he would find these words: "I myself started a small company a short while ago, but lacking both funds and backers we are only able to cater to the public in a small way." Nothing at all about stopping; these words simply meaning that although I do not have the money and the "silent partner" we are not eager to hire the T. A. Hall and do the thing in the way which it should have been done. Our performances were paying, and though produced in a smaller hall, were greeted with full houses and were loudly praised by the daily press. So much for that.

"Choral" states that I said a Dramatic Co. was better than a Choral Society. Again I quote my own words: "It seems to me that not only do we want a Choral Society, but we also want a local Dramatic Co., and perhaps (not committing myself) the latter a great deal more than the former."

He also thinks that I have never had a good Choral Society sing. Well, Mr. Editor, it might surprise "Choral" to hear that although I do not possess a voice of any remarkable size, I possess a seat in a city choir and have sung in the "Hallelujah chorus," a beautiful and noble piece of work, which he speaks of, at the C. E. Cathedral and in the Methodist College Hall. So being so passionately fond of good music, I would not dare to put a Dramatic Co. before a good Choral Society. There was a Choral Society formed some time ago,

and for some reason, of which I do not know, it fell through.

Now let some one with a thorough knowledge of theatrical work see what can be done with a good local Dramatic Co. There is plenty of room for both. Hoping my friend "Choral" understands my letter a little better and thanking you for your valuable space, I am,

### Theatricals.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—I notice in your issue of yesterday a letter from "Citizen," re the promotion of a company for the purpose of bringing here from Canada or America a theatrical company to amuse the public in this line, instead of vaudeville and moving picture shows, and refers to the T. A. Hall as the only one suitable for such purpose (thanks, friend "Citizen," for the compliment). But I would like to inform your correspondent, Mr. Editor, that the T. A. people have no idea at present of killing the goose that lays the golden egg, if negotiations can be finalized.

The stay of a theatrical company here is usually very limited, covering a period of four weeks at the most, and will only come here at two seasons of the year. Then the half may again be engaged for perhaps a half dozen nights of the year by various local organizations. The total rentals, as far as I can learn, on an average does not come to within a third of what the "casino" management have paid and are prepared to pay for a full twelve months engagement.

The Executive of the T. A. & B. Society are not supposed to cater to the whims of a few of our money-making "citizens," when they have the interests of 500 men and the same number of boys who own the Theatre looming before them. The value of a rental to a "Niel" company is more than might be imagined at first thought. For instance, the valuable scenarios and properties are not used, and are liable to lose their value; secondly, the renovation, etc., of the theatre is done at other expense than that of the Society's; and, thirdly, the

lighting (by no means an unimportant item) is furnished by the lessee. When these facts are taken into consideration it will no doubt be apparent to "Citizen" and others why the Society is not anxious to lose the precious rental in exchange for spasm-modical visits from a fourth-rate theatrical troupe which hardly leave enough behind them to cover current expenses. These are the reasons why the T. A. Executive are not anxious to embrace too hurriedly suggestions from what might be aptly termed "Nippers."
