





Even in the Premier's Xmas greeting, tendered to the people recently, he could not refrain from saying what was absolutely false as regards the prosperity of the island being due to what the Government had done the past four years. Of course it is their only consolation to go on saying all they did, and there can be no question, as the Premier says, that they have done more than any other Government that ever preceded them. That is quite true; but it has been more picnicking, more filching of the public funds, more in the way of forfeiting native rights and oppressing the people with merciless taxation. and open offices at all intermediate places. In 1904 the monopoly of the Anglo-American Company came to an end and the Government wires at Whitbourne were at once brought into St. John's. From this time the work of Telegraph extension went steadily forward." Everybody knows the history of this

Telegraph business and it need not be revived. It was Bond who inaugurated the new system, it was Bond who brought order out of chaos and made the telegraph lines the great blessing they are to the Colony to-

The general situation has been ameliorated, and the danger of a rupture in peace negotiations to-morrow seems to have been averted through Turkey making fresh concessions which will enable the Allies to enjoy a holiday during the festivities in connection with the Orthodox Christmas. Rechad Pasha seems to have turned into a sphinx, so full of mys tery and impenetrabilities is he, bu from authoritative sources it is stated that the Powers, through their ambassadors here and at Constanti nople, have succeeded in mixing much water with both the allies and Tur key's wine. Strong pressure in favo of moderation has been exercised a Constantinople, whilst the Balkan representatives have been urged to be patient before breaking off nego tiations, as they can lose nothing by waiting, their position being better than that of Turkey. The efforts of the Powers appear to be successful on both sides. If unless some sudden change occurs at the last moment Rechad Pasha will present, Monday, new terms which will comprise another rectification of Tracean from

the presentation to the Allies had on the part of Turkey to reach a satterms for study and await their structions and will suggest an adjournment of the conference until Friday, the third day after their Christmas: but at the same time en phasizing the necessity of Turke meeting the terms of the Allies, paricularly with respect to Adrianople.
