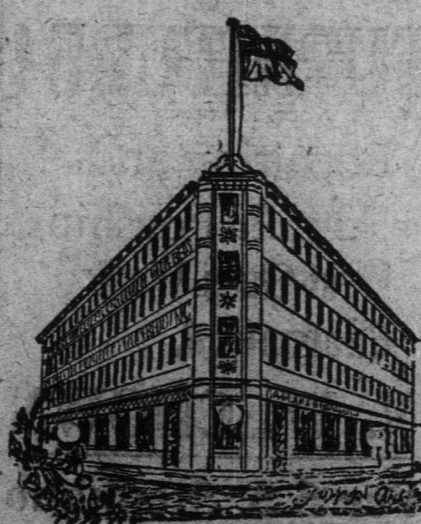

There are different modes of obligation and different avenues to our gratitude and favor. A man may lend his countenance who will not part with his money and open his mind to us who will not draw out his purse. How many ways are there in which our peace may be assailed besides actual want! How many comforts do we stand in need of besides meat and drink and clothing!—Hazzitt.

All the help and service that is given to others in this world is not given wittingly and deliberately.

Many people confer benefits on those about them in ways they know not of.

Whoever creates a beautiful thing of any sort, even though he creates it primarily for his own satisfaction, gives pleasure to others, and since pleasure is what we all seek so eagerly, is not that after all as valuable a gift as money or food or drink?

Some years ago I was sent to interview a woman who was running for the school board. I was ushered into her living room to wait for her. That room made an impression on me that I shall never forget. It was a room into the furnishing of which had evidently gone care and thought and taste. There was an all pervasive sense of harmony and beauty about it which not even the most casual visitor could miss. It seems to

me that the woman who created that room, by so doing, conferred as real a benefit upon all who enter it as if she gave them some tangible gift. For myself at least, I know that even now I still think of the hour I spent in that room with a sense of pleasure. Moreover, it gave me higher ideals of taste and beauty than I had ever had before. Were not these as splendid benefits as any more concrete services she could have rendered me?

It is sometimes considered frivolous for women to cultivate their natural beauty and enhance it by becoming clothes. To my mind the woman who does this is doing good work, if she does not concentrate on it to the exclusion of higher duties, because she is conferring a benefit on mankind. And mind you, I mean mankind to include womankind. I know that I have often wished to tell a pretty woman in a pretty gown how much I enjoyed looking at her, and I have heard other women express the same un-catty appreciation of their sisters' beauty.

Nor is the creation or cultivation of beauty the only way in which we unconsciously benefit our neighbors. A strong, serene personality is a continual gift of strength and peace to all who come into contact with it. A well ordered home where peace and serenity reign is a blessing to all who come into it. In a thousand such ways we may unconsciously bless and benefit others.

Indeed, if we make our own lives as fine and strong and beautiful as we know how, we cannot help helping others.

Another Big Stamp Find.

Philadelphia Waste Paper Buyer Bought lot Appraised at \$75,000 for \$68.

Philadelphia, Dec. 25.—After almost a year's secrecy it became known today that the banking firm of Townsend, Whelen & Co., sold to the Hemingway Paperstock Company for \$68, a batch of old correspondence and papers which turned out to have a value of approximately \$75,000.

Townsend, Whelen & Co., decided to dispose of a mass of old and dusty letters when preparing last April to move from the offices they had occupied for 40 years at 309 Walnut St. To avoid what was considered useless investigation, decision was reached to sell the letters in bulk, a representative of the Hemingway concern bid on the lot of pulp paper, and the deal was closed.

When unused stamps were found on the letters, employees reported the matter to W. Menningway, he ordered all the stamps collected, and A. F. Henkels, President of the Philadelphia Stamp Club, appraised the find at \$75,000.

Dead in Shooting Box.

Jimmy Albert, champion bicyclist and six-day walker, victim of heart failure in Atlantic City.

Atlantic City, N.J., Dec. 25.—James A. Cathcart, known to the sporting world as "Jimmy Albert," a name he used when he was champion bicycle rider and champion six-day walker of the world, went from his boathouse in Venice Park, a suburb, yesterday morning to shoot ducks.

When he did not return to-day a party of friends went in search of him. Two miles up the bay the rescuers came upon Cathcart's sneak box and on the box the athlete sat upright dead.

On his shoulder was his gun and near the box were two dead ducks. A doctor said that Cathcart died from heart failure and was probably dead 24 hours.

When Cathcart left his boathouse yesterday morning he said he would be back before night, when he would join in arranging for the Christmas celebration.

Under the name of "Jimmy Albert," over the world as a bicycle rider. When age came on and he was no longer fit for such races he became a walker. In one six-day match in Madison Square Garden he walked 531 miles, won the match and a fortune.

Hamilton, Ont., Dec. 26.—Rev. Dr. Donald Hugh Fletcher, one of the best known Presbyterian ministers in Canada, died this morning, following an operation at the City Hospital. He was eighty years of age.

Gold and silver brocades are still in favor for evening wear, and fine malines and Venetian lace drapes and trims these lovely tissues.

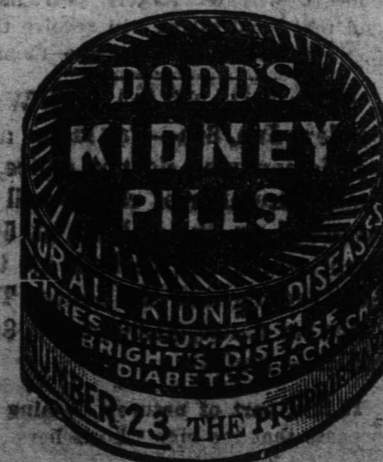

Morris's Latest Outrage.

On Friday last, we drew attention to the talk around town that Sir Edward Morris was endeavoring to obtain power to increase the number of members in the Legislative Council, and that he had submitted the names of three fish merchants as proposed members of that Chamber.

This report has not been denied. The Daily News has published two issues since that time, and has not denied the rumor. The Evening Herald in its issue published almost three columns in reply, but carefully avoided denying either one rumor or the other. The Hon. P. T. McGrath devoted himself to abuse of Mr. Lloyd, the Editor of the Evening Telegram.

That feature, of course, was not unexpected. He cannot help it. It would have been a surprise, had he not done so. Nor was it exceptional for Mr. McGrath maliciously to attribute our article to indulgence in "Shandygaff." We may, however, inform Mr. McGrath and all of his ilk, that his insinuation is not only malicious, but is absolutely false that we have not indulged in any "Shandygaff" or any other alcohol beverage either during New Year's festivities or during Christmastide. We state this fact to prove conclusively that Mr. McGrath is resorting to straight falsehood to back up a rotten case.

It is also false that either the Proprietor or Editor of the Evening Telegram ever approached the Morris Party with a view of supporting them—either for seats in the Legislative Council or House of Assembly, or any other consideration.

The columns of the Evening Telegram ever since Sir Edward Morris broke away from the Liberal Party afford clear evidence of this. In support of this, we now cite the abuse of us, made by Sir Edward

Morris, in his speech, delivered at Bonne Bay, a few months ago.

Here is part of what he said: "The two men who edit the Opposition papers have, since the day I took office, pursued me with a venom and malignity unsurpassed in our political annals Both lived largely out of the late Government from whom they had fat fees and by the defeat of their party, have been forced to work for a living."

That was the opinion offered by Sir Edward Morris himself to the people of Bonne Bay. It was published in both the Daily News and the Evening Chronicle, and the speech itself put up in pamphlet form and circulated widely. The opposition we have put up has evidently inflamed Sir Edward Morris, and he like Mr. McGrath, resorted to falsehood to bolster up his abuse of us, for it is absolutely untrue that the editor of this paper lived largely out of the late Government, and that we have had to resort to other means of working for a living, since the defeat of the Bond Government.

We are, however, not the only object of Mr. McGrath's venomous pen. Of the Fishermen's Advocate Calendar for 1913, Mr. McGrath says: "The notorious Coaker issues a calendar with his paper to-day, the prime feature of which is a photo of himself looking like 'Lefty Louie' the New York 'gunman.'"

This gross insult and wicked insinuation against the President of the Fishermen's Protective Union is even more abominable than his defamation of us. Here is a falsehood about us: "Just think of Dr. Lloyd, whom outport people cross the street to avoid, trying to pose as the fishermen's friend, and shrieking like a fury for Bond, when rumor credits him with trying to bell out his leader a year or two ago?"

Outport people, instead of avoiding us, make a point of calling at the office to see us. More than that, three thousand people at Bonaville have already demonstrated their opinion of Mr. McGrath by burning him in effigy for his previous attacks on Mr. Coaker.

Reverting now to the main issue of our articles of Friday and Saturday last, the questions we propounded then have not been answered. We have not yet been told what need there is for an increase in the membership of the Legislative Council. Nor have we been told why Sir Edward Morris proposes to put three fish merchants in the Chamber. We have received plenty of abuse, but no answer to our queries.

Son Saves Mother

From Being Shot by Drink-crazed Indian, but discharge strikes dynamite and boy was killed by explosion.

Niagara Falls, N.Y., Dec. 28.—Abandoned by his wife he sought to kill, and his friends and relatives, Chief John Williams, of the Tuscarora Nation, lay four hours in his wrecked cottage on the reservation, twelve miles northeast of here without medical attention and may die from loss of blood and exposure. He is to-day in the Lockport City Hospital under constant surveillance by a deputy sheriff. The body of his 16 year old son, Alexander, is in a morgue and his wife and two daughters, Mary, 21 years old, and Rose, four years old, are being nursed back to health at the home of his brother, Daniel Williams.

Williams had been drinking for a week and following a game of cards in which he, his son, Delancey Graham and Chauncey Anderson, two other Indians, participated, the drink crazed man picked a quarrel with his wife because she chided him about his inebriety. He took the shot-gun from its resting place, placed two shells in the barrels and deliberately aimed at his wife.

The son rushed toward the stairway leading upstairs and Graham stepped between the woman and the murderer in time to turn the muzzle of the gun. The charge hit three sticks of dynamite and a second explosion followed. It was this explosion that killed the boy and injured the woman, her husband and children. The entire front of the cottage was blown out.

The Kaiser and the Urchin.

Thanks to the rapid recovery he made from his recent indisposition, the Kaiser was able to be present at the Swiss army manoeuvres, and the rough-and-ready ways of the Swiss must have been somewhat of a relief to him after the rather heavy formalities of Potsdam. There were several little diversions from the strict military routine when the Kaiser was able to be his mental self; and a pleasing and touching incident occurred when His Imperial Majesty paid a visit to the bears for which Berne is famous. Visitors are provided with bundles of carrots with which to feed the animals; but the Kaiser, owing to the infirmity of his left arm, experienced great difficulty in untying his bundle.

Captain Fitzpatrick's Suggestion.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,—I am surprised that such little notice has been paid by the Press to the letter of Capt. Fitzpatrick, which appeared in the Daily News, of Friday's issue, and in which he as a man of wide experience, tells us that all could do a great deal to lessen the loss of lives which yearly occur in the neighborhood of St. Shott's, if an automatic gas-light whistling buoy were placed to the N.W. of Cape St. Mary's Cays.

Capt. Fitzpatrick goes as far as to say, that had such an aid to navigation been in place his belief is that the s.s. Morin and her crew would be safe and sound to-day. He also says: "Many times the necessity of an automatic gas-light whistling buoy to the N.W. of Cape St. Mary's Cays has been explained, but all to no use."

In another part of his letter, Capt. Fitzpatrick says: "From Cape English to the eastern head of St. Shott's is 11 miles and a regular graveyard. There 37 or more ships ran ashore since 1882. Two years ago the Canadian Government placed a fog alarm on Cape Freels two miles east of the eastern part of this ship graveyard. Had the authorities made enquiries of Capt. Delaney, Capt. Drake or myself, I am sure that either, or all of us would advise this fog alarm in or about the centre of the said graveyard which advice if acted upon would have saved the Florence with her twenty-two men and other ships lately wrecked in the same locality."

Now, Mr. Editor, why such a letter as this has not aroused greater interest in this city passes my comprehension, for the danger is there today as great as ever, awaiting to destroy the next ship that comes along in a fog and send her crew to instant death. What is the use of prattling about the hardships of the mariner, publishing lists of steamers lost there, and writing articles about it in foreign papers and yet doing nothing to prevent such disasters?

And dear sir, that these enquiries have cost thousands of dollars which if spent in a whistling buoy would, as Capt. Fitzpatrick says, have saved the lives of many a seaman who to-day lies in a watery grave. Do we realize our duty in this matter, or do those in authority feel any qualms of conscience when they learn of another ship foundering and sending her unfortunate crew into eternity?

Capt. Fitzpatrick has done his duty like a man, he has pointed out a remedy and being a seaman of vast experience on our coast who will doubt its practicability? Slocum Captain Granted Pardon.

Washington, Dec. 26.—President Taft has granted full pardon to Captain William H. Van Schaick, master of the excursion steamer General Slocum, which June 15, 1904, burned to the water's edge in East River, New York, resulting in the loss of more than one thousand lives. The pardon took effect Christmas Day.

Mother And Son Burned To Death.

Quebec, Dec. 30.—Two lives were lost yesterday by a fire in a farm house at Charlesburg, about four miles from this city. Mrs. Pierre Gullbault, aged 72 years, and her son B. Gullbault, aged 28 years, were sleeping in the house when the fire broke out at 4.30 a.m. The reflection attracted the attention of the neighbors who hurried to the scene but when they reached the house, which was of wood, it was completely enveloped in flames and nothing could be done.

King Was Not Well.

London, Dec. 26.—King George, who is staying at his country house at Sandringham, was unable on account of a chill to attend church on Christmas Day, and was also prevented from attending the Christmas dinner given by the Queen Mother Alexandra. It is officially stated to-day that His Majesty has quite recovered.

COASTAL BOATS OFF.—The S. S. Prospero and S. S. Fogota which were held up by the storm Saturday night, left for Northern ports yesterday morning. Both steamers, nautical men believe, had a hard time if they were not harboured out of last night's gale.

Storm Universal.

The storm which began here Saturday afternoon and continued with unabated fury until 6 a.m. to-day, prevailed all over the country and was felt in the Maritime Provinces. At Sydney the storm was the worst in years, and the Invermore which was to sail Saturday night, had to anchor in the stream and was delayed until the weather abated. Saturday night, yesterday and last night, a hurricane of wind blew from the westward and few people were abroad. Slates were ripped off the old fashioned roofs on Water Street West and strewn the sidewalks in several places. Country-walk, trees and fences were blown down and on the higher levels houses, specially detached ones worked heavily in the blast and few who occupied them slept either Saturday night or last night. Shingles and felt were torn off many residences in the city, glass was blown in and owing to the storm the attendance at the churches was meagre yesterday. The City Fire Halls, large high wooden buildings that they are, rocked to their foundations and the men were on the alert for an alarm of fire, which, fortunately, however, did not occur. The telegraph lines were interrupted and yesterday the different companies had repairers at work putting them in order. The Bay Boats in most instances, could not run, and vessels approaching this coast must have had a terrible time.

Sailed in Storm.

Just when the storm which began Saturday afternoon was rising the S. S. Sagona left here for St. Pierre. She must have received a drubbing, she is a new and staunch ship and no doubt pulled through without mishap. Yesterday the wires were interrupted and no news could be had of the time she passed Cape Race.

Tritonia At Botwood.

The A. N. D. Co's steamer Tritonia arrived at Botwood on Saturday from London with 1,800 tons of coal. She left the other side December 21st and must not have had ice conditions to contend with to reach her destination so quickly. After unloading her present cargo the steamer loads pulp and paper for London.

And when these birds are sold, it is found that they are two years old. When the magic words "cold storage" are uttered the mystery is solved. They have been for many months hanging in long neat rows in cold storage awaiting the "new birth."

BOTWOOD, Jan. 4.
The S. S. Tritonia, Captain Murray, arrived this evening, 14 days from Glasgow.

BERLIN, Jan. 5.
Field Marshal Count Alfred von Schlieffen, formerly chief of the General Staff of the German Army, died to-day, in his eightieth year.

PEKIN, Jan. 5.
The Chinese customs revenues for 1912 amounted to \$40,280,000. This is a much larger return than in 1911, which was the best previous record.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 5.
A wind, which attained a velocity of 66 miles an hour, caused heavy damages throughout Pennsylvania, Delaware and New Jersey yesterday. Buildings, trees and telegraph poles were blown down.

LONDON, Jan. 5.
Miss Estelle W. Stead, daughter of William T. Stead, who was lost with the Titanic, declares that she has received many spirit messages from her father within the last few weeks. My father tells me, Miss Stead said to-day, that he is working where he now is just as he always worked here for world peace. Being untrammelled by a physical body, and at liberty to go here and there as he wills, he is working for peace by the influence of impression. "There is heavy work in front. Do not imagine the Turk has left Europe yet" was his last message, she said.

Capt. Johansen, a famous Arctic explorer, who achieved much success in Polar research, committed suicide here to-day. He was a member of the Amundsen's Antarctic expedition, but was left at the base of supplies, when Amundsen and four companions pushed their way to the South Pole. The fact that he was not among the party preyed on his mind. Johansen was best known as being Nansen's sole companion during fourteen months' journey over desert ice on the Greenland coast, after leaving the Arctic steamer Fram, in 1895. He was the author of "Nansen and I, at 88 degrees 14 minutes."

LONDON, Jan. 5.
The morning papers are heartily pleased with President Taft's declaration of his intention to submit the Panama Canal controversy with Britain to arbitration, if diplomatic negotiations should fail. The Daily Mail says any other than the honourable course which President Taft has taken would have been almost unthinkable; and if the Senate follows Taft's lead the question is as good as settled. The Daily Telegraph regards Taft's speech as altogether worthy of a statesman and a friend of peace. The Standard also eulogizes Taft and pays a tribute to the stand taken by part of the American press in the matter.



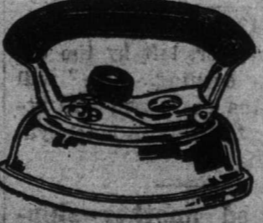
