Rabbitproof Fences.

one of them Twelve Hundred Miles Long, Extending Nearly Across Australia.

One of the methods adopted by every state government in Australia to check the onward march of the oitproof fences. The fences, though eminently useful, are not in the last resort rabbitproof. The rabbit in variably beats them and appears on the other side.

The fence is usually stoutly built of posts and rails and is then fitted with rabbitproof netting, three feet or four feet high, and let into the ground for several inches. Sometimes the section underground is given a short turn inward toward the rabbit, and the trench is then filled in with broken stone, such as is used on a metal road. The first of these fences was erected along the border between Victoria and South Australia, a dis tance of about 500 miles. The second was erected on the Queensland-New

South Wales border. Both of these fences were attended o by inspectors stationed at regular intervals, whose duty it was to see that the fence was kept in perfect repair. For some time these fences acted very well. 
