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




The Trident of the Sea

When the war broke out, the Brit-Dreadnoughts which were in the hands of British builders for foreign ment have the right of pre-emption on all warships, built in British yards for foreign powers. The Admiralty have already announced that they have taken over and put in commission the Sultan. Osman and the Res-Sir John Jellicoe. Half Million Calmucks to Aid Russia.

They are Born Horsemen, and Their Horses are the Finest in the

Petrograd, Dec. 22.—Half a million Calmucks, members of a Nomadic pastoral race which has always been free from obligation to furnish any soldiers for the Russian forces.

A deputation from the Calmucks recently arrived in Petrograd with in the ranks during the present war, and offering to supply five hundred thousand mounted troops if necessar, "Our tribes have volunteered practically en masse," declared the leader of the deputation.

The Emperor's reply grants them a military organization and privileges similar to those enjoyed by the Cos-

Household Notes

The charming gowns and blouses made from cotton voile seem to lose their crispness after washing, looking not half so fresh and pretty. If, after they are washed and dried, they are dipped in a solution of gum-arabic and water (a teaspoonful of powdered gum-arabic to one pint), rolled in a cloth and ironed wet, the garments

will look quite new again. In frying croquettes, it is a good plan to use a deep vessel and to frv very few at a time. The deep vessel permits your having the fat deep enough without danger of its boiling over and by putting only a few croquettes in at a time the fat will not be chilled and the croquettes will not be so likely to burst. Never put croquettes in the fat until it is smoking hot.

To shrink gingham lay the cloth in a large tub of lukewarm rainwater to which a handful of salt has been added, taking care to place the cloth in the original folds. Let it soak until the folds are thoroughly wet through, then remove from the tub, and without wringing pin on to a line in the open air. This wil dry perfectly smooth

and the color will not run. To make chutney take one pound Demerara sugar, half pound Spanish onions, half pound chopped raisins, three pints of vinegar, half pound salt, half pound mustard seeds, one ounce cayenne pepper, sixteen large apples. Place the mustard seeds in muslim and put into the vinegar the night before making the chutney. Core the apples, then boil the raisins, apples, onions, mustard seeds, and seasoning in the vinegar to a pulp. When cold it is ready for use. Place in bottles and
