



We agree with the prin We agree with the principle in the Bill which penalizes the Mayor or individual Councillors for J. R. BENNETT, directly with the employment or dis agree with the principle so far as it refers to the Council. The Council is a corporate body and in its corporate character, the City Engineer and the Sanitary Supervisor should be directly responsible to the Council for the exercise of the duty of employing la-bour, and should in every respect and

detail, be under its control We dislike the idea of the . City Council abrogating functions which are in their nature the business of the Council. It is difficult to avoid the conclusion that those responsible for the Bill distrust an elected body, which is answerable to an electorate, and they wish these functions to be exercised by an official, who for all practicable purposes is irremovable and answerable to neither electorate, nor even to the Council except for some gross dereliction of duty. In such an atmosphere of distrust, popular institutions can never flourish. The latter make mistakes, but they can be corrected by public opinion, and public opinion must have a chance to form and exercise itself. 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


