

Italy Don't Like It.

The Italian public comment with asperity and bitterness over the exclusion of Italy from the Alliance, as it seemed logical to them that a country of the same race as the French should have been asked to take part in the treaty. All this, without counting the sacrifices of the Italian nation, which now finds itself isolated and exposed to possible aggression without any ally upon which to depend, is irritating.

Speaking to a member of Parliament who had been at the Paris Peace Conference on this subject, the Gazette correspondent suggested there was the League of Nations upon which Italy might place her reliance. He replied:

If the League of Nations were truly able to prevent wars, then there would have been no necessity for the formation of the Franco-Anglo-American alliance. But if President Wilson, who was the chief exponent of the League, has seen the necessity of making this alliance for reciprocal protection of the signatory Powers, then this is all the more reason why Italy, which as a much weaker power, when compared to America, England, and France, should be included in the Alliance; unless, as is generally felt here, her exclusion has been accomplished purposely to relegate Italy to a secondary position."

Further, the cost of carriage be tween Sweden and Great Britain is not heavy enough materially to increase the cost to the buyer, since the matches can be packed in the coffins, which Sweden exports so large ly to England.

It was not till 1885 that the Swedish inventor, Lundstrom, patented the first "safety match," which, by the by, was first manufactured in the United Kingdom by Bryant and May. Following Lundstrom's invention, Sweden became a match-making country. One of the most extensive match factories in the world is at Jonkoping, in South Sweden; it employs over 6,000 match-makers. The town is connected by railway with the port of Gothenburg, only some 115 miles distant; from there hundreds of millions of matches are yearly exported to England and other

Living is comparatively cheap, hence the low cost at which the Swedish matches can be produced.

Before the war matches were absurdly cheap in Great Britain and were lavishly used and often wasted. From six to ten matches per head of the population are daily used in the North American Scrap principal countries of Europe, and Sweden alone exports over fifty thousand million matches a year. 
