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



### Coal Development.

The people of Newfoundland have so often been disappointed in their ex-pectations of being able to purchase and use coal mined in their own country, that they cannot be blamed for being sceptical when they hear, or read new reports of coal developments on the West Coast.

Be that as it may, we believe that we are gradually leading up to the time when plenty of coal for all home use will be forthcoming from the areas on the West Coast. Already the Railway Commissioners are using the South Branch Coal on their trains. The five large motor trucks that were imported here last week have been tak-en out and are used to convey the coal from the South Branch seam to the main railway, a distance of a little over

three miles.

It is said that the "Freeman" coal is superior to that at South Branch and that there is no doubt of the and that there is no doubt of the quantity being in the St. George's area. The Gas Co. have tested this coal and have expressed themselves as well pleased with its qualities for gas production. It has been proved by competent tests to be equal to that imported from the United States. It is to be regretted, in view of the tying up of the Gas Co. and the restriction of trade in consequence, that a greater of trade in consequence, that a greater effort has not been made to place this coal on the market.

I speak with some authority, from experience as an editor, as well as a constant reader, when I say that it is an unusually cowardly and contemptible thing for a newspaper to refuse to publish the demands or explanations of a person who has been attacked in its columns, and I am confident that no paper in the colony other than the Advocate could be so lost to every instinct of decent fair play as to suppress my defence. Next time. I shall not defend, but shall proscute. and expose a persistent vilifier in the

To The Editor of the Advocate. Sir,-You have on several occasions referred in a defamatory manner to my receipt of sums of money in 1919 from the Colony for professional services. It may be that you have been misinformed, and therefore I supply certain facts of which you should be apprised, and I shall deem it merely an act of decency and justice if you publish this letter.

The Advocate contained the follow ing on Wednesday last:-

"Let Charlie James ask A. B. Morine to hand back the \$5,000 he got from the treasury after his defeat last November as a Labrador boundary fee. Let him ask A. B. Morine to hand back the \$5,000 he got last November as a Commercial Cable case fee. Let him ask A. B. Morine to hand back the \$5,000 he took for law books he dumped in the Justice Department while he was there as minister last year-old law books owned by Morine that he craved to turn into cash."

The Hon. W. F. Coaker was the first man to ask me to accept a retainer in the Labrador Boundary question, Sir Wm. Lloyd, then Premier, repeated the request, and on the 16th of May. 1919, I was appointed solicitor by order in Council. The amount of retainer was agreed upon at the time, and I received it early in July, 1919, soon after the change of Government. I was relieved of my duties, after the present Government came into office, and the Boundary question has been, I take it, the chief purpose of the Hon. Mr. Warren's long continued visit to England, where, it is understood he has retained the services of Sir John Simon, P.C., K.C., as senior counsel. I venture to believe that the cost of Mr. Warren's visit will throw into the shade the very reasonable retainer

paid to me for this matter. Early in May, 1918, I was retained by Sir William Lloyd, the Premier, to act for the Colony agaist the Cable s. in the matter of taxes upon cables landed in the colony. On the 13th of May, 1918, the Premier conas J. Murphy, I do hereby order that sulted me about a draft bill then before the Assembly. Later, I made formal claim against the companies for \$216,000 in all. I conducted, and won in the Supreme Court an action June, 1918, and the Direct and Western Union Companies thereupon paid the Claims against them in full. The Commercial Cable Co. appealed to the Judge. Privy Council and lost, and the judgment is now on the verge of payment I understand. I have been in charge of the Colony's case from the outset to this moment, and received \$2,500 in May, 1918, and \$4,000 in November, In the Matter of the Petition of Robert

I received \$1639, I think, for the law books I sold to the Department of Justice not \$5,000 as stated by you. Finally, I did not pay for them by departmental brought my bill to Council, and it was paid under Order-in-Council.





THE COFFEE-STALL FASHION.

A pleasant way of making a living in London these nights is to buy one of the new painted coffee stalls decorated with shining urns and clean glass and china and stocked with bread and eggs and pastries to suit the taste of the neighborhood you select. The stall will cost £300 (\$1,-200) and the task of working up a connection may at first be anxious, but one reward will be in the variety of the customers drawn from all classes of society. In the old days the coffee stall was a dingy affair, depending on its charm for its lights and the aroma of hot coffee, and it was patronized almost entirely by night workers or impoverished wanderers. It had an air of tragedy. Perhaps the canteen habit is partly responsible for the change, but all sorts of people have now learned the value of the stalls, and in West End streets you may see men and elegantly dressed girls, going home from the theatre or from dances, standing in front of a flaring stall enjoying coffee, sandwiches, and cakes. One man who has a stall by the gates of Hyde Park and works from half past seven at night till the same time in the morning, says he serves the taximen, night workers, dance guests, men taking an early stroll in the park, and people now requiring to travel by cheap workers' trains. ### Making Ships Jump.

A wonderful new invention is a mechanical fish that can jump. Many tributary streams would teem with traffic but for the places along their course where canals or locks would have to be built.

The new contrivance does away with these difficulties. A system of dams is constructed, each dam being furnished with a machine which lifts the boat over the obstruction. The boat-lifting mechanism

a structural steel framework

composed of two triangular shaped side members joined at the top by a horizontal transverse pivot-shaft; on this is mounted a bridge-like cradle. The two sides are made rigid by for mounting the whole upon four four sition. wheeled trucks running on a track laid ! on the bottom of the river and extending op over the dam.

The boat is hung from the overhead pivot-shaft by two bridge-like mem

bers. These are provided with a longitudinal track on which run two small carriages with pulleys, over which the boat-lifting cables extend downward from the drums in the house mounted midway between the bridge

In operation the boat is first floated between the side members and under the lifting platform. Then the small carriages are moved until the ropes drop perpendicularly, when they are connected with the special cables attached near each end of the boat.

This done, the boat with its cargo is lifted by electrical power bodiy out of the water. The framework is set in motion, and the gear-wheels toothed


