Dr. Grenfell to

Have Radio

SEVEN SETS FOR LABRADOR MIS-

with the outside world. Wilfred T Grenfell the "Labrador doctor," whose work in hehalf of natives and fishermen has received world-wide recog nization, will now have the opportui ity of trying out the value of radio in the many hospitals scattered through Labrador and Newfoundland.

Thinking first of the patients ar been spending a life of sacrifice, Dr. Grenfell is hopeful that all of the missions under the jurisdiction of the International Grenfell Association wil be equipped with the latest marvel of science, that will bring to these dreary outposts of civilization, the finest music and educational facilities.

Seven complete receiving sets of the finest grade, entirely the product of American manufacturers, are to be installed in the Grenfell missions this fall by C. A. Service, assistant secretary of the American Radio Relay League, who was assigned the work by the Grenfell Association. He left Boston Sunday, August 24, having shipped all of the radio equipment.

Much of the inspiration in behalf of the project has been furnished by Eldon Macleod, treasurer of the Mason Regulator company of Dorchester Center, and associated for some time in the work of the New England Grenfell Association. Mr. Macleod has taken a great interest in the matter and it is through his financial assistance and the co-operation of manufacturers that the expense was met.

The assistance of the American Radio Relay League was requested for the purpose of selecting the equipment and allowing its assistant secretary the necessary leave of absence in which to undertake the installing of the sets. He will also investigate the power facilities of the mission in order to determine whether it will be possible to install amateur telegraph transmitters for inter-communication.

The need for a special raio service of this kind was made evident when the middle of winter, fire destroyd one of the hospitals and the facilties were such that it was found impossible to get any word to the outside world for two months. The survivors were compelled to depend on dog teams to reach their ultimate destination and the task forms one of the interesting annals of the Grenfell As-



Babylonia, Macedonia, Persia, and

There wereonly a few thousand people in Great Tritain, and there were certainly not one million people in the whole of the Tritish Isles, and they were clothed in tins and lived in mud huts and wortipped the oak. And on us, who are the trustees of this reat Empire, which has been built up its present vast dimensions, there rests a very great responsibility to transmit it to the coming generations unimpaired. We are rich if territory, rich in civilization, and rich in liberty and freedom. But let

A man can have no legs or arms or ears or nose, and yet be a member of Parliament, but he cannot live at all if he is deprived of one vital organ. And this is true of an Empire.

Our Vital Industries. Who, then, are the vital parts of the Empire? First I would place the million men who in the grey of the early morning descend into the bowels of the earth with a safety lamp tied to them. And next to the miners I would place the men who go out on to the land every morning-in the wet and the cold, and stay there all day, tilling the soil and producing the footstuff for the people-I do not mean the asparagus and the flowers, but the wheat and the corn and the potatoes. And next to these I would place the men engaged in work connected with the railways and the merchant ships, who help to send our British goods all over the country and to our foreign

customers. Then I would place the men engaged in industrial pursuits. If these vital industries are stopped, t will mean the ruin of the country and the fall of the Empire. That is why it will have to be seriously considered as to how far we can go on spending so much as we do on amusements and pleasures and luxuries.
