A Cat Case—A great law case has recently been tried in Wales, involving the legal status and pecuniary equivalent of a cat. At the Abergavenny County Court, Joseph Holmes sued Charles Morgan for loss alleged to have sustained for the slaughter of two cats. The plaintiff is a fish-dealer, and the defendant a butcher, and the nature of the case appears from the following particulars annexed in legal form to the summons: "The damage and injury done to a cat belonging to plaintiff, caught in a trap set in your slaughter house, in or near Lion st, when the left fore leg of the said cat was broken, and the compensation in respect of the same, £1. To value of one cat belonging to the plaintiff caught and killed in the trap in the said slaughter-house, £2." The cats were named respectively Spot and Jet, and according to the testimony of the plaintiff's wife their value, and more especially that of the deceased Spot, was not to be estimated by "golden sovereigns." Legal gentlemen appeared on either side, and after a lengthy argument, and the submission of a case by the plaintiff's solicitor, the judge ruled that the cats were trespossers, and had come to their deaths by misadventure. The plaintiff was accordingly nonsuited.

London, April 2—In the House of Commons this evening the adjourned debate on the Irish Churc' question was continued at great length. The Liberal members strongly advocated Mr Gladstone's claims to office in place of Disraeli. Mr Lowe, member for Calne, quoted statistica to show that out of 100 of the population of Ireland, 78 were Catholic, 4 were Presbyterian, and 12 belonged to the Estalished Church of Ireland. The latter church was alone aided by Government, though its congregations were made up of the wealthest classes. The Irish people would be more than human could they tamely submit to this. The Tories claimed to be truly liberal; let them prove it or retire. The Liberal party in the House had a leader they could trust. They were sure he would fulfil all his professions. Mr Lowe ridiculed what he termed the legal quibbles and zig-zag course of the ministers. Such a line of action would destroy all confidence between the executive and legislative departments of the Government. Each night the ministry presented to the House a new phase of self-contradiction, until all honest mem were disgusted. The Premier had carried inconsistency and audacity to a height which the House, consulting its dignity, could not tolerate on a topic so solemn as that under discussion.

### American Despatches.

New York, April 3—The Heralit's London special has advices from Rio Janiero of March 11, giving the situation of the war in Paraguay. The allied forces had flanked the fortifications of Humaita, which has so long withstood their attacks, passed to the rear, and captured their capital. The allies now have 40,000 men, fourteen ironclads, and 20 wooden vessels, in the neighborhood, while the Paraguayans are reported to have only 12,000 men.

San Francisco, April 2—The steamer Sacramento, with New York dates to the 11th ult., arrived. Late Arizona advices confirm the reported abandonment of the Lopez reservation by the Apache and Magana Indians. The savages have commenced hostilities in eastern Arizona, and the inhabitants are calling on Gen. Halleck to station more troops in that section. Great numbers of stock have been run off and killed by the Indians.

New York, April 3rd—The Times' special says the progress made yesterday in the Impeachment case indicates that the managers will get thro' their evidence this week. The President's friends are consoling themselves with the reflection that, if a majority cannot be had on many of the collateral questions, it is not probable that two-thirds can be secured to convict. They seem to forget that minor questions afford a latitude for conscience, which the main question does not. The Senate may not pronounce guilty on all the articles, but they are tolerably certain to do so in some.
