New York, 12th.—The Times Washington special says: The best information attainable here on the subject of the Alabama claims is to the effect that since the State department rejected proposition to submit questions involved to arbitration, all the instructions to Minister Johnson have been withheld, and he has been proceeding on his own responsibility. His propositions have yet to be considered at the State Department, with which rests the question of approval or disapproval.

Bishop of Montreal and Metropolitan MEETING OF THE DIOCESAN SYNOD

MEETING OF THE DIOCESAN-SYNOD.

According to call, the special meeting of the Diocesan Synod assembled at Montreal on Tuesday for the election of a Bishop of Montreal and Metropolitan.—Divine service was held in the Cathedral in the forencon. The Bishops of Quebec, Toronto, Huron and Ontario were present, as well as a large number of clergy and laity. At three p. m., the synod met for business in the Cathedral shool-room. Seventy out of seventy-seven clerical, and 120 out of 162 lay delegrates were present. In the evening the House of Bishops sent a message to the Synod, stating that they had come to the determination that the Bishop of Montreal should be selected from amongst the Bishops of Episcopal body of the Dominion, and submitted the following names:—Bishops of Quebec, Ontario, Toronto, Huron, Fredericton and Nova Scotia. Next day a ballot was taken which stood as follows; Clerical votes cast, 72; necessary to a choice 337. ### THE GUELPH POLICE COURT.

COLLEGE GRANTS.

The question of government aid to denominational colleges in this Province has not yet been settled apparently, although if the friends of those institutions would take "No" for an answer, they certainly received it during the past year, and has also taken a lively interest in the school. For the very simple reason that the University is capable of affording the highest education to all Procialists who may seek it, and that the best secular education the Province affords is to be had there. It will require the exercise of a considerable amount of firmness on the part of the Government to enable them to carry out their resolution of stopping the donations. Petitions, cuaningly worded, praying for a continuance of the grants, are being laid in dozens before the Legislature. They want liberal and permanent-nothing short of permanent, mind ye-provision in aid of that distributive system of superior education, the claims of which have for a long time been recognized by successive Paaliaments. 


