The Telegraph to British Columbia.
The Ottawa Free Press says:—"Mr. G. Drummond, formerly Manager of the Dominion Telegraph Line in this city, yesterday applied for a patent for a new method of constructing the telegraph line to British Columbia. By his method he claims that a stronger line can be secured by the employment of a light class of poles. There is neither digging or blasting required in the construction of the line, and it is claimed that over the prairie country a dozen of men will put up and string over ten miles a day. As many as four wires may be strung on the same set of poles, without the employment of cross-arms. Mr. Drummond proposes tendering for the construction of the line of electric telegraph along the route of the Canada Pacific, for which tenders are being asked by the Government, and will, we understand, put up a mile of the new line near the city for the inspection of the members of the Government. We have seen his method of construction, and it certainly seems to possess many advantages."

BOY FOUND.—The body of a boy named Perry, son of Louis Perry, aged about 12 years, was found in the locks at Lindsay on Monday. He had been missing since Saturday.

The fame of the MAPLE LEAF nine having considerably spread during their repeated victories at the Watertown Tournament, the professionals all seem to be anxious to have a game with them in order to test their own strength, and also that of their boys. First on the list comes the widely known ATLANTICS, of Brooklyn, New York, whose first visit to our town took place yesterday. A base ball game was selected. BY TELEGRAPH TO THE MERCURY

London, July 21st.—The Times Paris despatch says:—"It is expected that the Government will inform the Assembly on Thursday that it does not consider that rejection of either Vertavon's or Ferrier's bill, or both, should involve a dissolution. This announcement will probably cause the rejection of Ferrier's bill by about a majority, the Assembly will then vote the budget and adjourn."

Paris, July 20th.—It is probable that the motion for the restoration of the Monarchy will be again introduced at today's sitting of the Assembly.

Berlin, July 20th.—The police, in accordance with a telegram from Kisingen, have searched the house of M. Cremen, editor of the Germania, and other Ultramontanes, and seized a number of documents.

St. Louis, July 20th.—Oliver P. Franks, a notorious desperado, was hanged by the Vigilants near Nevada city, Mo., on Saturday last.

New York, July 20th.—Mr. Tilton appeared before the Beecher Investigating Committee to-night, and no doubt read his statement.

Chicago, July 20th.—At a meeting of the Common Council to-night, an ordinance was passed making the fire limits and corporate limits co-extensive. Resolutions looking toward protection against fire were adopted.

A telegram from Lieut. Olmstead, in Washington Territory, July 16th, announces the defeat of the Aropahoes, by Capt. Bates. 25 Indians were killed.

Information has been received from Fort Sill, to the effect that a large number of Comanches are on the war path, and have had several bloody engagements with the United States soldiers, and the old Indian traders predict a general uprising.

Evansville, Ind., July 20th.—The Journal has advised from Orange County, saying that a half witted fellow, name unknown, who was addicted to petty thieving, was taken from the custody of the constable and hung, about five miles from French Lick Springs this morning.

New York, July 20th.—Arrived the steamship Minnesota, from Liverpool. At half-past twelve this morning, Mr. Tilton, who had been reading his statement carefully and deliberately to the committee, left Dr. Stone's residence accompanied by his friend Mr. Moulton. The committee refuse to give any information regarding the proceedings.

New York, July 20th.—The Commercial Herald, of San Francisco, of the 11th inst., states they have authentic information that the Mexican Government has made overtures to the United States to cede all Mexican territory north of a line of latitude drawn directly from the mouth of the Rio Grande to the Pacific Ocean. This amount of consideration is not settled. Heavy capitalists have been purchasing mines lying in the proposed ceded territory.

Affairs in Manitoba.
Ex-Atty-Gen. Clarke Attacked by American Roughs.
THREATENED DESTITUTION.
FORT GARBY, Man. July 20.

A telegram from St. Paul to-day gives the details of an assault upon ex-Attorney-General Clarke, last night, by an unknown rough on the streets in that city. He was struck on the head with a slung shot and severely injured. A second attack was made upon him at the train this morning by a party as he was leaving St. Paul, headed by the late chief of police at Minneapolis and one of the parties confined last year. Mr. Clarke was terribly beaten, and two of his ribs were broken.

Grasshoppers have made their appearance in myriads in this Province, and have destroyed the entire crop in the Palestine and White Mud settlements from the western limits to Togo. At last accounts they were drifting in the direction of Lake Manitoba. They have got some fifteen miles this side of Pembina, and appear to be entering the Province from all directions. Their advent has already created great depression, and the opinion is universal that unless the Dominion Government comes to the aid of the settlers either directly or by commencing railway operations between this point and Pembina, destitution to an extent never before known will result.

The Dominion Government have telegraphed to Lieutenant-Governor Morris, requesting him to procure provisions and distribute them along the Dawson Road.

R. siding, leaving a balance of \$5,064. Out of this amount the sum of \$3,533.96 had been expended up to the present time, leaving a balance in hand of \$1,530.04; but of this the North and West Wards had received only about \$900. The outstanding accounts for lumber and nails is about \$450, which would make the balance actually on hand about \$1,100. Mr. Harvey contended that by these figures the North Ward was entitled to about \$450 more.

The Treasurer, at the request of Mr. Coffee, Chairman of the Committee, read a statement showing that the amount granted the Committee had been \$5,213.66, and the amount expended \$3,533.96, leaving a balance now at the command of the Committee of \$1,679.60.

The Grasshopper Ravages.

This pest, which has been so destructive to the crops in the Western States, particularly Minnesota, is extending their depredations northward, and threaten heavy loss to the inhabitants in the new Province of Manitoba. A despatch from Fort Garry on Monday states that myriads of grasshoppers had appeared and destroyed the entire crops in the Palestine and White Mud settlements and that they were moving towards Lake Manitoba. Their advent, coupled with the fact that, as a rule, the supply of labor in Manitoba is not proportioned to the demand, has caused general depression among the settlers. The Dominion Government have acted promptly in the matter, by instructing Lieut-Gov. Morris to procure and distribute along the Dawson Road provisions sufficient to place the inhabitants out of the reach of actual and immediate want.

In Minnesota, the case is more hopeless. Governor Davis, as stated some days ago, telegraphed to the Secretary of War at Washington, asking that the Militia arms appropriation coming to that State be transferred from its original design and devoted to the supply of the sufferers. The Secretary replied that it was beyond his power to make the transfer, and he had no money at hand with which to purchase the supplies requested for those who have suffered from the grasshopper ravages.

MENNONITES FOR MANITOBA.—A party of Mennonites, numbering about three hundred, have reached Toronto during the past few days, with the intention of moving on to Manitoba. It is probable that the greater portion will go by the Dawson route, although some of them, who have wives and children in charge, have decided to take the road through the United States. The new immigrants are said to be a clean, healthy, intelligent and thrifty class of people, who are financially in a fair position. The fact that among the whole number there were only two cases of sickness as the result of the voyage, is sufficient guarantee that as regards ability to endure hardships they are well suited to the exigencies of their future sphere of labor. They were accompanied by an interpreter, and at Toronto a deputation from the German Society met them and offered all the necessary assistance to make them feel at home among our people. Mr. Shantz, of Berlin, is now in Manitoba, preparing for these immigrants by building houses for their occupation, and there can be no doubt that when once settled, they will induce others rapidly to follow.

Interesting from Arthur.

Shi.—Your numerous readers will doubtless be pleased to know that the crops in this section are unusually promising, and already so far advanced that there is nothing to fear, unless frost. The chances are, however, they will escape that.

In the meantime, in political circles, there is little of interest going on. It is generally believed that the protest against our friend Col. Higginbotham's return for this Riding to the House of Commons has collapsed, and it is whispered round among the Conservative circles who entered it, that they would be better pleased if such a step had not been resorted to, as it is found most damaging to their cause, and at the same time producing beneficial results to the Col. This is manifested from the fact that his friends here are increasing in numbers every day. The result of his election last winter has had the effect of driving the Drew party to desperation. Their extreme anger towards those who helped to bring about the defeat of their pet Mr. Drew, is cropping out in every corner. Even yesterday, as the Court opened here Mr. Jacobs could not refrain from making an ass of himself. He laid a complaint before Judge Chadwick against Mr. Moore, the officiating Bailiff, and demanded his temporary dismissal from his office as Bailiff of the Court, owing to his conduct last winter in interfering in the Election, and for working in the cause of his friend. Poor Moore was in the meantime placed upon the cutty stool of repentance, but unlike other unfortunate sinners, he did not repent. He unsuspectingly replied to friend Jacobs in a manner calculated to bring a blush to his cheek, if he had been possible. He told him he had done nothing of which he was ashamed, nor that he would not repeat it if such were required; and also that if he had him outside of the Court-room he would give him a dressing that might possibly have the effect of doing him some good in the future.

His Honor held that no such case had been established as would justify the dismissal asked, and amidst considerable amusement on the part of those in attendance, the matter was permitted to drop.

This shows, Mr. Editor, what these chaps would do if they only had the power.

It is not gratifying for the country to know that the day has come when men like Mr. Moore can in times of Elections freely exercise their franchise, and without being coerced by such miserable drones as Jacobs, through whose hating impertinence respectable citizens have hitherto been much annoyed and insulted?

Destructive Fire in Ingersoll.

Buchanan, tin shop; Dr. Walker's office, Henry O'Connor, residence; Hoyt & Williams, physicians; Henderson, watchmaker and jewellery store; George Fiesler, furrier shop; E. Caldwell, furniture store; Joseph Taylor, fish market; Mrs. Baird, Mrs. Davis, dressmakers; Wm. Taylor, residence; Frank Box, sewing machine shop; Hon. Campbell, groceries; Samuel Dav's, furniture store and shop; Mrs. Musdar, residence, over Davis' store; Mrs. William, unoccupied store; W. Bury, tailor shop; Dutton, boots and shoes. Estimated loss about \$90,000.

meadow, and kept them for pasturage, as it was heaved out by the frost in the spring.

WINTER WHEAT.—There was a large breadth of wheat sown last fall, and it promises to be a good crop. It is entirely free from the pest that usually assails it; but owing to the wet weather there is quite a large quantity of smut and some traces of rust. If the weather continues favourable, the average crop will be about 30 or 35 bushels per acre, while some land will give considerably over that figure. Your correspondent saw a very fine field belonging to Wm. Murdock, which will yield close on 45 bushels per acre if it does not lodge, which it is likely to do. Mr. Muir, opposite, will have a good yield. Wm. Mortimer has also a very fine field which will go about 35 to 40, and several others looking equally as well.

SPRING WHEAT.—This crop exceeds anything that has been seen in this section for years, and if the weather is favourable there will be a very heavy crop.

BARLEY.—There has not been much barley sown, but what there is appears to be a very heavy crop, tall and well headed.

OATS will be a very heavy crop this season, being close on the ground and rank.

PEAS are also giving indications of a very heavy crop.

POTATOES.—This crop is looking very well, but how the fight will terminate between the farmer and the potato bug time alone will tell. The bug is very destructive, and the demand for Paris Green is consequently heavy.

TURNS promise well, and to all appearance will be a fine crop.

LARGE FARM.—Your correspondent visited the farm of Mr. Hugh Roberts, Reeve of Pilkington, last week. He farms 600 acres of very fine land, on which he has a fine stone house, commanding a good view of Elora. The barn is 75 x 109 feet, with fine stabling below. The crops look well. On the place are 40 acres of winter wheat, which will yield from 30 to 35 bushels per acre. It is of the Dehil and Treadwell varieties; spring wheat, of which he has about 60 acres will yield over 25 bushels per acre. Some of the meadow will cut 3 tons of hay to the acre. The turnips are the best I have seen.
