Great Northern Preparing to Run no Fewer Than Ten Branches Across Boundary.

New Trade Avenues Will Strike Mostly Into Territory East of the Mountains.

HICAGO, Oct. 10.—The Great Northern railway management has made official announcement of no fewer than ten extensions which are to be made at once from main and branch lines into the international bound-

This action is taken to mean that J. J. Hill is preparing for an active invasion of the rich Canadian provinces that lie north of his lines in North Dakota, Montana and Washington. A glance at the map discloses the fact that Mr. Hill already has eight lines of railway pushed close to the border line, besides those which have invaded Canadian soil.

Four of the extensions northward will be known as the Sarles extension on the Dakota branch from Edmore to Sarles, wholly within Rumsey and Cavalier counties.

The Thorne extension comes next, and will start from York on the main line and extend northwestward through a rich ferming country, a distance of


