YUKON EXPEDITION TO NORTH POLE

Imbued with the idea that the conquest of the North Pole can only be accomplished by an expedition which has become acclimated to the rigors of the Arctic winter and who have had long practice with the management of dog sledges, a party of hardy ones in Dawson City, the metropolis of the Yukon Territory, have given an appreciative ear to the project of Dr. Antonie Vardele, a Frenchman at present a resident of Dawson, who is said to be an inventor and an ardent student of polar research. His plans as described to a meeting of citizens of Dawson recently do not lack novelty, and it is reported that Gen. Greely, who has been in the Arctic himself on a memorable expedition, has declared the scheme in well founded. Certainly he admitted the correctness of the judgment of the French explorer in deciding to make a trial trip as it were, in the Yukon district, the coming winter, where the stage is set very like that of civilization. The expedition will be within reach of civilization.

To Start Next June.

The real start, as reported, is to be made in June next year, so that Commander Henry Wood, in command of the expedition, will be able to have a full year to prepare for the start. The expedition is a joint one, and the research and experiment was conducted at Dawson. It is the object of this expedition, said to number 400 men, to reach the North Pole in the summer of 1906, and to make a scientific study of the region. The expedition will be composed of a number of French, American, and Canadian men, and will be under the command of Dr. Vardele. 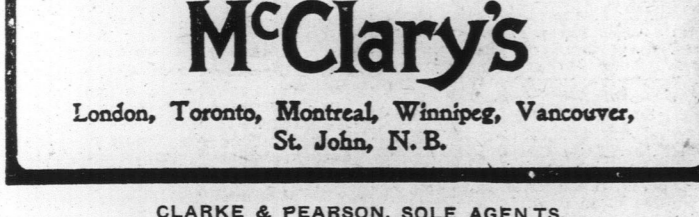

SEARCHES FOR LOST BEOTHUKAN RACE

Two expeditions, each aiming at the exploration of the unknown interior of Labrador, recently met on the shores of that desolate land.

The so-called lure of the Labrador wilds is no new infatuation. It is really as old as America, as every boy in an interesting as any ever told of any part of the world.

The last living representative of the Beothuks to be seen by white men was the Indian John, Nid, in 1820, and it is a much-contested point whether the race was exterminated or whether, as some suppose, a small remnant still survives.

The Beothuks were a much finer and handsomer race of men than the North American Indians, and hence, perhaps, the stories of a race of giants in the interior of Labrador.

About the seventh century of the present era, the entire Algonquin race was driven into the far east by tribes of Siberian origin.

In 1801 one Captain Scott and some others were from St. John's, Nfld., on a mission to the interior of Labrador.

Horrible as was the treatment which they received at the hands of the Beothuks, it was as nothing compared with the white man's treatment of the Indians.

In 1809 one Hero made an unsuccessful attempt to kidnap a number of the natives of the island, and in 1874 another expedition occurred between the white men and the Indians.

In 1822, Richard Whitbourne, who was sent by the British admiralty on a mission to Newfoundland, published an interesting account of the Beothuks, who seem to have been only one of the number of intelligent, but to have enjoyed magnificent hunting and fishing in the country.
