

Of these 23,148 were purchased at a cost of \$22,461, an average price of \$1 041. Borrowers tickets are out to the number of 8156. A classification of the calls for books where the being createst demand shows fiction to be in greatest demand, the table being as follows: Fiction 125,632, natural science and mathematics 2069, po litical and medical science 1826, theology 395, arts 2471, general literary works 6346, geography and travel 6676, history 4126, biography 4323, poetry and drama 1352, periodicals 4563, juveniles 16,104, reference books 3623; total 179,506.

The financial statement accompanying the report placed the board's assets at \$82,502, being a surplus over liabilities of \$62,101. The expenditure for mainten-ance from July 1, 1883, to Dec. 31, 1884, was \$24,959.

A resolution was passed, fendering the thanks of the board to the retiring chairman for his efficient and zealous services. In reply Mr. Hallam offered several suggestions calculated to increase the useful-ness and popularity of the library. The board then expired.






