

TRAGEDY AT EFFINGHAM.

A MAN MURDERS HIS WIFE AND DISAPPEARS.

Extraordinary Story Told by the Brother of the Murderer, Who Attempted Suicide and Was Despatched by the Said Brother. ST. CATHARINES, Ont., Sept. 1.—Late last fall a man named Alex Easterby and his wife, living at Effingham, about seven miles from here, both mysteriously disappeared. At first no attention was paid to the matter, but later on the friends of the missing parties became suspicious that all was not right and began to search for them. A brother of the missing man named Howard recently made some startling revelations. He stated that Easterby was continually quarrelling with his wife, and finally he buried her body in a garden adjoining the house, which was occupied by them. Another brother named John appears to have been party to the crime, but he has not been seen since. The brother Howard was engaged by John to assist him in removing the body of the unfortunate woman, and in the affair Howard was nearly killed. The brother John, who is now in the United States, says that he did not kill himself, but that he was shot by the woman. Upon returning to the spot pointed out by Howard and seeing the body of the woman was found buried about three feet from the surface. The belief generally is that the part of the story relating to the death of Alexander is untrue, and that the body was buried in the woods for his body without success.

CHOLERA AND ITS VICTIMS.

Progress of the Dread Disease in Southern Europe. TORONTO, Sept. 1.—There have been five more deaths since the last report was sent. At the St. Mandrier hospital to-day 9 patients were admitted, 2 died, 2 were discharged and 9 remain under treatment. At the other hospitals 3 patients were admitted, 1 died, and 35 remain under treatment. The government has sent four surgeons from Paris to assist in caring for the patients. The number of deaths to-day exceeds that of any previous day. Navy shops are closed. One death from cholera is reported at Montenegro.

One Thousand Animals Reported to Have Died. DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 1.—Prof. Gendron, of the veterinary department of the Ontario college, has been in Colchester township, Essex county, at the request of W. D. Balfour, M.P.P., investigating the cholera. He has not yet returned with a report, and will make a full report. The only known preventive is to feed carbolic acid. About 75 per cent of the hogs affected die. At least 1000 have died or been killed in South Essex, and the disease keeps spreading.

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A BANQUET TO PARRELL.

Speech of the Irish Leader—Irish Must Have Home Rule. DUBLIN, Sept. 1.—A banquet was given this evening in honor of Mr. Parrell and his Irish colleagues in the house of commons. Three hundred guests were present, exclusive of members of parliament. In his speech Mr. Parrell said that if he had the right to rule the country or make the country a crown colony. The latter would be practically tantamount to the former. He denounced the English government, saying that the continuation of them would be a terrible blow to the Irish cause. The land question was the greatest question in Ireland, and he was enthusiastically cheered throughout his speech. He reminded his hearers that the statement that home rule in Ireland was impossible emanated from the same man that once said local government was impossible. Referring to moon lighting outrages in Kerry, he said that the people were to have some excuse in their desperation and poverty, he prayed for Ireland to be free, as such action would be a great step towards the goal.
