U. S. Jottings.

By DOTTIE LONESOME.

Porto Rico is now lost to Spain. October 18th the I-land passed into the hands of this government. Military rule will prevail, likewise the postal rules and arrangements as now in operation, until Congress shall meet this fall and provide a form of government and postal department for the islands. The peace commission now in session at Paris, arranging the terms of settlement of the war with Spain, seems to be putting Cuba and the Phillipines under the stars and stripes. There is no certainty as yet, Porto Rico being the only colony transferred to this government.

During the coming session of Congress there will be introduced a bill which will provide for the use of postage stamps as a medium of exchange. The department will not redeem unused stamps for cash at present owing to the commission basis on which many hundred of the smaller offices are operated under. The plan to be introduced will however, do away with the above obstacle, by being cancelled when purchased. The bill is very lengthy and will be hailed with approval from all who do any sort of mail order business.

Many changes in color have been made lately in all our stamps. It is impossible to give a complete list at present. Changes have been announced that have not appeared as yet, but very shortly we hope to be able to furnish a complete list.

There has been a noticeable thinness to our stamp papers during the last few months. One or two enterprising publishers have kept their papers up to the standard, but the average publisher has had a close call to make ends meet. The ever regular and never forgotten, "New is the time to subscribe" has not had the financial attention wished for and the low prices have not been such as to tempt dealers to advertise. A brisk trade seems assured and we hope our papers will thicken up as the season grows older.

A contract for the printing of our stamped envelopes has been awarded to the Plympton Morgan Co., which will make us another set of stamped envelopes to add to our collections. The dies will have to be altered in some secret way something similar to the Continental and National prints of our own stamps in the seventies. It may be that the colors may be changed.

Philately has been admitted as a science by the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences, and has been given a department to be known as "Section of Philately." Lectures, business and exchange are the features already established. To some collectors philately is a science, to others a mania, and to the most of us a hobby. The hobby collector would be satisfied to have one variety of each denomination of the first issue of Brazil. The Science collector must have eighteen varieties of the 30R and 90R, and twenty four varieties of

Newfoundland.

Did the readers of the *ADVOCATE* ever notice the originality of the Newfoundland stamps. Take for instance the late issue—the $\frac{1}{2}$ cent Dog's head, the 1 cent Prince of Wales, the 2 cent Codfish, 3 cent Queen Victoria, 5 cent Seal and 10 cent Whale, all representing the different occupations, pursuits, etc., etc., of the game little colony. The Cabot issue—1 cent Queen, 2 cent Cabot, 3 cent Cape Bonivista, 4 cent Newfoundland sport, 5 cent mining, 6 cent logging, 8 cent fishing, 10 cent ship, etc, all serve to advertise the country to a great extent besides making it interesting and instructive to the philatelist. And here comes the advantage of collecting to a geographical student. Perhaps all collectors do not get all these stamps but a catalogue only costs a trifle and from a perusal of it now and then he can learn as much as in his text book, although perhaps he does not comprehend it and never thinks he got it from his stamps. The new issue is slowly coming out and from all indications it will be fully as interesting as its predecessors. I have seen the 1 cent, 2 cent and 3 cent which have the profiles of the Queen, Prince of Wales and Princess of Wales and I believe it is the intention of displaying the Royal Family in set. However time will tell and all active collectors should meantime keep an eye on St. Johns.

New Zealand.

By INVERTED WATERMARK.

The new issue for New Zealand was placed on sale throughout the colony. The same day a great rush took place for the $2\frac{1}{2}$ p error. The Government did all in its power to keep the stamp from being bought up by speculators. On the first day of sale no one was allowed to buy more than sixty specimens, on the third day this was reduced to twelve, and within a week the whole supply was practically exhausted.

A large proportion of the issue has fallen into the hands of non philatelists for speculative purposes, and I know of several having in their possession some hundreds, and who will perhaps never place them on the market.

Looking at the number issued (only some 300,000) which is very small, the stamp must become very valuable. I consider that only a small quantity were used, and I think the stamp will be far better canceled than unused. The error was replaced by the corrected spelling "Wakatipu." About the same quantity was printed. This supply is now getting low, and it is reported that the next printing will be on watermarked paper. If so, it will make three different varieties of $2\frac{1}{2}$ p within a space of six months.

Peru.

The 1c green was put into circulation September 27th.

On Sept. 19th orders were sent to New York for 50,000 each of the 5 and 10 sols stamps. These will soon be in use.

Manilla.

Correspondence coming from Manilla arrives bearing the odd cancelling marks: "Philippine station, San Francisco, Cal." "U. S. Military P. O. Sta., San Francisco, Cal., U. S. A., No. 1 Philippines."

A stamp printed in brown and resembling the 10 cent orange of the 1869 issue, bearing the inscription "Army Frank" has been seen and has created quite a talk. It appears that it was created by some U. S. army official, who is interested in stamp collecting, for the money there is in it. Washington Post Office officials deny that any sanction was given the stamp and say that it is illegal. So it is of no value whatever except as a curio.

Postal Reform.

The postoffice is not a means of taxation. On the contrary, it is "a public service, a machine to be put in motion and run to its capacity wherever communication and transportation, which are among the necessities of modern life, are required by the people." The postal service comes so close to every family, that it can readily be made one of the greatest agencies for promoting civilization, advancing progress and even for preserving peace among the nations. To this end, the postoffice should afford daily mail with free collection and delivery in country as well as city, a parcels post, a convenient and cheap means for transmitting money, and insurance of registered matter. Worked on this liberal basis the postal revenues would soon warrant one-cent letter postage at home and an international two-cent rate. The parcels post should in time do for 10 cents

what the express companies now charge 25 cents for, and if the postoffice "took over" electric communication, Wanamaker's dream of 3 cent telephones and 10 cent telegrams would be realized in less than ten years. All this is what the new American postal league (Box 2361, Boston, Mass) aims to secure.—*Farm & Home.*

Wants an International Postal Stamp.

From *Inland Printer.*

Madison, Wis., September 7, 1898,
To the Editor:—

The current number of the *Inland Printer* contains a communication from a London firm of type foundry concerning the discourtesy—to put it mildly—of some of their American correspondents in neglecting to prepay sufficiently foreign mail.

The fact has come to me—it is somewhat relevant to the above, and was prompted by it—that if an American wanted to correspond with an Englishman and desired to enclose a stamp for reply, he would find his own stamp was "unavailable for prepayment of foreign mail from England," to quote from my source of information.

It is probable that this state of affairs comes up quite frequently in the commercial world. It is not a very profitable thing to buy an international money order for 5 cents and pay 10 cents—2 cents for revenue—for the order. Yet that is what one has to do if one wants to be strictly "white" toward his correspondents.

We have International Money Orders, why not International stamp, to be available throughout the Postal Union.

There is certainly merit enough in the question to deserve attention from Congress or someone who has a "stand in wid de Union." Otto Kney.
