

Exchange of Notes (July 6 and 8, 1933), Concerning Commercial Relations Between Canada and Austria

The Secretary of State for External Affairs of Canada to the Austrian Minister at London.

London, July 6, 1933

Dear Minister:

I have the honour to inform you that I have just been advised that an Order was passed by the Government of Canada which grants the Inter-Trade subject to the usual direct shipment provision, to Austrian goods from July to the 31st December, 1933.

It is understood that your Republic will grant to Canadian goods the same most-favoured-nation tariff.
