# CONSCRIPTION ISSUE

Two Sides Are Reported to Be in | Process Lining Up.

LONDON. Dec. 24.-The repeated postponements of Premier Asquith's Earl of Derby's recruiting campaign are now said to be due to pressure brought to hear on the ministers by anti-conscriptionists. It also is alleged that the premier can only hold his ministry intact by introducing some form of conscription, altho he himself is not in favor of that course. According to parliamentary gossip, the number of single men attested under the recruiting scheme was only a quarter of the total of single men on the national registry, and it is asserted that when men unfit for service or engaged in munitions work are eliminated only a very few will be available for the army. Of course, it is impossible to confirm these statements before the official figures are forthcoming but there is little doubt that there is a strong force within the cabinet working for conscription on the ground that the single men





# A Message to the Vo From the Council of the N January 1, you, the voters of Toronto, will have in your hands the power to vote on the Hydro Radial By-Law, and, by that vote, tie up the city in a partnership agreement with thirty other municipalities. Is this agreement for 10, 20, or even 50 years? No, it is a renewable 50-year agreement---a perpetual agreement. Good or bad, it is permanent, and a mistake made now is irrevocable.

The Council of the Board of Trade, as a body of business men earnestly seeking to conserve the best interests of the city, is unanimously against this

You would not do it for a single year. This agreement calls for a permanent rrangement.

And note this! This is not an agreement with Sir Adam Beck. This deal is a deal by which Toronto gives her streets, contributes more than \$4,000,000, at a time when if ever the city's resources needed to be conserved, they should be, to a partnership under the control of a Commission. And, mind you, not the present Hydro Commission only, made up of certain individuals, but of the succeeding Commissions down through all time, appointed by whatever government may be in power. For this is a perpetual arrangement on which your vote is to be cast.

Now then, men of Toronto, who, until this By-Law is passed, will still have your "say" as to what the city will and will not do; now then! Remember that voting down this By-Law does not mean voting against radials.





# BIG NET PROFITS MADE BY BANK OF TORONTO

Six Hundred and Sixty-Three Thousand Dollars Surplus Earned in Year.

The first war year statement of the Bank of Toronto for the twelve months ending Nov. 30 last, places the net profits for the period at \$663,074.46, and shows carried forward till next year no less than \$439,382.64, against \$402,810.93 carried over from the preceding year to this year.

In making up their net profits, the bankers made full provision for all bad and doubtful debts, and deducted expenses, the interest accrued on deposits, and rebates on current discounts.

The bank also paid a total of \$550,000 in dividends, in four of 2% per cent., and a war tax of \$30,502.75 on circulation for nine months.

The total deposits in the bank amount to \$48,769,766.77, of which \$10,529 are non-interest-bearing. The total value of notes in circulation is \$5,504,704.

The following grants were made by the bank in the year: Officers' pension fund, \$25,000; Patriotic Fund, \$15,000; British Red Cross, \$2500; Belgian Relief Fund, \$15,000; Toronto General Hospital, \$2000. In the general statement, the total assets of the bank are \$66,767,203.19. In current coin and Dominion notes, the bank holds \$8,651,035. It holds \$1,155,161 of railway and other bonds, and \$1,576,575,53 of Canadian municipal securities, and \$647,939 of Dominion and provincial government securities. The call and short loans in Canada on bonds, debentures and stocks total \$2,607,124.59. Of other current loans and discounts in Canada, the bank's statement shows \$41,954,495.48.

NEW YORK, Dec. 24.—Frank Baker is willing to come to the Yankees for a three-year contract at \$12,000 per year, and \$10,000 of the purchase money. Hamilton 221 behind the Yankees' owners pay Connie Mack for his release. Since the noted home run hitter named those figures the deve of peace has put in an appearance and war time salaries appear doomed. Baker admits that he has only a few years to play in the majors, so it might be advisable to lower his figures if he cares to take full advantage of limited opportunity. The Yankees may soon be in a position to sign younger players than Baker at moderate salaries without spending a small fortune for the privilege. With the Feds in the field for his services Baker had some reason for talking in such large figures, but with the opposition removed the situation is quite different. Messrs. Ruppert and Huston have agreed to pay a sum which would make the acquisition of Baker a big gamble. With so many players available in the near future they may withdraw their ofter and then Baker will have to accept a small salary or remain in retirement.






