LONDON, Dec. 24.—The German reports that they have overtopped the summit of Hartmanns-Weilerkopf in the Vosges, also claimed yesterday, are not substantiated by the French official report of tonight, which says that after a violent bombardment of the French positions on this mountain, the Germans launched an attack on the whole front of the positions recently captured from them, and lying between the summit of Hartmanns-Weilerkopf and the approaches to Wattwiller, and that the enemy was repulsed everywhere.

GOVERNMENT TAKES STEPS TO AID GRAIN MOVEMENT

CONSCRIPTION ISSUE IS DIVIDING HOUSE?

Two Sides Are Reported to Be in Process of Lining Up

LONDON, Dec. 24.—The repeated postponements of Premier Asquith's announcement of the figures of the Earl of Derby's recruiting campaign are now said to be due to a controversy brought to bear on the ministers by anti-conscriptionists. It is also alleged that the premier's delay is due to his ministry being divided by the introduction of some form of conscription, although he himself is not in favor of that course. According to published papers, the number of single men attested under the recruiting scheme was only a quarter of the total of single men on the national registry, and it is asserted that when men unfit for service or engaged in industrial work are eliminated only a very few will be available for the army. Of course, it is impossible to confirm these statements before the final figures are forthcoming, but there is little doubt that there is a strong force within the cabinet working for conscription on the grounds that the single men responded inadequately to the appeal of the Earl of Derby.

COAL SUPPLY OF PARIS NEED CAUSE NO FEARS

All Danger of Crisis Past—Domination of Socialists Denied.

PARIS, Dec. 24, 10.15 p.m.—Paris is in no danger of a coal famine, Marcel Sembat, minister of public works, announced in the chamber of deputies today while speaking on a bill regarding the sale and distribution of coal. M. Sembat said the stock of coal in the capital actually exceeds 200,000 tons, and that all danger of a crisis regarding the supply was ended. There has been an import of 1,200,000 tons, of which 200,000 tons belong to the government.

CHRISTMAS TO BE CELEBRATED BY CANADIANS

Divine Service Will Be Held at Headquarters by Chaplains

GIFTS FOR BRIGADES

Portable Cinematographs Are Sent to Front by Contingent Association

Canadian Associated Press Cable. LONDON, Dec. 24.—Col. Steacy, director of the Canadian chaplain service, gives particulars of the arrangements for the celebration of Christmas among the troops of the Dominion, in the war zone. There are two large halls at the Canadian corps headquarters, in which from 7 in the morning, thru the forenoon an hourly service will be held on Christmas Day. Sixty large motor-lorries have been requisitioned for bringing the men to the services from every part of the line. Each denomination of course will have its own facilities. Col. Steacy has just returned from the front, where some days back he had the privilege of presenting 59 candidates for confirmation to Bishop Gwyn of Khartoum. The candidates ranged in rank from the private to the lieutenant-colonel, and they belonged to every province in Canada. He was also present at the presentation to the officers and men of the 57th Battalion of the decorations recently conferred. The presentations were made by General Plummer in the presence of Generals Currie and Turner, and their respective staffs. Gen. Alderson was also present. There are ninety chaplains. The Canadian divisions now have the benefit of the services of 90 chaplains. The original contingent brought over 28 chaplains, which caused wonder among the English authorities, seeing that the English regulations provide for only five chaplains for each division. At Shorncliffe and Bramshott camps, services will be held tomorrow, and tomorrow night concerts will be given in conjunction with the Y.M.C.A. The contingent association has sent to each brigade at the front a Christmas gift of portable cinematographs, arrangements have been made for a regular supply of new films.

Black of ward four. Contrary to expectation there will be an election in ward three, Thomas Vance remaining in the field.

AUSTRIAN ATTACK FAILS ON HEIGHTS OF GORIZIA

Timely Arrival of Italian Reinforcements Checks Formidable Assault.

ROME, via London, Dec. 24, 10.25 p.m.—The war office communication issued today says: "On the heights west of Gorizia early Thursday morning the enemy attempted an attack on our position opposite Grafenberg. By the intervention of our artillery and the prompt arrival of reinforcements it was repulsed. "The Austrians were driven back to the heights of Gorizia. Our heavy artillery fired continuously and our machine guns advanced against our trenches east of Steitz, but retired in disorder under our well-directed fire."

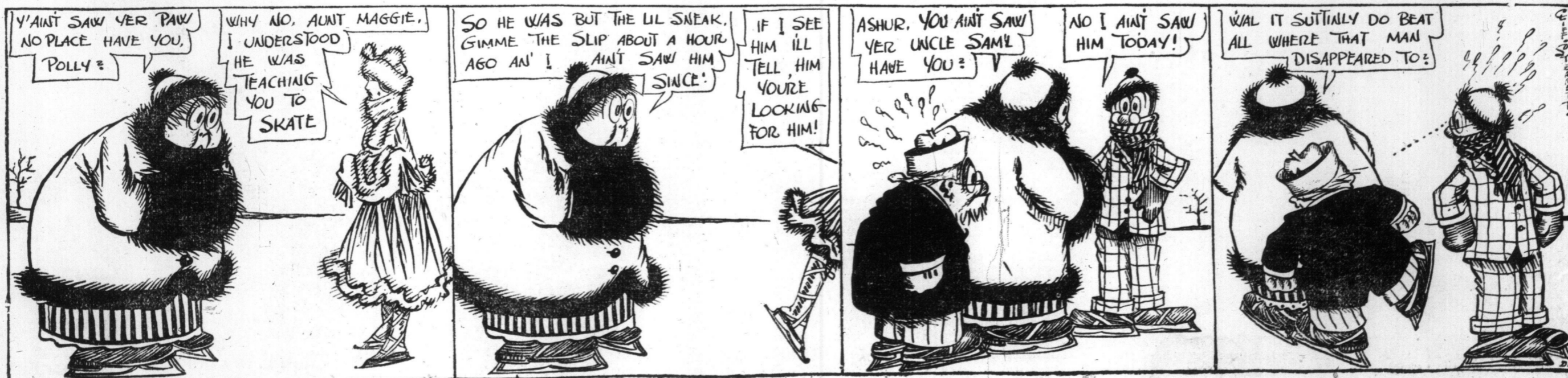

SIMPSON ISSUES WRIT AGAINST SAM McBRIDE

Candidate for Controller Charges Aldermanic Candidate With Slander at Nomination Meeting.

As a sequel to the Ward Three nomination meeting in Victoria Hall on Thursday night, James Simpson has issued a writ to recover unstated damages for alleged slander from Ald. Sam McBride.

The writ, which was issued at Osgoode Hall yesterday, is endorsed as follows:

"The slander complained of was the speaking on the 23rd day of December, 1915, at the City of Toronto, by the defendant of the words following:

"That the plaintiff would not stand for that flag (the Union Jack), and that the plaintiff stood for the red flag of anarchy and Socialism."

"That the plaintiff was playing into the hands of Germany, and that the plaintiff was elected a delegate to a conference at Berlin to confer with the Kaiser and all the other Socialists."

"That the plaintiff had done nothing for the allies, and that all he had done was to encourage the Germans."

"That the plaintiff was not a loyal British subject, and other words imputing treason and disloyalty to the plaintiff."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available land in the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house, containing a kitchen where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each pre-empted area, after earning homestead certificate. Must reside six months in each of the three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

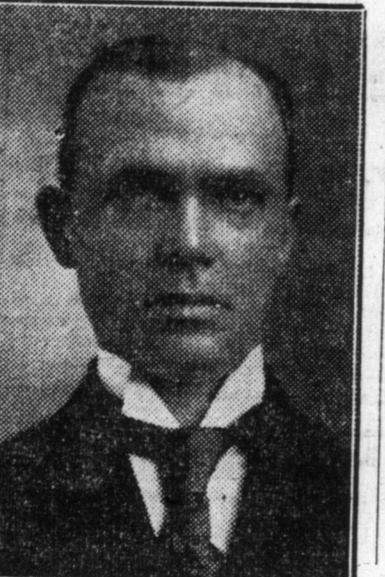

That Hydro Radial A Message to the From the Council of the

ON January 1, you, the voters of Toronto, will have in your hands the power to vote on the Hydro Radial By-Law, and, by that vote, tie up the city in a partnership agreement with thirty other municipalities.

Is this agreement for 10, 20, or even 50 years? No, it is a renewable 50-year agreement—a perpetual agreement. Good or bad, it is permanent, and a mistake made now is irrevocable.

The Council of the Board of Trade, as a body of business men earnestly seeking to conserve the best interests of the city, is unanimously against this proposal at this time and in the present form.

We have no quarrel with the idea of radials for Toronto. We have no quarrel with the idea of government ownership. We have no antagonism for Sir Adam Beck as sponsor for the present scheme.

We simply claim, and ask every man who has a vote on this Hydro Radial By-Law to remember that the best idea in the world can be made a curse instead of a blessing by unwise handling.

First of all, as business men, we ask you, will you go into any business partnership without a complete understanding of the deal? Certainly not.

Well, then, do you understand the details of this deal beyond the mere fact that it provides for a radial line from here to London? Have you read the agreement that this By-Law ratifies? If you have not, and therefore cannot understand it, will you guarantee over \$4,000,000 on something you do not understand?

Again we say we are not raising an issue against the idea of radials, of government ownership, or any individual, but, again we also say, that there never was a business deal yet with anyone, on any subject, that did not call for a clear understanding before the deal was put through, and the voters of Toronto have not at this moment a clear understanding of what is involved by this deal.

Is the City Council safe-guarding the city's interests? Has it scrutinized each phase of this important subject and secured expert legal advice? Gentlemen—Do you know that the City Council has not even considered this By-Law, clause by clause?

Further—inconceivable as it may seem—do you know that the city's legal department has not even been asked to scrutinize the agreement and pass on it? What we want—voters of Toronto!—is time to go into this subject thoroughly.

We want to know what we are doing before we do it. Is not this reasonable? If the plan is good, we want to see that its good is not nullified by bad features in the agreement.

For Instance: Do you know that under this agreement, if the Hydro Radial By-Law passes,

Hydro Radial By-Law The Voters of Toronto the Toronto Board of Trade

You would not do it for a single year. This agreement calls for a permanent arrangement.

And note this! You men, whose vote will decide this thing, that any great radical move in the matter of operation, construction, equipment, or extension of this proposed railroad, any such move, no matter how vital and serious it may be to Toronto, is voted upon, not by the different municipalities themselves, but on the contrary, the councils of these 31 municipalities have absolute power without submitting the issue to the people at all.

This means that a councilman in the township of Etobicoke, for example, or any other town or township on this proposed radial, will have more power on an issue vital to each taxpayer in Toronto than we ourselves will have.

Once we have voted in favor of the By-Law we never again can effectively raise our voice, and as for depending upon our City Council, you can see for yourselves how much the present City Council has safe-guarded us, when it has not, even as a Council, considered the By-Law clause by clause, or taken the most ordinary of all business precautions, that of asking the City's Legal Department for an opinion.

Well, you say, after all, even granting these things (for they cannot be disputed), can we not look to a man like Sir Adam Beck to see that things are run right and everybody's interests watched?

The point is well made—nobody questions Sir Adam's sincerity and good intentions. But, forgetting even for a moment the extremely dangerous features of the agreement, let us ask ourselves this: "Has Sir Adam any perpetual lease on life?"

This is not an agreement with Sir Adam Beck. This deal is a deal by which Toronto gives her streets, contributes more than \$4,000,000, at a time when if ever the city's resources needed to be conserved, they should be, to a partnership under the control of a Commission. And, mind you, not the present Hydro Commission only, made up of certain individuals, but of the succeeding Commissions down through all time, appointed by whatever government may be in power. For this is a perpetual arrangement on which your vote is to be cast.

Now then, men of Toronto, who, until this By-Law is passed, will still have your "say" as to what the city will and will not do; now then! Remember that voting down this By-Law does not mean voting against radials.

Not at all. It only means deferring the matter until we all get more information—until we can separate the good from the bad—then we can have our radials if we want them and sleep easy because we know that we have, like good business men, thoroughly informed ourselves before we took a step from which there is no retreat.

Remember :

1. Toronto gives her streets and guarantees one-third of the money (over four million dollars), and has —what?— ONE VOICE IN 31.
2. That no matter what the future brings forth, by the terms of this agreement, the electors of Toronto have nothing to say.
3. That this agreement is PERPETUAL, regardless of the personnel of future Hydro Commissions.
4. That Toronto is as valuable to the Hydro as the Hydro is to Toronto; we can afford to be careful and take our time.
5. That a measure which has nothing to fear from investigation need not object to it.
6. That a vote against this Hydro Radial By-Law does not mean a blow against radials, but simply, that, as a good business man—a partner—you prefer that action be DEFERRED until we can have a clear understanding of the vital details of the transaction.


