THE CHAMPION OF LIGHT WEIGHTS. About Lavigne and his Victories Over Walcott-The Black Fighter's Record.

SUGAR BEET CULTIVATION. Important Report of the Secretary of Agriculture. RESULT OF EXPERIMENTS. The United States Can Make All the Sugar the People Require.

Case Sugar Supply Will Always Be Limited. But Capabilities for the Production of Beet Sugar Are Unlimited. Experiments have shown much better than anticipated. Exports of Beet to Foreign Countries—Inspection of Beets.

Washington, D.C., Nov. 1.—The report of the Secretary of Agriculture is unusually important this year because of the efforts Secretary Wilson has been making to increase the exports of agricultural products and still further stimulate the cultivation of sugar beets. He has a firm conviction that the people of the United States can provide their own sugar, without being dependent upon Cuba or any foreign country for their supplies.

Second in Importance in the work of the agricultural department last year were the reports on the sugar beet industry, and of its success the secretary says, in most encouraging terms, as he announced in these reports to the House.

Secretary Wilson commenced an enquiry last year to ascertain what obstacles were in the way of the successful introduction of beet sugar into this country. He has also pointed out defects in the culture and packing which interfere with the extension of the trade.

Inspection of Beets. One of the most important recommendations in the report of the Secretary of Agriculture concerns the inspection of beets in transit. It has been a very perplexing question, under the law as it stands, government inspectors are authorized to condemn only such beets, pork, veal, mutton, etc., as is offered for export to foreign countries, and which are found to be adulterated.

The contractor, however, declared all responsibility for the delay to be his, and I think he will be held responsible for damages to all unreasonable delay that has occurred in the completion of the building, and that stringent measures will be taken to secure the completion of the building as soon as possible."

SIR CHAS. HIBBERT UPPER
Converses About Armed Ves-
sels on the Lakes.

PRESENCE OF THE YANTIC
Was the Text of the Interview With
the Late Minister of Marine.

The United States has for years been willfully violating the spirit of the Treaty—The Yantic would cut a sorry figure in combat with modern War Vessels—The La Plante Murder was Cold-Blooded—Other News From Montreal.

Montreal, Nov. 1.—(Special.)—Sir Charles Hibbert Upper, while here was interviewed regarding the treaty between Great Britain and the States touching armed vessels on the lakes. The conversation was, of course, brought on by the presence here of the Yantic. The ex-Minister said: "It is not strange that the United States has for so many years been regularly ignoring, if not willfully violating, the spirit of the treaty by the presence of the Yantic. They have constructed a number of powerful war vessels on the lakes and called them revenue cruisers. True, they are not armed as warships, but they are powerfully built, and are equipped even with the mounds for guns, and for guns very good indeed. They are 1800 tons, and in an hour or two they could be converted into gunboats of a very formidable type for any armament they may carry. The Yantic is an old naval vessel of the type of the Yantic to the lakes introduced a few years ago.
