
# A VISIT TO THE SUNLIGHT SOAP WORKS, TORONTO.

in millions of homes in all parts of the world. A climb of three flights of stairs brought us to the top floor of the build-ing, which is known as the boiling-room. A glass roof admits plenty of flight, and everything is as clean as the home of a thrifty housewife. Down the middle of the room was a row of im-mense pans, with a capacity of 60 tons each. These pans were in active oper-ation at the time of my visit, and as I leaned over the huge crater of boiling, seething soap. I could not detect the slightest offensive odor. The oils and fats are contained in storage tanks located in the basement. These tanks feed the boiling pans by the sys-tem of pipes without the raw ingredi-ents having to be touched by the hand. In fact, the Sunlight plant is so perfect that the raw material is scarcely hand-led by an employe until the octagon bars are ready to be wrapped up for shipment. We now descended to the floor below,

We now descended to the noor below, where I saw the bottom of the pans which come down several feet below the upper floor. Under each boiling pan is another large tank, into which pan is another large tank, into which the residue, after making Sunlight Soap, is allowed to flow and settle, the residue being composed of salt and glycerine. This material is taken from here to the glycerine distillery, where, after a complicated chemical process, it is split up into its component parts of glycerine and salt. 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

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


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
