

SAID BAUFORD BROKE UP SPEAKER ADJOURNS AID PLEDGED FOR MASSES

Unprecedented Occurrence Followed Allegation That Premier Tricked Concerning Colonial Conference.

**LYTTELTON HOWLED DOWN
CENSURE VOTE FOR BALFOUR**

London, May 22.—The sitting of the house of commons to-night was marked by scenes of the wildest disorder, growing out of a motion by Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman to adjourn the house in order that he might discuss the charge against Premier Balfour of having violated his pledge not to deal with the subject of colonial preference without first appealing to the country. Alfred Lyttelton, secretary of state for the colonies, was put up to reply to the Liberal leader, but the members of the opposition shouted him down every time he attempted to speak, even after he had exhausted every effort to quell the turbulence, put into force for the first time a new rule empowering him to adjourn the house in case of grave disorder.

The matter came up at the afternoon sitting, when Premier Balfour, in reply to questions asked by him, in connection with the subject of colonial preference, announced that he had intended to call a conference with the colonial premiers in London early in 1906. The Liberal papers this morning interpreted Premier Balfour's remarks on the subject in the house of commons yesterday as showing that some sort of compact had been arrived at between him and Joseph Chamberlain to defer the dissolution of parliament until next February.

Mr. Chamberlain himself, dining with his supporters last night (Monday), is reported to have remained in the precincts of the commons, but never entered the house during the scene.

**UNCLE SAM MAY BE THE NEXT
TO HAVE ROJAS AS VISITOR**

Intrusion in Philippine Waters May Cause Some Further Neutrality Discussion.

Paris, May 22.—Much attention is given here to Vice-Admiral Rojensky's probable passage into the Pacific north of the island of Luzon, and suggestions are made that the reported intentions of the Russian to rendezvous at the island of Babuyan will give the American authorities, in the Philippines, the right to demand in preserving remote points against the incursions of Admiral Rojensky's fleet, which is reported to be in the waters of the Indo-China. The naval expert of the Temps lengthily points out that the Russian fleet brought by various steamers to Chinese ports confirms the previous view that Rojensky is skirting the north of the Philippines into the Pacific, avoiding the Japanese torpedo attacks and the mines in the Straits of Formosa, and the subsequent concentration of the Japanese fleet in the straits of Korea.

SETTLEMENT CHANGES GOOD.

Chicago, May 22.—After a conference of several hours, representatives of the Teamsters' Union and of the employers' association declared at midnight that the prospect of a settlement of the strike are excellent, and that the end of the trouble may be looked for at any time within the next 48 hours.

OBTAINED PASSPORTS UNLAWFULLY

Englishman to Appear in Bow St. Court on Serious Charge.

London, May 22.—An Englishman named McCullough, who is understood to be an actor, and who procured the passport found on the body of the bomb manufacturer killed by an explosion of one of his own bombs in the Hotel Bristol, St. Petersburg, on March 11, will be one of those who will be arraigned at Bow-street police court to-morrow on the charge of procuring to obtain passports for unlawful purposes.

SYMPATHY FOR RUSSIAN JEWS.

Canadiana Will Pay in Support of Jewish Employment Bureau.

New York, N.Y., May 22.—The 53rd annual convention of District No. 1, of the Independent Order of B'nai B'rith, which includes Canada, Newfoundland and New York State, at its session here to-day passed resolutions of sympathy for the victims of persecutions in Zhitomir and other places in Russia.

FIFTY MILES OF FIGHTING BIG ARMIES ARE ENGAGED

Battle Beginning Friday Night Develops a Hand-to-Hand Conflict.

Chanchun, Manchuria, May 22.—The armies are engaged on a battle line of forty-five to fifty miles, extending from the northerly bank of the Liao River west of the railway to Hailuogang, on the old Chinese road to the Yalu River. The main divisions probably are not more than fifteen miles apart, but since Friday night the advance columns have been continuously in conflict, with varying results.

They will expend \$250,000 on plant in St. Boniface, if exemptions are granted, and will erect a 4,000-barrel mill.

BABY DROWNED OR SUFFOCATED DEATH NOT DUE TO WOUNDING CARR GIRL REMANDED A WEEK

Coroner Begins His Inquiry into Result of Post-Mortem is Rather Favorable to the Unfortunate Girl Under Arrest.

That Josie Carr in cold blood murdered the infant child of William Murray of 89 Wellington-avenue is a matter of doubt which has arisen from the testimony heard by Coroner Johnson last night. Evidence was given which showed that the death of the baby had been due to drowning and exposure rather than to the injuries which it would have received had it been thrown down the bank, as Josie in her confession tells. The coroner's jury empaneled in made up of Robert Ennis, 10 Sward-street; Charles Hardinge, 218 Parliament-street; Thomas Head, 214 Parliament-street; James Goddard, 251 Berkeley-street; Thomas Heath, 326 Queen-street; William Gossard, 333 East Queen-street; Benjamin Rothwell, 126 Morse-street; William Dallimore, 253 East Queen-street; George Farr, 124 Broadview-avenue; and John Thompson, 12 Broadview-avenue. County Crown-Attorney, William Gossard, a representative of T. C. Robinette, for the defence, presented the case.

The first to be examined was P. C. George Wilson (19), who had received a message from headquarters at 10:30 Saturday morning to go to the Grand Trunk Railway crossing at Greenwood-avenue and get the body of an infant which had been found in a culvert nearby, and learn whether it was a case to be dealt with by the city or county authorities. About 11 o'clock he saw the body first. The coroner then described the location of the scene of the murder. When he first saw it, with the exception of a small undershirt, the baby was naked, and he did not see any of its clothing lying about.

Who directed you to the spot where the body was found? he was asked.

"A little girl named Josephine Carr," the officer answered.

He asked if the jury of having asked about the body that he had been sent for, and found no one that knew of it until he came to the Carr house, where he found Josie standing outside, apparently waiting for the arrival of the police.

Murray as a Witness.

William Murray, father of the dead child, said that he last saw his baby when he went to work on Friday morning, and that it was then well and healthy. Shortly before 1 o'clock in the afternoon, he received a message by phone from his wife, asking him to come to the Queen-street entrance Eaton's store immediately. He wheeled a chair and drove there when he met his wife who told him of the strange disappearance of the child. The child had been gone about 15 minutes, while she made some purchases in the store, and that when she returned she found the little one crawling in its baby talk and apparently in a country condition. She took the child to the store and this time was gone but for three minutes, and when she returned the baby had disappeared.

Could Crawl Around.

T. C. Robinette's representative, on the conclusion of Mr. Murray's testimony, asked him if the baby was strong and active. He replied in the affirmative.

"Could it creep or walk?"

"Well, no, it could not exactly creep, but it could founder around and crawl a little. It was nine months and three days old," was the reply.

WHAT TASCHEREAU DIDN'T DO.

Denial of Report of His Request to Be Relieved.

Ottawa, May 22.—(Special)—The former minister of justice, T. C. Taschereau, secretary to the governor-general, dated Toronto, throws more light on the Taschereau incident. The telegram is addressed to the secretary of the parliamentary press gallery here, and says:

DEATH FROM SUFFOCATION.

28 BIG SHEET STEEL ROLLS
TO LOCATE AT MORRISBURG

Constitute Works of New Company
Which Will Finally Employ
3000 Hands.

Montreal, May 22.—(Special)—J. Wesley Allison and G. H. Meldrum of New York have secured control of the Canadian Tin Plate and Sheet Steel Toronto, and have interested Montreal and Toronto capitalists, with the result that the manufacture of tin and sheet steel will be begun in Morrisburg. The capital stock will be \$10,000,000, and the Montreal interest so far is represented by Thomas Davidson & Co. Sheet steel and tin plate are imported into the Dominion at the rate of \$5,000,000 per year and it is this home market that the company has undertaken to capture. It requires 23 mills to turn out all the sheet steel and tin plates required in Canada, and when completed they will give employment to 2000 men. On Monday next work will be begun at Morrisburg, and by October 3 mills will be ready for work, employing 600 men. Construction of twenty more will be only a question of time. The raw material will be Sydney steel, brought in bars to the place of manufacture, and then rolled into sheets. The machinery will be considered, another good customer for the Dominion Steel Company will have been secured. Messrs. Allison and Meldrum are accompanied by W. D. Lewis of Cardiff, Wales, who contacted a similar mill in Joliet, Ill., and another at Johnston, Pa. John Main, vice-president of the Polson Works, Toronto, and W. K. George, president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, are among those interested.

COMMONERS DISCUSS DIVORCE

And After Unusual Proceedings,
Sanction It.

Ottawa, May 22.—(Special)—The unique spectacle was presented in parliament today of a divorce bill being discussed on merits of the evidence, and a division taken thereon. The divorce bill was introduced in committee again on Friday, and the committee reported in favour of the third reading, and was opposed strenuously by Messrs. Carleton, and McKinnon, who challenged the sufficiency of the evidence produced before the committee of the Senate in support of the petition of the wife. The customary procedure for the house was to pass a bill without debate, which bears the hall-mark of the Senate's approval, but in this particular instance a long debate arose. The bill was carried in committee and reported, but the third reading was challenged on division. The bill carried, Yeas 38, Nays 12. It was noticeable that all the French Canadian members abstained from voting with the exception of Mr. Bergeron, who voted against the bill.
