### SIX MEN SERIOUSLY HURT BY EXPLOSION OF BOILER

#### Accident at Sunnyside Rolling Mill Imperiled Lives of Many Workmen.

With the twinkling of an eye, stunned by shock and flying debris, enveloped in steam and threatened with flames, six employees of the rolling mills at Sunnyside, yesterday brought down to earth by the explosion of a boiler. Three of the number are seriously hurt, also the Western Hospital authorities express the hope that the injuries are not fatal. The unfortunate are: William Dixon, 25 Garden avenue, engineer, compound fracture of left arm between the shoulder and elbow, fracture of both bones of the right forearm and fracture of the second metacarpal, bad cut behind the ear, and body badly burned. George Woods, 5 Sunnyside avenue, mill hand, face badly cut, bruised and very badly burned. Albert Durnford, 85 West Marion street, mill hand, burned, bruised and scalded. Alexander Watson, engineer, elbow dislocated and fractured; leg, face and arms scalded. James Hill, mill hand, North Lisgar street, arms burned. Fred Jones, Indian Road, engineer, leg broken.

All the men except Woods are married. Dixon is over 60 years of age, and consequently is suffering severely from the shock. Jones and Watson are at the Emergency Hospital.

The accident occurred just before 2 o'clock, and it is providential that more were not hurt. Superintendent Joly and Manager Kyle both had narrow escapes, and there were over seventy men at work in the place. The explosion was due to the crown sheet of the back end of the thirty horsepower boiler giving way, allowing the water to fall upon the fire.

#### Smoketack Came Down.

The force of the explosion was terrific, but the boiler did not burst; it was simply thrown over to one side. The large 50 foot iron smoketack, however, came down, and crashing thru the corrugated iron roof of the building, fell in upon the mass of brick and wood. The building beyond the damage to the roof was not wrecked.

The six men injured were standing near together to the west of the boiler and were hurled several feet into the air by the force of the explosion. For a brief time concealed the real extent of the damage, and the employees from going to the aid of the victims.

William Kyle had just started from the office to go back to the boiler, and was within 15 feet of it when the explosion came. Charles Joly, the superintendent, was standing by the wall and was blown through the air. He knew just how he got back into the building, but when he saw the boiler he went around to the other side.

When Woods was rescued his clothing was on fire. The others were scattered over the floor, suffering greatly from the scalding effect of steam. The telephone summoned Dr. Hart, Lynd, Griffin, Orr and Hunter, and their work was rendered easier until the ambulances arrived.

Manager Kyle states that there was 15 pounds of steam on the boiler at the time of the explosion, according to Engineer Watson. The boiler was an auxiliary used to supply steam to the rolling mill at Sunnyside. He hopes to have the place in shape to resume work before Saturday.

#### Could Not Be Foreseen.

The boiler was new a year ago last month, and was in the shop for two months ago. H. N. Roberts, secretary of the Boiler Insurance and Inspection Company, said that the accident was of a kind which could not be foreseen by inspection. He with Inspector Boyce and Mr. Farrow, one of the directors, was early on the scene. The boiler is insured along with the other boilers at about \$1500.

#### SANS REGRET ESCAPES.



#### NORTH GREY PROTEST.

Owen Sound, Sept. 14.—(Staff Special).—To-day's enquiry into the methods by which A. G. Mackay has been able to sit in the legislature during the present parliament developed some startling evidence. ### UNTRUE TO HIS TRUST.

The Globe newspaper evidently thinks that the attorney-general of this province can also be the head of an electric corporation which is dealing with municipalities all the time, and which corporation, by the way, has been proved derelict in its contract. We disagree entirely with The Globe. We hold that the attorney-general of this province should not be in any way identified with these companies, especially with companies like the Hamilton Cataract Power Company, which is one day a power company, and which the next day is a traction company in the city, and the next day a traction company outside of the city, and which, as a parent company, can change the subsidiary companies what it likes, and can juggle the accounts just as it pleases.

The World holds that Attorney-General Gibson should be free to watch such companies, which are at the legitimate every session for law and confirmation of agreements, drawn up solely with regard to corporate interests. But Mr. Gibson is not free to watch these companies. He is the first promoter of one of them, and the friendly agent of all the rest.

J. M. Gibson, the attorney-general of this province, is to-day recognized by all the electric and traction companies as their friend and chief protector. The attorney-general, who has to pass on all the contracts for the leasing of power privileges in this province (Niagara included) should not be in the business himself. He happens to get his power privileges from Ottawa. The minister of justice at Ottawa handing out power privileges to the attorney-general of Ontario (who is in the power business himself), and handing out power leases to other power companies, is not a healthy spectacle.

### CAPTAIN BERNIER RESIGNS HUFFED AT MAJOR MOODY

#### Will Sail to Hudson Bay as Boss or Not Sail at All.

Quebec, Que., Sept. 14.—(Special).—Captain Bernier will not take part in the steamer Arctic's expedition to the head of the Mackenzie River. He has resigned on the ground that he will not accept the position of second in command. The steamer Arctic's expedition up the straits of the Hudson Bay is altogether a military organization, inasmuch as Major Moody, in charge, is called upon to perform special duties and make important reports to the government respecting the country and its conditions and geographical boundaries. Major Moody's resignation was accepted.



for Moody has been given supreme command of the expedition, and Captain Bernier was simply appointed sailing master of the steamer, to receive his instructions from Major Moody and obey his orders in regard to the movements of the ship. Captain Bernier resented against these regulations when he was officially notified of the matter, and immediately threatened to resign, saying he was not going to play second fiddle to any one else. He later carried his threat into execution, and telegraphed his resignation to the minister of marine and fisheries. The general impression is that Captain Bernier's resignation will be accepted.
