STEADY STREAM OF BRITISH TO WESTERN WAR THEATRE; 600,000 NOW THERE

Two of Greatest Armies Ever Gathered Face Each Other—England's Sons Have Task of Keeping Germans Back From Coast

Paris, March 13.—Two of the greatest armies ever gathered together in any war in the world's history, now face each other in the western theatre of war.

It is estimated that there are about 600,000 British soldiers upon French soil at present. The important task of holding the Germans back from the coast has fallen to the British, whose lines extend from north of Ypres in Belgium, to Arras. This line forms a barrier through which the Germans would have to cut before they could reach Calais, Dunkirk or Boulogne.

The British in the north are conducting a strong offensive movement, and it is evident that they hope to force the Germans to evacuate Lille by exerting vigorous pressure against the German lines near Arras and LaBassee.

Activity is increasing in Belgium east of Lombardzyde, on the North Sea coast. The Belgians have driven the Germans from a field fort. An artillery duel is in progress all along the line in Belgium. Near Middlekerke, the Germans have planted several 42-centimeter guns; it is reported, to destroy the locks of the canals near Palingsbrug, so that the country in that region can be flooded.

RUSSIANS AND GERMANS IN GREAT BATTLE

London, March 13.—A Petrograd despatch to the Daily Telegraph says: A battle of vast dimensions is now going on between Hönönda and Praszanyz and along the valley of the Orzissa, which joins the Narew east of Pultusk, the Germans are advancing.

It is not without significance that a height north of Grodno, which was taken by the Germans with a sudden rush, was recaptured by a regiment belonging to one corps wiped out at the battle of Tannenberg and since reconstructed.

GERMANS BRIN UP TROOPS TO FACE BRITISH

Amsterdam, March 14.—The Handelsblad's St. Petersburg correspondent says: The German offensive assumed a new phase on Thursday afternoon south of Duxode, where a strong attack was opened, supported by heavy artillery. The concentration of German troops towards Ypres and La Bassee continues. All the troops in North Flanders have been sent in the direction of Ypres and La Bassee and great troop movements have been taking place by way of Bruges and Courtrai.

GERMAN BOMBARDMENT WEAKENS

London, March 13.—Reuter's Petrograd correspondent sends a semi-official communication stating:—The bombardment of Osowetz has weakened somewhat. The Germans are sparing their shells. The German offensive on our positions at Praszanyz being conducted rather feebly. Their artillery has developed a violent fire, the infantry prefers to entrench 1500 paces from our lines. To the east of Plock our fire directed against an enemy battery exploded a great quantity of ammunition.

RUSSIANS DRIVING TURKS

Thia, March 13.—The commander of the Russian army in the Caucasus reports that fighting with the Turks is in progress near the coast of the Black Sea, but the Ottoman troops are being driven toward the southwest, the Russians are steadily advancing.

Dresden Sinks a British Bark

Valparaiso, March 13.—The crew of the British bark Conway Castle, sunk by the German cruiser Dresden off Corral (a seaport of Chile), on her way to Liverpool with a cargo of barley, was landed here yesterday.

Turkey Would Conclude Bulgaria

London, March 13.—Halli Bey, president of the Turkish cabinet, has arrived in the Bulgarian capital. "His mission," says a Daily Mail correspondent, "concludes with the report of offer of territorial concessions by Turkey to purchase Bulgarian aid or neutrality."

More Peace Talk

London, March 13.—An American despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company says that the most important associations of German agrarians, manufacturers and business men have petitioned the chancellor to allow the discussion of terms of a prospective peace to which the German people may have their say when the peace treaties are signed.

ITALY LISTENS BUT SAYS NOTHING

Rome, via Paris, March 13.—The Italian government continues to maintain an impetuous attitude regarding negotiations reported to be under way with Austria, concerning territorial concessions. Nothing has been added to the semi-official announcement that Italy has instituted no negotiations, but simply has listened to proposals emanating from Germany through Prince Von Buellow.

Danish Slesmer Abort.

London, March 13.—The wireless station at Fair Isle, one of the Shetland Islands, reports that the Danish steamer Canada, from Newport News, Va., February 24, for Christiania, is ashore in a dangerous position near the Scaden lighthouse.

WHEAT UP A LITTLE

Chicago, March 13.—Wheat hardened in price today helped by the prospect of a liberal decrease in the visible supply total on Monday. Higher quotations at Liverpool tended also to lift the market here. Selling orders, however, came into play on the bulge.

WAR NOTES

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HEROES ALL ON THE BYWINDS

Not a Man Left Ship Until She Sank

CAPTAIN AT HIS POST

Fine Example of British Navy Spirit Shows as Auxiliary Goes Down After Being Hit By Torpedo

London, March 13.—The British auxiliary cruiser Bayano with nearly 200 crew was sunk off Corsewall Point, Scotland, having been torpedoed by the enemy on March 11. About eighteen of her crew were rescued by the British steamer Balmorin. The Bayano was built in 1913, was of 2,500 tons displacement and 418 feet long.

Ay, Scotland, Mar. 13.—Most of the twenty-eight survivors of the Bayano left for Portmarnock by train last night. Garbled in clothing contributed by sympathizers, and still suffering from their experiences, they were grateful to have escaped death. Those injured, are still in a hospital here.

The survivors say there was no panic aboard the Bayano, but there was no time to lower the boats before the vessel sank. It was a case of every man for himself but none left the ship until she went down. They praise the heroism of their captain, who was at his post when the steamer was engulfed.

The Bayano left Glasgow on Wednesday night. She had been taken over by the Admiralty only recently. The steamer was equipped with wireless.

THE PRODIGAL AT OTTAWA

Witty and Stinging Speech by D.D. MacKenzie on Budget

Ottawa, March 13.—D. D. MacKenzie, of Cape Breton, speaking on the budget of the present prodigal son in charge of the National Revenue department, with the present conditions of a depleted treasury and the insistent call for more taxes. In 1912, Mr. White had boasted about the full treasury, and had gloried in the fact that the National Revenue department would be paid out of the surplus to come. Now Mr. White was taking the last cent from the workman by his taxes on food and the other necessities of life.

"I can assure the prime minister," said Mr. MacKenzie, "that in less than three years he and his government succeeded in raising and developing a prodigal son without a rival or peer in ancient or modern history. If there is one thing more than another in which we have outpassed ourselves and all former ages, it is in our reckless prodigality of public expenditure."

Mr. MacKenzie made a humorous comparison between the Babylonian prodigal and the present prodigal son in charge of Canadian public funds. The latter had squandered his rich estate to the four winds of Heaven, and had now become an absolute bankrupt. There was no longer any fatted calf to be killed.

The elder brother, the Canadian electorate, would soon find a place for this unrepentant prodigal on the high shelf of political forgetfulness. The wicked cease from troubling, and the weary are at rest.

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THROUGH STRAITS BY END OF LENT

Believed Dardanelles Will Be Forced By Easter

DETAILS OF BOMBARDMENT

Semi-Official Announcement Indicates That Correspondents Were Sending the Allied Fleet Through Famous Waters Too Quickly

Paris, March 13.—Vice Admiral Garden, commanding the British fleet in the Dardanelles, has expressed the opinion that the allies will be able to hammer their way through the straits before Easter, according to an Athens despatch to the Journal.

Operations of French and British warships against the fortifications at the entrance to the Dardanelles, and in the first mine field on March 10 and 11, are described in an official statement issued last night by the ministry of marine. The communication says:

"During the day of the 10th in bad weather, two British warships shelled two forts at Bulair (On the Gallipoli Peninsula, on the Gulf of Saros) while the other British battle-ships bombarded the light batteries which command the bay of Morte at the entrance to the Dardanelles.

"During the night of the 10th, 11th, mine sweepers entered the straits under cover of the guns of a battleship and cruiser, and succeeded in operating in the first mine field, notwithstanding a hot fire from the guns of the defence. "French divisions resumed, on the 11th operations begun the day before, against the fortifications of Bulair and the light batteries above the bay of Morte."

This despatch would seem to indicate that the allied fleet has not penetrated the Dardanelles so far as had been supposed or that the operations against the Turkish fortifications have not been entirely successful. Previous information has been that Chanak Kalesi and other forts at the narrowest part of the straits had been successfully bombarded about a third of the passage had been cleared of mines, and that some of the more important batteries at the entrance to the straits, had been silenced.

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GERMANS ADMIT BRITISH HIT HARD

Hurry Reinforcements to La Bassee to Face King's Men

DETAILS OF BOMBARDMENT

New York, March 13.—A London Daily Express and New York Herald despatch from the Belgian frontier says: The Germans in Belgium admit the seriousness of their reverse at the hands of the British in the region of LaBassee. The sending there of additional infantry just arrived from Germany, estimated to amount to three divisions, shows it is not their intention to accept defeat without further sacrifices. More howitzers also have been sent to the south from the artillery park at Ghent, and the entire area from Knoche to Westende is full of infantry, awaiting the order to attempt to overwhelm the allies held the great dune.

The Germans are trying to prevent the details of the LaBassee reverse reaching Holland through civilians, three of whom were shot last night at frontier posts while trying to cross with messages. German fears of a landing of enemy troops north of Ostend, again is apparent in the massing of several divisions around Bruges. It appears to be accepted as conclusive by the Germans that the allies will invade Flanders between Knoche and Ostend, and some of their best troops are held in readiness to repel such a movement.

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MONROSE ASHORE TO GO TO FOUR CHURCHES SUNDAY

The Soldiers' Parades—Today's Drill—Few Recruits This Morning

The units of the militia in training here for overseas will each conduct church parades tomorrow. The 29th Battalion will separate into four detachments, some to St. Paul's, St. John Presbyterian, St. Stephen's church and the Cathedral. The Army Service Corps will attend St. John's (Stone) church, and the Catholics the Cathedral. The 6th R. C. M. Rifles will parade at St. John's (Stone) church, and the Catholics to the Cathedral. The 62nd, City Grenadier, Canadian Grenadier, and the 26th Rifle and Drums Bands will accompany them this time.

Heavy firing in the vicinity of the rifle range this morning told of a sharp and decisive encounter between two divisions of the 26th Battalion, comprising "A" and "B" companies, the one composed of "C" companies of field operations, and intending to remain outside the city during the day, returning late this afternoon. The noonday meal was taken on the field.

The Construction Corps D. A. O'Mara, of the C. P. R., Montreal, is still in the city completing arrangements for the mobilization of the Railway Construction Corps here, which definitely expected that the men will be housed in colonist cars, as was announced originally in the Times, and in addition box cars are being fitted up as kitchens, cook-houses and supply-cars, the idea being to accustom the men to active service conditions as much as possible before their embarkation. When in the field the railway lines will furnish their home completely, for all their work will pertain to this department, its repair and upkeep. It is not thought that when once organized the corps will be kept in Canada very long.

Recruiting A mere handful of men presented themselves at the local recruiting office today to enroll with the 58th Battalion. The lists are increasing very slowly. The unit for garrison duty at Halifax, to be sent from the 3rd regiment, C. A., is being rapidly completed, while the location of the list of volunteers for English coastal defence is daily expected.

Today's Drill The 6th Rifles had a march-out this morning along the Westwood road, carrying on armkdrumming. There is no definite word as to their departure for Amherst, though rumor now fixes it for Wednesday next. The Army Service Corps had wagon drill near their quarters on west side today.

FREDERICTON RECRUITS Five recruits enlisted for the 58th Battalion in Fredericton on Thursday afternoon—Swales Forrest, of Minto, Harry Delong, Waasdyk, Lawrence Weir, John Larett and Charles E. Clarke, Fredericton. There are now twenty-six recruits for the 58th Battalion there. Forty-seven men reported for drill to Captain Osborne.

The total number of recruits that has enlisted for the third contingent is sixty-four. Major Gray has also recruited twelve men for the composite regiment.

Sergeant Alfred T. Underhill, who was a resident of Sheffield, N. B., for three years and removed several years ago to Toronto, died recently from appendicitis in Tidworth Barracks, England, where he was instructor with the First Canadian Contingent.

TOBACCO COUNTS

Every Precaution Taken To Supply Soldiers

SOLACE TO WOUNDED

Has Repeatedly Got Correspondents Out of Tight Corner—Effect on Non-combatants

Tobacco has played its part in every war, from Waterloo to the Balkans. It is playing a tremendous part in this, the greatest war in history.

One of the first moves of Germany was to seize all cigars, cigarettes and tobacco factories. For the reason that a majority of the capital is held in England, Germany seized and placed under government control the same.

When the Germans entered Heyst the population was ordered to leave, but before the people left the German officers demanded 50,000 cigars.

A war month of 1914, compared with a year ago, shows that our exports showed an increase of 23,477,408 pounds, and since then the demand for tobacco has increased steadily.

While alcoholic liquors are forbidden in the armies now fighting in the field, and to soldiers preparing to take to the firing lines, urgent requests have been made to all governments at war to have the public indulge tobacco in comfort gifts to the soldiers.

In most armies tobacco is now a regular item in the supply of all soldiers and sailors. In 1870 in the charge before Saarbriicken, the Brunswick Hussars galloped into the historic encounter with the French with cigars in their mouths.

THE WAR NEWS

The Germans admit that they have suffered a reverse at the hands of the British in the western zone, and today's reports say that they appear to be expecting further developments by the British on the Belgian coast, and are making preparations to meet them.

IS IT A BLUFF?

Mr. E. S. Carter was naturally a much surprised man yesterday. He had made certain charges in relation to the payment of \$9,508 by the Dalhousie Lumber Company as balance of stumpage account in the year 1912, and which item does not appear in the public accounts.

The two submarines for which Canada paid \$1,150,000 were to have been delivered to the Chilean government for \$774,000, but were rejected by that government as not being up to specifications.

It is worth while to quote from Friday's St. John Standard the words of Commissioner Chandler himself at the opening of his court on Thursday. He said: "We do not intend to stand on the strict rules of evidence, but if any person has reason to believe that there is anything wrong in any of the departments, although he may have had no knowledge himself, which will bear out his belief, he will be welcome to communicate his belief or what he has heard to the commissioner, and every facility will be given for the complete probe of any such report."

"No grills in sight to lay any charges. Commissioner considers investigation which opened yesterday does not seem to appeal to Veniot-Carter clan."

Premier Clarke in his speech made the suggestion that Mr. Carter should have made a charge in the courts of the country against Mr. W. H. Berry. Surely this is an extraordinary position to be taken by the premier of the province in relation to charges made against an official of a government department.

A FACTIOUS AGITATION

The feeling expressed by Mr. Belyea is shared by most citizens, and yet perhaps too much should not be taken for granted. Members of the legislature may not understand as well as St. John people the nature of the opposition to the commission plan, and may be disposed to regard a list of names as of more value in relation to the matter than it really is.

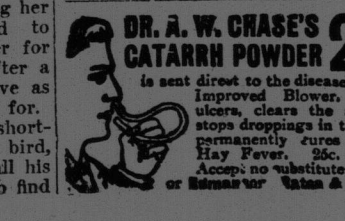

WAR ACCOUNTS WILL BE PROBED

Referred to Accounts Committee on Opposition Motion—Dr. Neely's Charges Against Finance Minister—A Nationalist Speaks

Ottawa, March 12.—The granting of the request of the opposition by the government to have submitted to the Public Accounts Committee the correspondence which has passed between the auditor-general and the militia department with respect to expenditures under the war appropriation act, opens the way to an investigation into a wide range of purchases made by the department since war commenced.

Dr. Neely of Humboldt, Sask., dealt disparagingly with the minister of finance today, charging him with a constant concern over his financial and protected corporations and a cynical disregard of the common people. He jocularly pointed out that in the first three hours of the minister's speech he had used the first personal pronoun "I" no less than 489 times, at the rate of two and a half a minute. He charged that the real purpose of the war tax was not to increase the revenue, but to increase the cost of living for the benefit of the minister's protected friends. He challenged the minister to show the sincerity of his pretence that these were war taxes by a promise that they would be removed at the close of the war. Hon. Mr. White remained silent.

Hermengilde Boulay of Rimouski, Nationalist-Conservative supporter of the government, startled the house by declaring that Canada should not contribute to the cost of the war more than she could after meeting her own needs and that the British government should meet all expenses of the overseas contingents for they leave these shores. As he said, these were only his personal views, he would support the government measure.

W. F. Carroll of Cape Breton expressed indignation over such utterances from a supporter of the government and said that he was sure that they reflected the views of a very small portion of the population.

Those Dismissals

A return of appointments and dismissals in the Canadian naval service up to March 1, tabulated in the commons yesterday, shows a decrease of 420 employees owing to the dismantling of the Niobe and Rainbow—hardly in keeping with the idea of "emergency" of which so much has been said by the government. In other departments there have been 11,000 more men have entered the service than have left. The returns tell of 484 men being dispensed with because their services were no longer required.

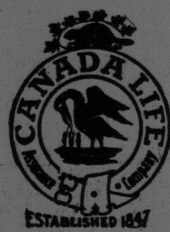

FUNDS REQUIRED FOR THE LOCAL WHITE PLAGUE FIGHT

At the last meeting of the St. John association for the prevention of tuberculosis the nurses' report gave the following totals: Dispensary open, 18 days; attendances, 41; prescriptions filled, 21; patients, 6 new, 76 old; tuberculosis pulmonary, 47; under observation, 30; discharged, 3; died, 4; patients receiving attention, 117. The four deaths resulting were all advanced cases and a source of great danger to living as they often do, four and five in one room. The association has at present two patients at River Glade for which it is paying \$7 per week. The time is being looked forward to when the hospital at East St. John will be prepared to receive advanced cases.

It was reported that during the winter months no subscriptions have been solicited on account of the war, but as money is now needed to continue the work, canvass will be resumed after April 1, and the organization points out that persons interested should send in their donations as soon as possible.

Ambassador Page's Daughter Engaged.
London, March 12, 10 p.m.—Walter Hines Page, the American Ambassador, and Mrs. Page, have announced the engagement of their daughter, Katherine, to Charles Greely Loring, son of the late General Charles Loring, of Boston.

It is estimated that the foreigners of Biddeford, Me., of whom there are about 7,000, send about \$1,000 to \$2,000 a week to their former homes.

MR. CHANDLER REFUSES AND THEN RECONSIDERS

That \$2,903 Dalhousie Payment—Some Interesting Queries in the Legislature

Fredericton, March 12.—W. B. Chandler, K.C., the commissioner appointed to investigate the various departments of the provincial government, wrote a letter yesterday refusing to inquire into the charges preferred by E. S. Carter, Liberal organizer, but later, in a personal interview with Mr. Carter, asked for time to reconsider.

Mr. Carter's request was for an inquiry into the charges that the Dalhousie Lumber Company had paid to W. H. Berry \$2,903.22, in a stampage account, which has not since been accounted for in the receipts of the province.

Fredericton, N. B., March 12.—There was a half hour session of the legislature this afternoon and then adjournment until Monday evening at 8.30. During the brief time the house was in session the opposition members from Madawaska were heard from again with their pertinent inquiries into the business of the province.

Mr. Dugal asked for information respecting the cost of the royal commissions and other expenses of the investigation into the charges preferred last session concerning crown timber limits and the Valley railway construction. Incidentally he inquired how the expense was divided and what amount had been paid upon each account.

Another question concerned the amount of railway funds now in the hands of the Prudential Trust Company, and how they are invested.

Whether the province has been called upon to pay any interest because of its guarantee of railway bonds, was the matter of another of Mr. Dugal's questions.

Mr. Pelletier inquired as to the cost to date and at completion of the new steel bridge at St. John, and when it would be ready for traffic; also as to what assistance, and in what form, the province extended toward recruiting the 26th and 55th battalions.

Hon. Mr. Baxter introduced a bill to amend the act respecting partnerships, which he explained was to do away with the necessity for publishing the notarial certificate of the execution of partnership agreement in the Royal Gazette.

Mr. Lockhart presented a petition of the city of St. John in favor of a bill to amend the acts relating to civic elections in that city.

Hon. Mr. Wilson introduced a bill to authorize the city council of St. John to grant a superannuation allowance to William Walker Clark.

Hon. Dr. Landry introduced a bill to amend the acts respecting taxation of debentures, report on education, provincial hospital, Jordan Memorial Sanatorium, valuation of real estate in Westmorland, Sunbury and Albert counties.

GENERAL ALDERSON CONDEMNED BOOTS

Why Militia Department Sent 40,000 Pairs of Overshoes to Salisbury Plain

Evidence that General Alderson, commander of the first Canadian contingent, had himself condemned the footwear served out to the first Canadian contingent as unsuitable for the service they were required to give, as Sir George Perley had cabled Sir Robert Borden to the same effect, and that the militia department had thereupon sent 40,000 pairs of overshoes which were found not to "compensate for the faulty construction of the boots" was the feature of Wednesday's sitting of the parliamentary boot committee in Ottawa.

The evidence heard was on the whole perhaps the most important so far. It was brought out that a week before the war broke out the Militia department had been advised by Col. Landry, commanding the 5th division, that the boots which were being then issued were not strong enough for the wear to which they were subjected under ordinary conditions; that within three or four months after hostilities commenced complaints as to the boots had been brought to the attention of the department by Hon. J. D. Reid, Minister of Customs; Col. W. S. Hughes, of the 2nd Battalion at Kingston, brother of the Minister of Militia; General Lesard and others. Then representations were received from General Alderson and Sir George Perley. It was said that though the department was now considering a new boot specification, it still had only old boots and supplied the force of 5,000 men which had just reached England, with them.

CANADIANS DEAD IN WAR

Now Reach Total of 159

Ottawa, March 12.—The death roll of the first Canadian contingent including the Princess Patricia has now mounted up to 159. Of these 89 have been killed in action while 101 have died of diseases or accidents. The total number of wounded is well over the 500 mark. The daily lists of killed and wounded are now heavier than ever before since practically the whole of the first contingent and the Princess Patricia are now right at the front.

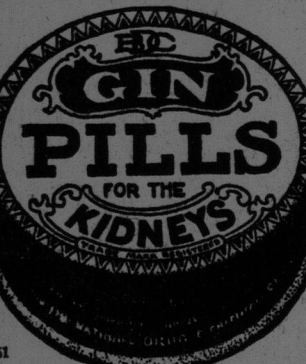

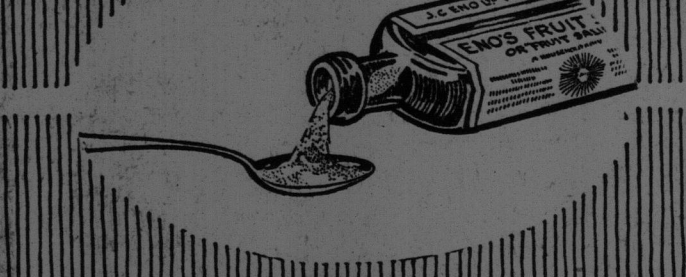

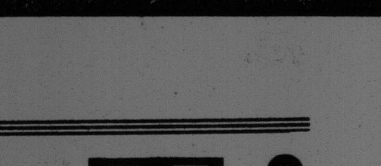
