PEKING, China, Dec. 1-The danger to which foreigners at Hankow and Foochow have been exposed as the result of unrest and factional fighting is lessening. SPRINGHILL, N. S., Dec. 1. What was apparently an attempt at murder startled the town last night when some young men, after beating Chief of Police Geo. L. Smith, fired two shots at him through a window in his house, one of the shots passing dangerously close

The trouble began early in the evening, when three Kennedy boys, Pat, Rod and Clarence, wanted the chief to go to their home to arrest their stepfather, Thomas Marks, but upon finding that the Kennedys were under the influence of liquor, while Marks was apparently sober, he paid no more attention to them. Later, Marks came to the chief's house requesting him to go to arrest the boys for misbehavior but the chief being off duty and Marks being seemingly under alcoholic influence then, the chief did not go.

### SEIZE AND BEAT CHIEF

About 10.45 the three Kennedys and another young man came back and when Chief Smith came to the door of his home he was seized by them and dragged out in the yard where he was kicked and beaten with a fence picket. Getting away from them Smith ran indoors and waen reaching up to turn off a light was shot at. Night Officer Charles Atkinson was called to the scene but the men had gone and are not yet caught though them. The fourth assailant though not known last night will in all likelihood be apprehended today as he was seen by parties with these boys. 



### MORE CHEERING NEWS

NEWS that the Western Packing Corporation, Ltd., will continue to operate its plant at ment of a permanent manager, received at the office of the Board of Trade, will be greeted with much satisfaction here. Not only will the continued operation of this, and other similar plants, of foul fighting. give added employment to the people of the vicinity, but they will act as a spur for the more intensive development of the province's agricultural wealth.

The Corporation also imparts the information that the Farmers' Marketing and Canning Company and the Associated Farmers, Ltd., have decided to amalgamate and form a new company, with the assistance of the Department of Agri culture. This also is a step forward. The easier the problem of marketing is made for the producer, the more will he be inclined to speed up production, and the resultant stimulus given to business will benefit all concerned.

In asking the Board of Trade to use its best efforts to find a more stable market for the farmers and a supply of goods for the canning factory, the Corporation is stepping into a situation where it will receive a hearty welcome from the Board of Trade. The latter body already has made a gesture towards getting the business and agricultural people of the province into closer relationship, and an exposition of the packing corporation's attitude should prove a strong incentive to both interests to make that co-operation effective as soon as possible.

### THE ONTARIO ELECTIONS

ONTARIO goes to the polls today. The issue is only very remotely connected with party politics, the main plank of both Conservatives and Liberals being the question of liquor control or prohibition continued. The present Government contend that they cannot govern properly in the face of general lawlessness which they attribute to the alleged contempt of all law arising out of contempt for the prohibitory law. They contend that the consensus of public opinion in Ontario renders prohibition unenforceable. Their opponents deny the existence of lawlessness, claim social improvement under prohibition and declare that it can-and under them would-be enforced. That is the plain issue before the electorate of Ontario, and it has necessarily broken

Prohibition as a war measure was introduced into Ontario by a Conservative government, and has remained the law under Liberal, Farmer and, has remained the law under Liberal, Farmer and, recently again, Conservative regimes. So all have had experience thereof from both sides. British Columbia, the Prairie Provinces and Quebec have all adopted liquor control in one form or another. The three Maritime Provinces are still prohibition areas, and by this evening it should he known whether Ontario decides to remain prohibitionist or will follow the lead of those others which after a trial have abandoned the attempt to enforce a dry law.

### Colonization By Canadians

(Quebec Chronicle Telegraph) THE Canadian Trades and Labor Congress urges that the same opportunities for colonization should be available to Canadians as are now being offered to immigrants from Great Britain. It believes that colonization should not depend upon immigration, and that if Canada's need of land settlers and land workers is so real that she is prepared to make easier the way for prospective settlers from overseas, then the way should be made easier also for prospective land settlers from amongst the people already living

The Trades and Labor Congress believes that the Dominion Government should establish farms in Canada where Canadian people might be trained in farm work. Such farms, it points out, have been conducted successfully in England for the training of prospective emigrants, and similar institutions on this side would be a great aid to the unemployed and others desirous of doing so to fit themselves for the life and work on the

There is everything to be said for this idea and

nothing can be properly urged against it. Surely the best possible settlers in Canada's vacant spaces are to be found among our own native-born youths. But the rapid development of our cities and industrial life is gradually tending to divorce our people from the land. There are young Canadians today, who are almost as much the product of the city as the youths of old London. Some of them are finding it difficult to obtain steady em-ployment, and might be willing, as the Old Country youth is willing, to go back to the soil upon which their pioneer forebears lived in past years. In Europe they are preaching the doctrine of "back to the land." A similar movement would not be amiss in this country. 



Why Should Mother Demand Her Daughter's Pay Envelope, While Believing That Her Son Has a Right to Keep His?—Why Should Mother Expect the Girls to Help With the Housework After Office While the Boys Must Rest and Enjoy Themselves in Evening?

WHY is it that so many mothers treat their wage-earning daughters so differently from the way in which they do their sons?

WHEN a boy finishes school and goes to work he is regarded as being entitled to the money he earns. If he pays a fair proportion of his wages for board, it is all that is expected of him. And if now and then he gives his mother a present she bores her neighbors and friends to tears saying his praises and telling how generous Johnny is and what a good son he is.

SHE is filled with sympathy because poor Johnny has to work so hard all day and when he comes home in the evening she has a good hot meal waiting for him. She never dreams of asking him to help with the house-work or to put in his evenings doing the family wash that she has eaved up for him.

BUT Mamie is another story. When Mamie finishes school and goes to work, mother expects her to bring her pay envelope home to her intact, and she doles out of it whatever allowance she considers sufficient for Mamie to spend on carfare and lunches and clothes. Mother never voices any appreciation of Mamie's slaving to support the family, because she considers that what Mamie earns belongs to her by right.

AND when Mamie comes home mother expects her to help get the dinner and wash the dishes afterward, and to lend a hand with the

sewing and finish off the ironing.

Mother washes Johnny's clothes and mends them and keeps them looking neat and tidy, but she expects Mamie to do her own laundry work and keep her own clothes in condition. It is Mamie who has to take care of the younger ones in the family; who has to sit up nights nursing the sick—not Johnny. Mother recognizes that a boy who works all day is entitled to some recreation and pleasure the evening. Also, that he should have his night's res that he can go fresh to his job in the morning.

BUT she doesn't see why Mamie, who has also worked hard all day, shouldn't push the baby's perambulator when she goes out for a walk or take along tottering old grandma, nor why she shouldn't take her part of the nursing when there is illness in

Johnny is the pampered one, yet he is a husky lad, far more able to work than his sister; and, as a general thing, he gets a much better salary than she does. WHY, then, should their mother make this difference between them? Why, then, should their mother make this difference between them?

Why should she think that she has a right to the girl's money and not to the boy's? Why should she expect the girl to help with the housework and not the boy? Why should mothers overvalue everything their sons do for them and undervalue what their daughters do for them?

NOBODY knows. It is just the way mothers are built. A woman will offer her daughter as a living sacrifice to the family without even knowing that she is doing it, but she beats upon the cymbals and calls upon the world to observe what a treasure Heaven has blessed her with if her sons make the small-

PERHAPS the reason that mothers are so much harder on their daughters than they are on their sons is because the wage-earning girl is so new that her mother has not yet had time to adjust herself to her. Perhaps, too deep for any one generation to eradicate it, there still lies the age-old belief that a mother should control all of her daughter's expenditures. And mothers have not yet been able to see that when a girl becomes independent her whole status in the household is changed and she should stand at least on an equal footing with her brothers.

CERTAINLY to the laborer belongs her hire. Any girl who has intelligence enough to hold down a job and do work for which an employer is willing to pay her, has gumption enough to know how to spend it, and no mother has a right to reduce her daughter to vassalage by making the girl give all she earns

IT IS fair and right that the girl should pay a fair amount for her board, but the remainder belongs to her, and she should not be deprived of the sense of independence that we all feel in handling our own money.

NOR should a girl be expected to do housework after she has toiled all day in a store or office. That is more than flesh and blood can stand. One of the reasons that so many girls break down or fail to make good in business is because they are worn out doing double duty.


THE mothers who force their daughters to help with the housework do not realize what slave drivers they are, because they look upon working down-town as a sort of pastime and diversion. They never think of Mamie's work as exhausting and nerve wearing, because she has done nothing all day but stand behind a counter or sit in a chair and pound

IT IS a frolic for mother to go shopping, so she conceives it as being equally amusing for daughter to go into the business district and she never dreams of classing her work with cooking

OF COURSE, there are many exceptions to this rule. There are thousands of mothers who do realize how hard their daughters work and who try to save them all they can at home. There are also many mothers who are appreciative of what their daughters do for them.

BUT the great majority of mothers still think that their daughters have no right to their pay envelopes and that their sons have a right to theirs; and that their daughters should work both cutside of the home and inside of it, while all that a boy should be expected to do is to enjoy himself after working hours.

AT LEAST, this is what thousands of working girls write and tell me.

The original wooden dam built by the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission across the outlet of Loch Alva on the East branch of the Musquash river held back a reservoir 19 feet deep at the dam with a water surface of about 1700 acres and impounded 1,250,000,000 cubic feet of

The dam which has been alternate-ly wet and dry according as the lake were full or drawn down, shows al-ready, signs of deterioration, and last spring a break occurred at one point in its face. This was temporarily repaired so as not to lose the water stored during the spring freshet. Gains have been provided in the sides of the piers so that flash boards can be inserted. By placing these flash boards, on the decline of the spring freshet an extra foot of water can be retained.
