TRAIL RIDERS UNVEIL MONUMENT TO TOM WILSON—EARLIEST GUIDE

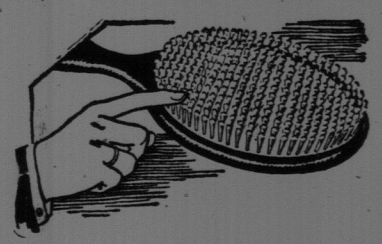

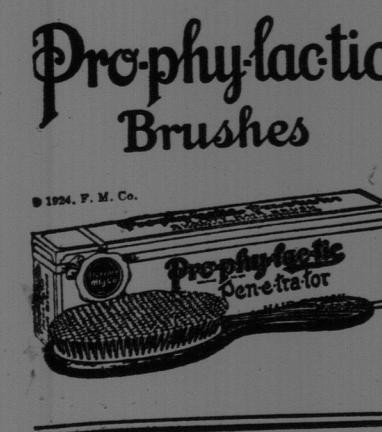

CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH REPORT

New York, Aug. 8.—(United Press)—The annual report of the congregational churches of the United States has just been made public. A summary made by Rev. Charles E. Burton, the secretary, shows a notable tendency towards fewer churches but better. The denomination reports a loss of 110 churches, but an increase of 3,322 members. The average membership per church, taking the country over, increased from 147 to over 150. This is accounted for by three reasons:

First, the concentration of population in cities from the country thus making the continuance of rural churches impossible.

Second, the wide use of the automobile allows many country dwellers to go to the town church.

Third, the growing spirit of church union or federation which brings about the union of two or more small churches of various denominations into one strong church.

During the year 33 new churches were organized, and 143 were closed or merged into churches of other denominations. Property values have increased by \$8,412,461, bringing them up to \$122,388,237. Invested funds of

the churches amount to \$15,313,945, being an increase of \$24,350 in the year. The annual budgets of the churches reporting amount to \$18,261,691, which is \$1,479,938 more than the preceding year. This does not include the benevolences of the churches, which total \$5,368,181, or \$153,965 more than the preceding year.

SYNTHETIC LUMBER.

Chicago, Aug. 8.—(United Press)—Synthetic lumber is the latest discovery of business men here. He said: "This artificial lumber is made from bagasse, the crushed fibre of sugarcane once destroyed as waste. Sugarcane fibre from the annual crops in the United States and Cuba is sufficient to manufacture 50,000,000 feet of lumber every day.

"Synthetic lumber has advantages over natural wood. It has one-third the weight of pine. This means cheap freight costs and ease in handling. It has the insulating value of cork. This means cooler homes in summer and warmer homes in winter. It is a sound-deadener, absorbing one-third of all the sound waves that strike against it."

The number of whales caught in 1923 was 445, compared with 187 in 1922. The value increased from \$18,814 to \$382,781. In 1923, 706,514 gallons of whale oil were obtained.
Capital invested in the fishing industry in 1923 totaled \$5,754,272. One hundred and twenty-eight plants were in operation, comprising 60 salmon canneries, 28 fish curing establishments, four clam canneries and eight whale oil and fish oil factories. Ninety employed in the industry numbered 8,669.

Stoughton, Mass., Aug. 8.—Two boys, Joseph Abitt, 7 years old, and Alpha Tricinkas, 9, both of Stoughton, have confessed to the deliberate wrecking of the Newport-Boston express train on the New Haven road, Monday, resulting in the serious injury of four men, the destruction of one end of the depot and the ruin of one of the road's largest locomotives. Spikes on the rails were used to derail the train.

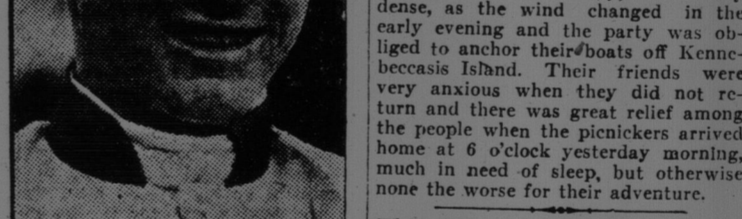

TO BE CANDIDATE IN KINGS COUNTY



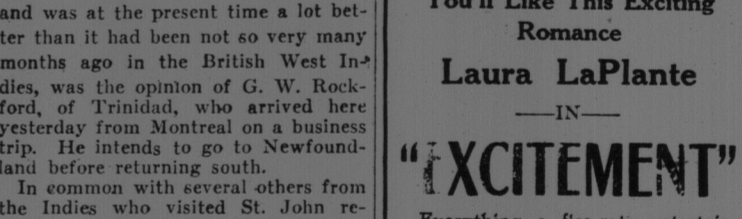
Harold H. McKiel
